

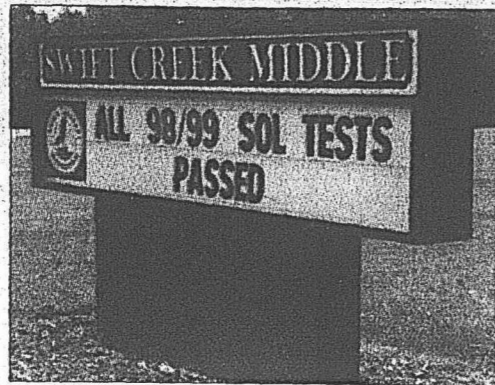

Brandermill celebrates 25 years of excellence

Over 400 residents gathered in the shady areas of the Gardens Pavilion at Sunday Park to enjoy Brandermill's 25th anniversary celebration on a hot and steamy July 18. The Richmond Philharmonic, conducted by Victoria Gau and guest conductor Rui Zhang, performed a variety of musical selections and were cheered by the audience with a standing ovation.

Before the concert, BCA Board President John Hughes greeted residents and introduced special guests Clover Hill Planning Commissioner Russell Gullely, Hank Meyer of East West Partners and Charlie Davis, the first resident of Brandermill.

Each spoke about Brandermill's road to success over the past 25 years. Charlie Davis, who moved into his Winterberry Ridge home in October 1975, said that "while residents today complain about paying to use toll roads, residents back in the '70s complained about *no* roads."

Following their brief remarks, the guests, along with President John Hughes and Community Manager Mike Divita, unveiled a bronze plaque commemorating Brandermill's 25th anniversary.

Community Manager Divita said of the large turnout for the concert and dedication of the plaque, "This was a fitting tribute to one of the country's great communities." The plaque has since been installed on a rock at the entrance to the Sunday Park peninsula.

Board considers property option in Sunday Park

During the August 2 work session, the BCA Board of Directors discussed exercising its option to purchase the old Millwood School site in Sunday Park from The Brandermill Church. The BCA gained the option to purchase the property, 2.48 acres south of the church, during negotiations with officials for relocating the Sunday Park loop road in order to expand the church.

The BCA Board of Directors passed a special assessment in February for a community improvement plan in which funds for the purchase of the school site were included. Steve Delaney, BCA legal counsel, attended the work session to discuss finances, answer questions and brief board members on the best timing to exercise the option. He suggested the board send a letter of intent to church officials advising them the board would exercise its option by September 30 so the property could close before the end of the year. The BCA would have 90 days to close once the option is exercised. In reviewing financial data, Delaney said the purchase price plus interest and taxes for the property amounts to \$135,907.

The BCA Board is interested in purchasing the site since it would be the only public access to the Sunday Park peninsula and would give the BCA control of the property. Currently there are no plans to build on the site.

A resolution to exercise the option will be considered by the board at the August 16 BCA Board meeting.

CARB reviews design plans for church expansion

According to Doug Greene, BCA community architect, the Commercial Architectural Review Board (CARB) and county officials have completed an initial review of plans for a major addition to The Brandermill Church at Sunday Park. The project includes a new sanctuary and classroom addition, as well as additional spaces in a redesigned parking lot. The sanctuary is designed to seat 670 people on the main floor and a balcony.

Building and site plans are available at the BCA office for review by interested property owners.

The CARB will make a final review of the plans at its regular meeting on Tuesday, September 7 at 3:30 p.m. at the BCA office.

Interested parties may provide comments on the plans in writing to CARB or may attend the meeting. Residents who cannot attend the meeting may contact the community manager to view the plans.

Officials break ground for ABB building in Waterford

Officials broke ground for the new 100,000-square-foot ABB Power Generation, Inc. office building in Waterford on July 21. Community Manager Mike Divita and BCA Board President John Hughes were on hand to welcome President Werner Lieberherr and company officials. ABB Power Generation, Inc. is a subsidiary of ABB Alstom Power Company.

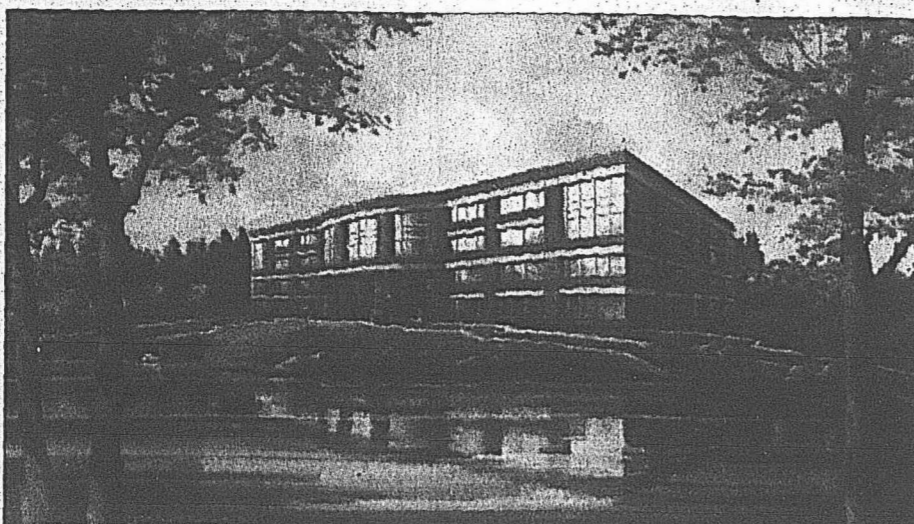
Clover Hill Supervisor Art Warren addressed the guests at the ceremony and expressed appreciation on behalf of the board of supervisors that ABB chose to remain in Chesterfield County. The company is relocating from its office building on Commonwealth Centre Parkway across from the main entrance to Brandermill. The new building will be situated on 7.49 acres next to the Waterford 1 building on the southeast side of the lake.

President Werner Lieberherr, who resides in Woodlake, said Chesterfield County creates a very positive environment for business. He introduced a representative of Bovis Construction, the contractor firm, who unveiled a rendering of the new brick and glass building. According to company officials, construction will start immediately and the projected completion date is April 1, 2000.

ABB Power Generation is headquarters for the company's rotating power generation equipment and services. The company provides gas and steam turbines and turnkey power plants to the U.S. utility, industrial and merchant power markets including Virginia Power. ABB Alstom Power's 200-acre site and manufacturing plant at Willis Road will continue its current operations. When the Brandermill expansion is complete, ABB Alstom Power will employ 650 people, 500 in Chesterfield County. The new Waterford site will be able to accommodate over 400 people.

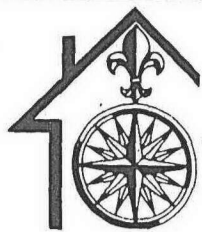

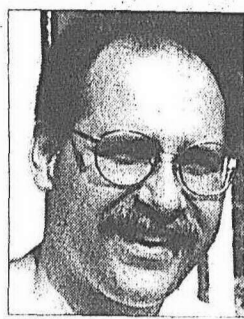

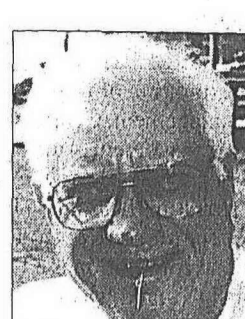

**Community association managers
 are similar to town managers**

Community Manager's note: the following article was published in the August issue of Common Ground, the magazine of Community Associations Institute.

In the recently published 1998-1999 edition of the *Occupational Outlook Handbook*, the U.S. Department of Labor for the first time makes a distinction between property managers and community association managers. "Vive la difference," says W. Stephen Castle, chairman of the National Board of Certification for Community Association Managers (NBC-CAM).

According to Castle, community association managers should always refer to themselves as "community association managers," not "property managers," when they're asked to identify their profession. The term "property management" derives from traditional management or rental of commercial real estate and doesn't in-

clude all of the functions of community association management.

"The community association management profession is sometimes confused with other real-estate professions, most particularly property management and real-estate brokerage," Castle says. "The three professions have different job responsibilities, requiring different knowledge and skills."

Community association managers have responsibilities beyond the association property, Castle points out. They're like town managers, oversee-

ing operations of the entire self-governing community. Community association managers' responsibilities include advising boards of directors, enforcing restrictive covenants, and organizing community events - activities beyond those of property managers. Community association management differs even more dramatically from real estate brokerage. Community association managers normally are not involved in buying, selling, or leasing real estate.

NBC-CAM grants the Certified Manager of Community Associations (CMCA) designation to those managers who have demonstrated an understanding of the fundamental knowledge required for effective community association management.

Board addresses policy on covenant violators

The regularly scheduled meeting of the Brandermill Community Association Board of Directors was held at Brandermill Woods on July 19.

Directors Healy, Hughes, Massenburg, McSweeney, Miller, and Tuttle and Community Manager Divita were present. Absent was Director Thacker. This is a summary of the minutes. Complete official minutes are available at the BCA.

Member Voice

The Swift Creek Athletic Association has raised approximately \$23,000 for the purpose of improving the athletic facilities at Swift Creek Middle School. They are within \$7,500 of their goal and plan to request \$7,500 from Chesterfield County. Greg DeFrancisco appeared before the board to request a letter of support for the project from the BCA Board of Directors. The board agreed to the request.

President's Report

The Heron Pointe development hearing at the county has been postponed until August 17.

The results of the June 28 Leader-

ship Training meeting survey "What makes a good community association?" were tabulated and sent out to each attendee. A follow up meeting is planned for the fall.

Approximately 10 people attended the June 30 pre-budget meeting. Next year's meeting will be held in March.

The Brandermill Marina dedication was very well attended. All slips are filled and a waiting list is being compiled.

Relocation of the Sunday Park sign is within the VDOT easement. The BCA will take responsibility for landscaping around the sign, with an "in kind" monetary contribution from The Brandermill Church. The lighting in the area will be moved to mark the entrance.

The Board is working on developing a policy to deal with persistent covenant violations.

**Committee Reports
 Activities**

Mark Smith reported on the 25th anniversary celebration which took place July 18. A bronze plaque was dedicated and will be placed on a large

rock at the entrance to the peninsula opposite the Brandermill Sailing Center.

CRC

The next meeting of the Commercial Representative Council may be rescheduled for September. A date and time will be announced.

Manager's Report

There are significant street paving problems in the Fox Chase/Quail Hill area. It appears that utility areas under the street are failing and causing the roadway to deteriorate. In an effort to deal with the problem, a joint meeting with VDOT and Chesterfield County Utilities has been scheduled. In areas not yet paved, utilities will be located at the side of the road. The work is scheduled for the fall.

New Business

A motion was made and amended to adopt the policy of using ADR (Alternative Dispute Resolution) in certain cases of covenant dispute, the procedures for implementing the policy to be developed by the community manager and approved by the board of directors. It was unanimously accepted.

Screens are the answer

As stated in Part II, section 4 of the Single Family Covenants,

"Each lot owner shall provide a screened area to serve as a service yard and an area in which garbage receptacles, fuel tanks or similar storage receptacles, air conditioning equipment and other unsightly objects must be placed or stored in order to conceal them from view from the road and adjacent properties. Plans for such screened area delineating the size, design, texture, appearance and location must be approved by the Company prior to construction. Garbage receptacles and fuel tanks may be located outside of such screened areas only if located underground."

The requirements for designing a screen as stated in section 9.5 of the Residential Design Standards state: "Required screening of heat pumps, fuel tanks and trash containers may be

finished, or unfinished board fence enclosures, or lattice enclosures, properly supported, level and plumb. Objects shall be screened on all sides with allowance for an opening not visible from the street. Spaces between vertical boards shall be 2 inches maximum. The height of the screening enclosure shall be at least as high as the object screened."

All household garbage should be placed in garbage bags and all bags securely placed inside garbage receptacles. All receptacles should be properly stored in the appropriate screened area.

Garbage bags and garbage receptacles should not be placed at the street, as curbside garbage pickup is not permitted in Brandermill. Recycling bins may be placed at the curb on the morning of pickup and must be collected by evening. All recyclables must be stored in the bin. Bags of newspapers, plastics, and other materials that are not properly contained in the recycling bin are not appropriate. Additional recycling bins may be obtained by contacting your recycling company.

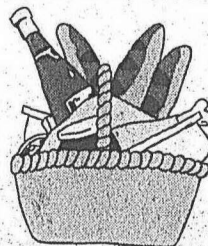

Recycling effort continues in Brandermill

Upon the expiration of its contract with Waste Management, Central Virginia Waste Management Authority awarded a 5-year contract to Tidewater Fibre Corporation beginning July 5 for the curbside collection of recyclables. The corporation is a family owned business and was founded over 80 years ago.

Central Virginia Waste Management Authority was formed in 1991 and Chesterfield County is one of its 13 jurisdictions. There are 66,000 homes in the program in this county and more than 200,000 homes in all the jurisdictions. TFC is contracted to pick up recyclables every other week.

There was a problem with TFC meeting its first collection schedule and representatives from CVWMA and from several jurisdictions met

with TFC representatives in mid-July to look for solutions.

Among the reasons given for the backlog include problems with a software program that provides route information and drivers suffering from heat exhaustion. TFC has pledged additional drivers and vehicles to deal with the challenge.

ARB will spotlight outstanding homes

How much thought do residents give to the exterior appearance of their home and lot? Ask people who are selling their homes and they will likely say - a lot of thought. They may also say that they wish other people in their neighborhood would give more thought to their property. It's easy to think of our home's appearance when we are selling it, but the fact is that we all are "selling" our neighborhoods and the homes in them, everyday. The way each of us treats our home and property on a daily basis affects the appearance of the entire neighborhood. That appearance ultimately has a positive or negative effect on property values.

Brandermill residents look to the BCA to maintain and upgrade the appearance of community and neighborhood entrances, roadsides, and common areas. The BCA is committed to doing this and has implemented many programs to achieve this goal, such as the new neighborhood signs, roadside landscape improvements and improving grounds maintenance.

Brandermill residents also look to the BCA to maintain property values through the use of Design Standards and an Architectural Review process. But these only affect properties when they are improved with new construction or modifications. And they can only establish minimum standards and limits on what we can do or not do.

The most important way that we can maintain property values in Brandermill is for each of us to enhance our own homes and yards. The BCA is instituting a new program created

by Design/Management Associates, Brandermill's architectural review consultants, to recognize homeowners who have set their own high standards in maintaining the appearance of their home and property. Whether by creative design or by excellence in maintenance, these properties set the standard for high quality to which we can all aspire.

Every month, the Architectural Review Board will look at a part of Brandermill, from two to four contiguous neighborhoods, and select one house that best exemplifies the characteristics of creative caring of homeowners who have invested time, effort and money in their property to maximize its aesthetic potential. The selected home will be featured in The Village Mill with a photograph and a short article describing those features that make it exceptional. Residents may find ideas in these homes that can be used to enhance their home. We hope that, over time, the job of selecting a "best" house will become more and more difficult as more homeowners continue to improve their property. The criteria for selection follows; one or more may apply:

Creative design of the house or addition that visually enhances this property and the neighborhood as a whole.

Exceptional use of color and materials that exemplify high standards of appearance and enhances the house.

Exceptional landscaping improvements that enhance the property and the streetscape of the neighborhood.

Good management of existing trees by thinning, pruning, limbing, shaping.

Good management of natural

areas such as clearing of overgrowth, clean maintenance of forest floor, enhancement with undergrowth plants and flowers.

• Addition of new landscaping such as lawns, plants, groundcover, and flower beds that enhance the property.

Exceptional design and organization of other improvements that enhance the property. These can include fences, sheds, decks, patios, gazebos, arbors, etc.

Any property under consideration must also meet some basic criteria. ARB approvals must be on file for the house and any subsequent improvements, and no current covenant violations can be present on the property. The first featured "Brandermill House" will be in the September issue. So go out and take a fresh look at your home from the street. How does it stack up? Does it represent the best that your street has to offer?

She has also been contributing to the Brandermill community in many other ways since she moved here 20 years ago.

Braun says that the early Fourth of July celebrations were more neighborhood oriented and organizations played a larger part in the festivities. Braun remembers the 1982 parade when one neighborhood entered a float titled "Motherhood" and on the flatbed sat all the young pregnant women from McTyre's Cove, some with children playing at their feet. That same year, the Sailing Club entered a float with a truck pulling three flatbeds, and on each one was a full sailboat. The 75 club members appeared at 8 o'clock in the morning when the parade was being organized and had been up all night getting ready. Braun says the early parades attracted more young people and there were

often more than 100 participants on bikes.

Braun describes the fireworks display in the "old days" as "tiny little efforts," and says the fireworks display this year was "unbeatable." She also notes that the parades are bigger every year and the donations from businesses and groups in 1999 were "absolutely outstanding."

Braun is now serving her second year as chair of the Neighborhood Representative Council and says,

"That's a real challenge." She is very proud of the Neighbor Helping Neighbor Committee which was formed this year. The members of this group have helped so many residents; they

have had a phone installed for an elderly homeowner, had the air conditioner repaired for another, and bought stain for a resident who was short of funds. Braun says, "We care for each other and it gives me a very good feeling."

Braun was also elected to the BCA Board of Directors. She served two two-year terms and she says she learned so much about community relations and though the position was very demanding, she was happy to do the work.

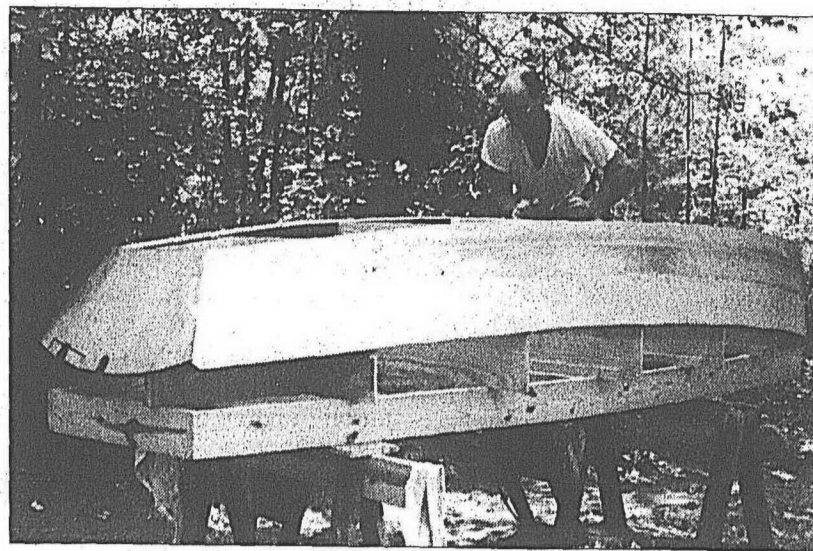
Several years ago, Braun was on the committee that started the Woman's Chapter of the Junior Chamber of Commerce and then served as its first president.

Currently, Braun in addition to the demands of chairing the NRC, has been serving on the BCA Covenant Committee. The committee meets every third Thursday with Seth McMillan, head of Community Standards, to discuss problems and violations. Braun says the NRC can frequently help in a situation.

It is obvious that Braun is not busy just when July Fourth is imminent. She is a caring and productive individual and her efforts are always directed toward helping her community and her community is grateful.

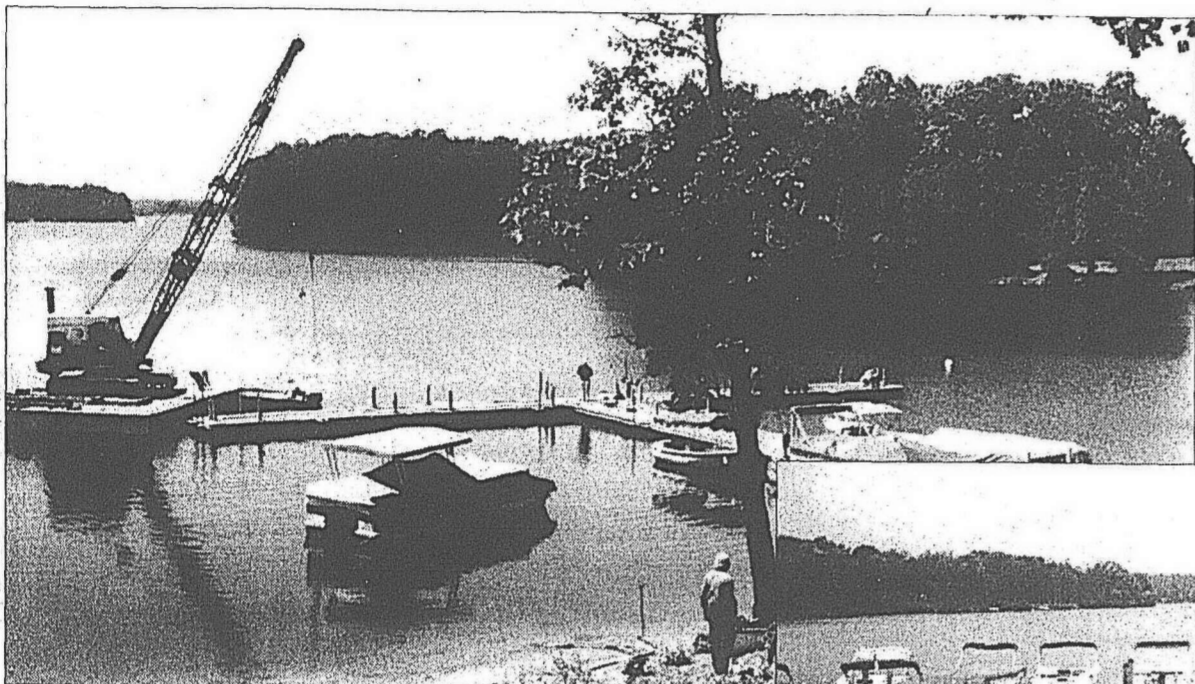

Fiona Strohecker helps "Bless the Children"

When Fiona Strohecker of Two Notch Court read about the devastation created by Hurricane Mitch in the fall of 1998, her heart went out to the victims in Honduras. She had read the article in the Richmond paper about George Mealer, a former Chesterfield County resident who had just retired to Honduras and was e-mailing information to a Richmond Times-Dispatch reporter. He wrote that the people had lost everything and children were eating one meal a day.

A year before the hurricane hit, Mealer had joined forces with Karen Hubbard to form Bless the Children of Honduras, a nonprofit humanitarian organization which is a branch of Bless the Children, Inc. founded by Hubbard in 1993 to aid orphans in Eastern Europe.

Strohecker thought, "What can I do? Maybe I can help." She and her 10-year old daughter Jasmine began going through their clothes and possessions, "anything that would be of help." She remembered finding a brand new battery operated radio on the top shelf of a closet and thinking, "we have so much." They gathered together clothing, medicine and food and the three Strohecker women - Fiona, Jasmine and 2-week-old baby Michelle drove to the Bless the Children collection center. They met director/founder Karen Hubbard and Jasmine wanted to stay and help. That's what they did that day and many others. When they weren't at the collection center - which was sometimes difficult to manage with baby Michelle - the women kept in touch

by phone.

One day in March, Hubbard called to say that someone from Portsmouth Naval Hospital wanted to donate all their medical equipment to Bless the Children but a form had to be filed with the USAID along with a copy of its tax return. Hubbard was frantic. She could not afford an accountant. Strohecker told Hubbard she was a CPA and offered to do all the necessary paper work. She completed the required forms and faxed them in a very short time. Everything was approved by USAID and in mid-June, 23 tractor trailer loads of hospital equipment and supplies were shipped to Honduras.

Now Strohecker does paper work for Bless the Children on a regular basis. "I work when and where I'm needed."

Strohecker says sometimes things work out in an unexpected way. She says, "I had gone back to graduate school to get a masters degree in counseling, but my work as a CPA did more good than I could ever have dreamed." Strohecker has been asked to become a board member and treasurer of Bless the Children.

Volunteers of Bless the Children ship only to the "poorest of the poor" areas around the world where no other aid is being received. There is a continuing process to organize medical supplies, food, toys and clothing to be distributed to areas where the needs are the greatest. Financial donations are always needed. Tips on safe sunglasses

Finding a pair of non-prescription sunglasses that provide good protection from the sun and comfortable vision is difficult today.

Part of the problem, says the American Optometric Association, is the lack of uniform labeling with regard to ultraviolet (UV) protection. Studies have found many of the labels are misleading.

Another difficulty for consumers is judging lens quality. Price is no gauge. Some inexpensive sunglasses have quality lenses, while some higher priced ones may have poor quality lenses and inexpensive frames.

According to the association, consumers need sunglass lenses that:

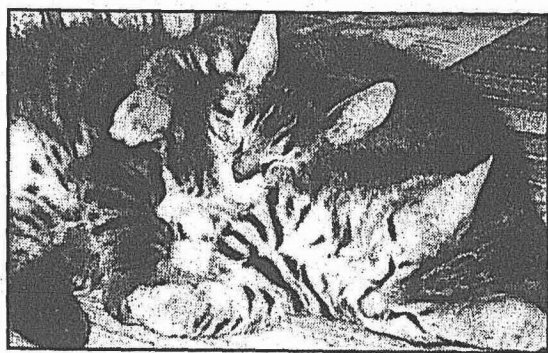
- block 99-100 percent of UV-A and UV-B, which can cause cataracts; retinal problems, such as macular degeneration; benign growths on the eye's surface; cancer of the eyelids and skin around the eyes; and photo-keratitis, sometimes called snow blindness, which is a temporary but painful sunburn of the eye's surface;
- screen out 75 to 90 percent of visible light;
- are perfectly matched in color and absorption and free of distortion and imperfection. The best lens color choices are gray, which does not modify colors, green or brown. Wrap-around frames provide added UV protection for bright environments. Wearing a wide-brimmed hat or cap in addition to sunglasses also provides more UV protection and can help cut brightness and glare.

Brandermill residents love to harmonize

One of the sweetest things in life is music. Whatever the style — rock and roll, jazz, rhythm and blues, or pop — music brings joy to people every day, everywhere. For Bob Monk of Fox Chase, singing is a gift he has embraced since childhood. Together with Brandermill residents Rich Montgomery of Shallowford Trace, Warren Strandburg of Northwick, Dave Barbour of Long Hill, Charlie Bechtler of Thornridge, and Chris Bechtler of Walnut Creek, Monk sings with The Virginians, a barbershop chorus comprised of more than 95 talented singers in the Richmond metropolitan area.

Anyone thinking this gig singing 4-part harmony might be easy, think again.

"What is unique about our chorus is that we sing barbershop acapella — without music — and that's hard, especially with this many singers," Monk said. The chorus practices every Tuesday at Derbyshire Baptist Church in Richmond, and the hours spent perfecting every chord are numerous. "Our music director asks us to practice until it is perfect, not only the music but the show's choreography and staging as well. Rarely at practice do we ever sing a whole song through," he said.

Strandburg described barbershop singing as an indigenous American folk art. "Nowhere else can you find this kind of incredible harmony," Strandburg said, adding that a good voice alone doesn't necessarily mean a person can sing barbershop.

Each year, The Virginians present spring and Christmas concerts. Joining the chorus at this year's Christmas show scheduled to be held December 12 at the Landmark Theater will be the Richmond Symphony. In addition,

several free concerts are planned, including a concert at Pocahontas State Park on August 14 at 7:30.

According to Monk, The Virginians compete annually against other barbershop choruses. At the competition, each chorus represented sings two songs, usually a ballad and an "up" tune.

"When we sing in October, we will be wearing clothes that reflect the Depression," explained Monk, who manages to look dapper even with bare feet, old pants, and tattered suspenders.

In addition to singing in The Virginians chorus, Strandburg also sings with the group's barbershop quartet, "City Slickers." Strandburg was a double winner at the division compe-

tion last May, since both groups took home the top prize.

"Singing barbershop is truly a team sport," said Strandburg. "You cannot do it alone and you learn to depend on your singing partners. I joined the chorus because I was looking for a hobby separate from my family and friends. I wanted to find something with a craftlike quality. What I found was a unique organization that brings men of all ages and backgrounds together to make beautiful sounds."

Strandburg's sense of kinship with the men in the chorus is shared by all of the singers. "We have a fantastic group, and I get such great enjoyment from both the singing and the fellowship. When we compete, we have a reason to bond as a unit, and I think we all have a lot of fun," said Monk.

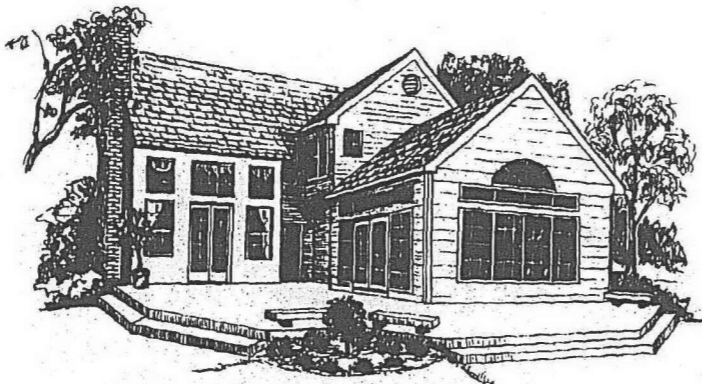

Fire! Joshua Reaves stays cool

He might only be 10 years old, but Joshua Reaves of Sandybrook has proven that he can handle an emergency situation with a calm, cool head. Fire safety drills practiced at home came in handy in June when Joshua smelled smoke while upstairs in his room at home. Joshua's grandmother, Carolyn Rennahan, had left Joshua at home while she made a quick trip to the store and a pot was left simmering on the stove.

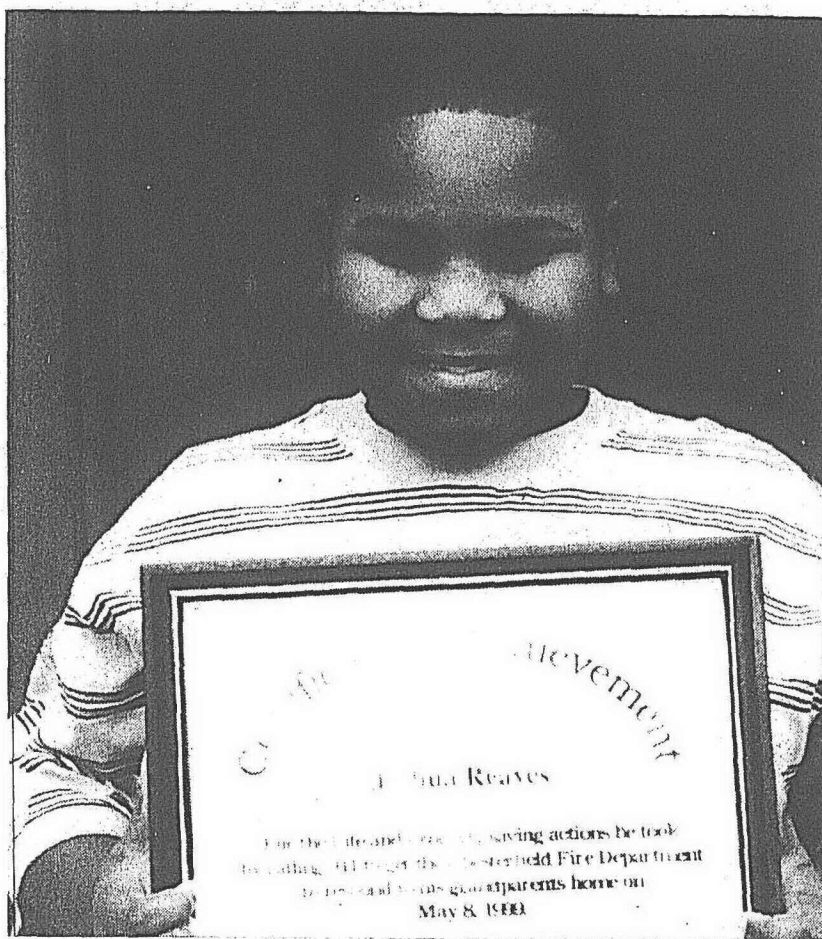
"Thank goodness we had practiced fire drills before," said Rennahan. "We have told Joshua how important it is to get out of the house. Instead of panicking, he did all the right things."

Joshua, remaining calm, grabbed the telephone and ran outside the house to call 911. He remained outside until the Chesterfield County Fire Department arrived at the scene.

"I was just so glad to see Joshua standing outside of the house," said Rene upon returning home to find fire engines and emergency vehicles at her doorstep. "I am a proud grandmother." The home sustained only minor smoke damage because of Joshua's quick thinking.

The Chesterfield County Fire Department is proud of Joshua's actions that day too. The department presented Joshua with a certificate of achievement for following the rules of fire safety.

and I knew that I had to get out of the house and call 911. Five minutes later, the fire engines came," said Joshua.

What to do about those pests

Summer plantings are beautiful this time of year. However, pests also enjoy the flowers. The succulent new growth that plants push out is the perfect energy source for many plant feeding insects and mites. A brief look at some of them and management techniques are given below.

Aphids

Aphids are one of the most common landscape insects that feed on plants. These small, green colored insects will quickly colonize the new growth of many different types of plants. Aphids will feed on a wide variety of plants, but prefer anything in the rose family, including all types of roses, spirea, photinia, crabapples, and cherries, along with certain annuals and perennials. Although this pest is often found on plants, it rarely needs to be sprayed. Aphids are a favorite food for numerous beneficial insects, which if given the time and not killed by pesticides, will generally reduce the population to manageable levels.

Tent Caterpillars

The larvae of this moth is commonly found feeding on ornamental cherries, plum and crabapples. They build a web in the branch crotch, where they spend most of the time during the day. In the evening they

crawl out and feed on new leaves, eventually going back into the web by morning.

Although large populations can defoliate a tree, rarely does this cause any permanent damage and the plant will send out a second growth of leaves. This insect is easily managed with a biorational pesticide such as B.t. (*Bacillus thuringiensis*), a naturally occurring bacteria that will only harm caterpillars without effecting the beneficial insects or the environment.

Lacebugs

These leaf sucking insect pests cause considerable damage to some of our favorite landscape ornamentals. This includes azalea, Japanese pieris, rhododendron, cotoneaster and hawthorn.

Since this insect feeds by remov-

ing the juices from the leaves, damage is usually seen by a mottled discoloration on the leaves that will look whitish or off-color. This pest is easily managed with a systemic spray (Orthene) on the leaves which, when taken in by the leaves will only harm those insects or organisms that feed on the leaves, leaving anything else that crosses the leaves unharmed.

A few other pests to watch for these next two months include spider mites on euonymus and pines, gypsy moths on oaks, plant bug on honeylocust, leafminers on boxwood, scale on evergreen euonymus and the dogwood borer on our native dogwood. Pests should only be managed when they are found to be doing damage to the plant, and only those plants which are infested need to be sprayed.

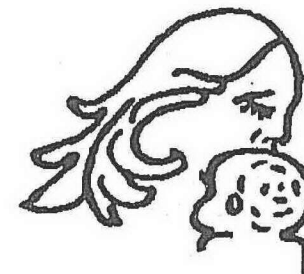

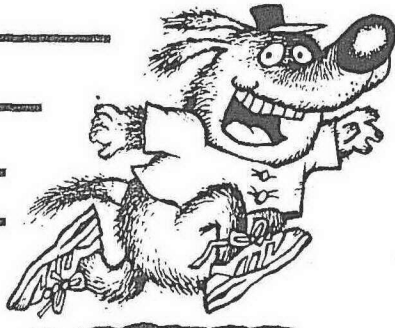

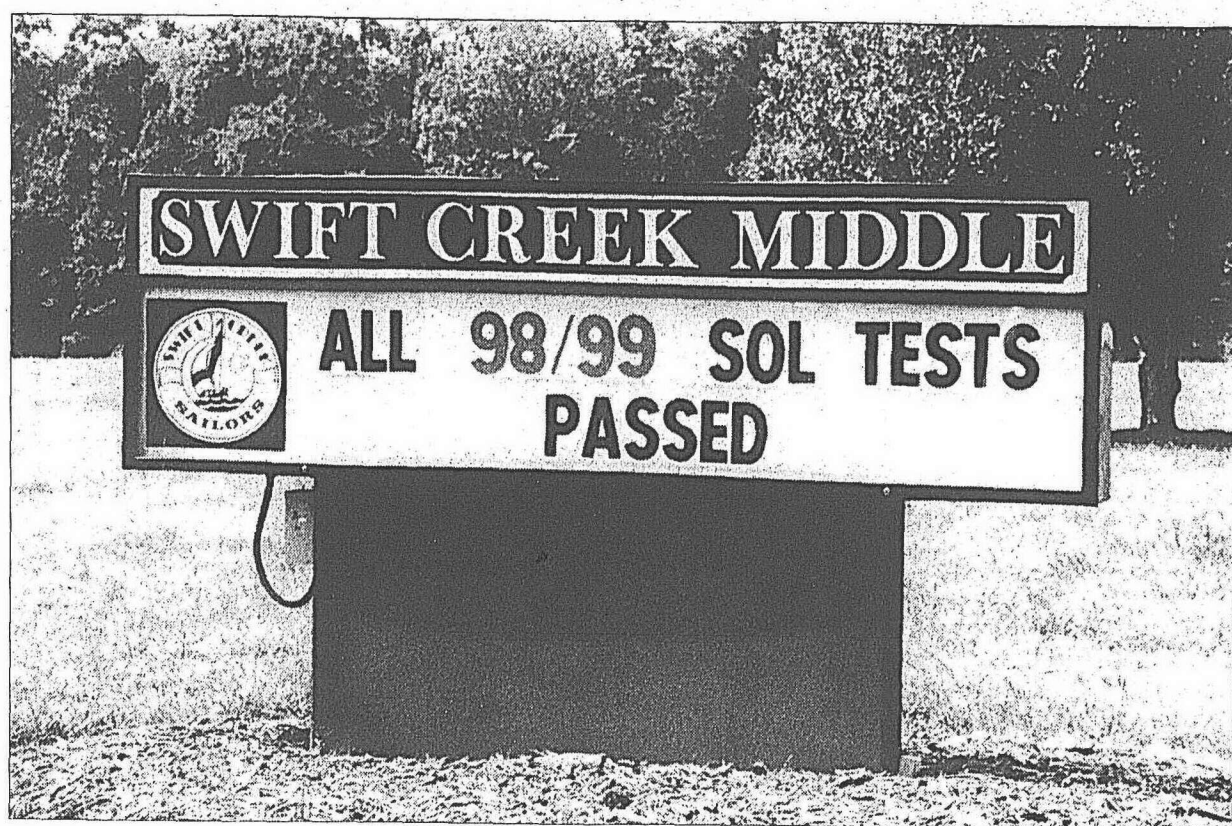

SCMS students do well in Standards of Learning tests.

Students and teachers at Swift Creek Middle School can take a bow. Despite headlines announcing dismal results of the 1998-1999 Standards of Learning tests, SCMS eighth-grade

students passed all of the exams in the four core subjects: math, science, English, and social studies. In addition, students received passing scores in algebra, geometry, writing and technology.

According to SCMS Principal Thornton Carter, students showed im-

provement from last year's scores in all of the core subjects.

Test results showed that SCMS was one of 16 out of 56 schools in Chesterfield County to pass the standardized tests. "We improved our scores in seven of the eight tests administered and social studies scores showed a



marked 50 percent improvement over last year's tests scores," he said. The SOL tests for third-, fifth-and-eighth grades eventually will determine who graduates from high school and which schools remain accredited.

Last year was the first year the tests were given and only 2.2 percent of schools across the state met the accreditation requirement. SCMS received passing scores last year as well as this year.

"I am extremely proud of our students and teachers," said Carter. "In English, 87 percent of our eighth-grade students passed; in math, 84 percent passed; in social studies, 75 percent passed; in science, 93 percent passed; and in technology, 90 percent passed."
