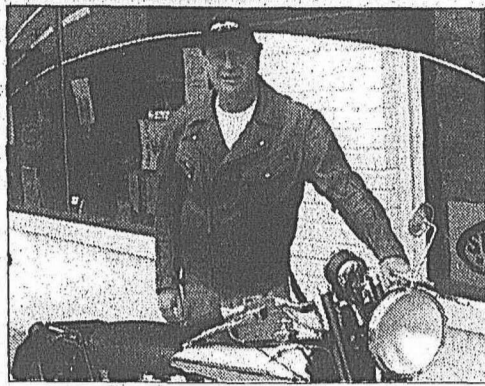

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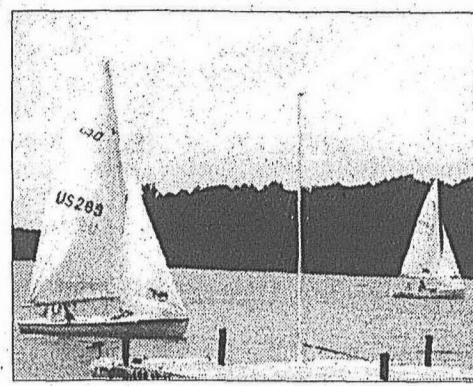
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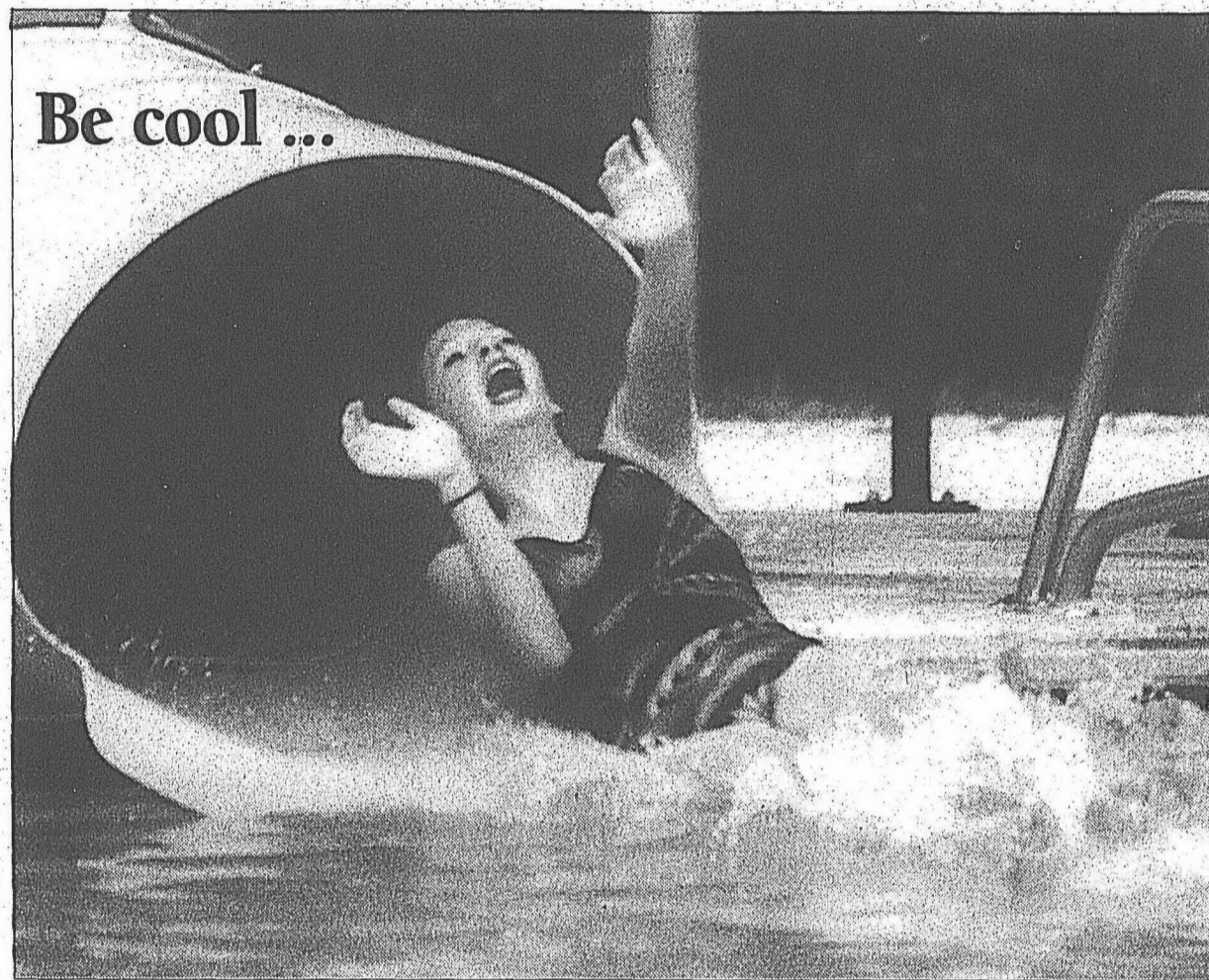


Rachel Gale has a clean sweep at the Davenport City Tournament.

Alexandra Kosakowski of Deer Meadow makes a splash while celebrating Community Pool Day at St. Ledger's pool. (See related stories on page 5.)

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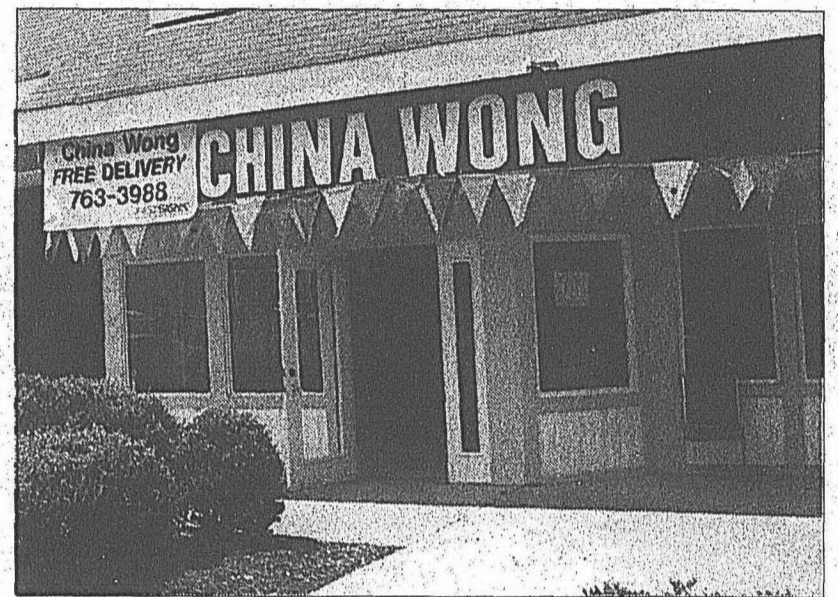


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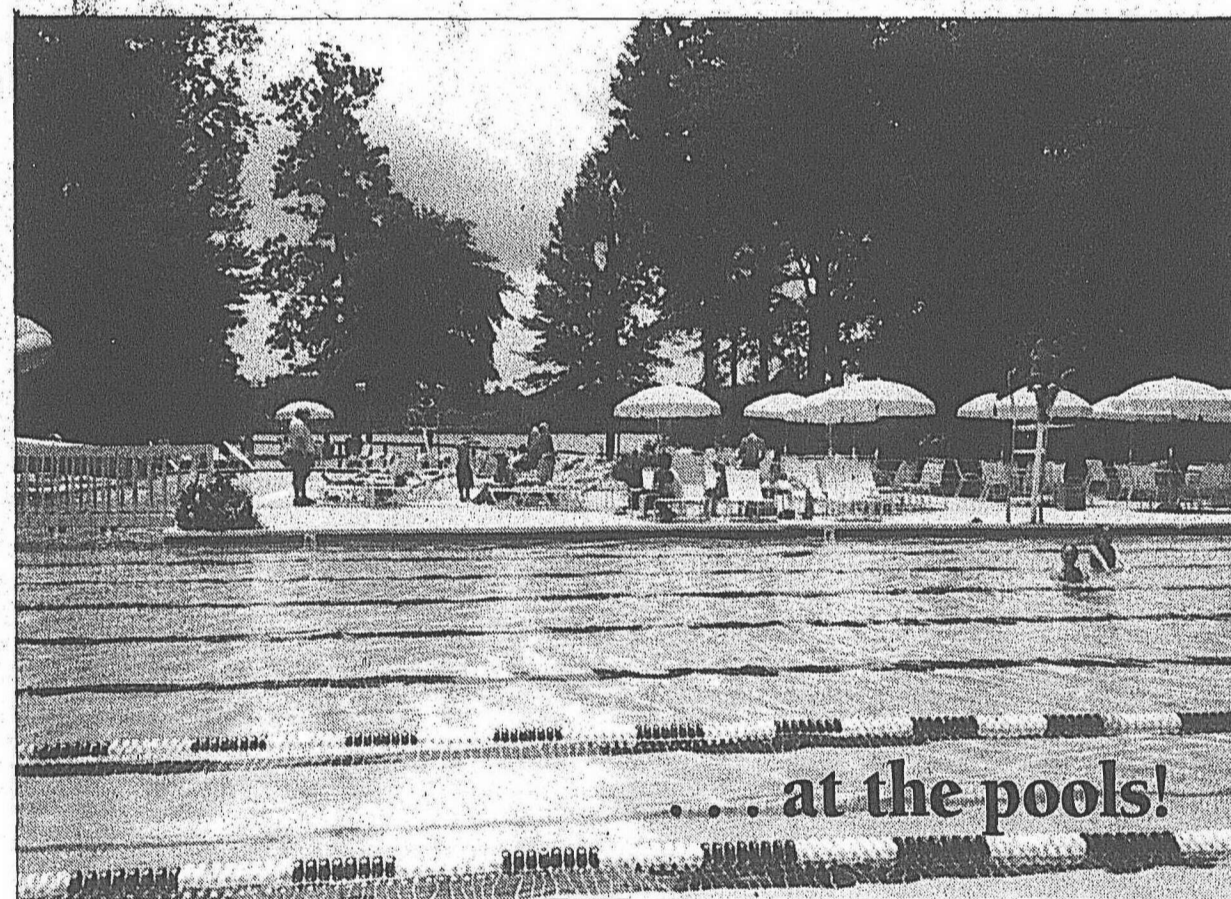

Leaves + standing water = mosquitoes

Some people are never happy. Last summer, watering restrictions were in place and people all over the Commonwealth were praying for rain. Now, after weeks of continual soggy weather, people are complaining about standing water.

Community Manager Mike Divita says, "After three years of drought, the BCA is being bombarded by calls from residents regarding drainage problems." Divita says Operations Manager Jane Pritz and Maintenance Director John Barnard respond as soon as they can, yet some areas are beyond the capabilities the maintenance department.

Divita says the Virginia Department of Transportation has been contacted for assistance in widening some drainage ditches in the community. Chief problem areas are in Planter's Woods and in Harbour Pointe. He explains that the BCA can handle some clogged culverts but the scope of the

problem is huge. "We have 30 years of leaves accumulating in Brandermill," Divita says, "and much of the problem is caused by property owners placing leaves in ditches."

Divita encourages residents to help clear clogged areas and reminds property owners to properly dispose of leaves at the landfill.

West Nile Virus
Standing water means a playground for mosquitoes. The Virginia Department of Health (VDH) offers advice for people to reduce their chances of being infected with the West Nile virus (WNV). The virus is spread by the bite of infected mosquitoes and usually causes a mild illness in humans, but may also cause encephalitis (inflammation of the brain), meningitis (inflammation of the lining of the brain and spinal cord) or polio-like paralysis.

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- Remove leaves and debris from yards.
- Turn over or remove containers in your yard where water collects, such as old tires, potted plant trays, buckets and toys.
- Eliminate standing water on tarps or flat roofs.
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VDH is asking residents to report dead crows, blue jays and birds of prey (hawks, owls, etc.) to their local health departments this year.

Treasurer expresses concern over budget

The following minutes are a summary and have not been approved. Complete official minutes are available at the BCA office.

The May 19, 2003 meeting of the Brandermill Community Association Board of Directors was held at Brandermill Woods. Directors Hughes, Giordano, Livingston, Martin, Mast, Moldof, Rayfield and Community Manager Divita were present.

President's Report

President Moldof and Director Hughes attended a meeting of the Learning in Retirement Institute. The institute is co-sponsored by the Brandermill Woods Foundation and would offer classes to senior citizens. The directors felt the community would benefit the residents and enhance property values.

Treasurer's Report

Director Livingston went over the first quarter financial report and discussed the shortfall in expected revenues from the pools. Noting that members are continuing to sign up, he expressed his concern about the overall budget. Community Manager Divita stated that the pool membership numbers would most likely exceed last year's numbers but was unsure of whether the projected membership number would be reached. As of March 31, 160 additional members are needed to meet projected revenues based on the budget. Community Manager Divita explained that the

FY'03 budget as approved by the board was based on operating two pools, Harbour Pointe and St. Ledger's. This changed when it was decided that the third pool, North Beach, be opened this year and the impact on the operating budget will be substantial. Where the original FY'03 budget had the pools generating an excess of about \$42,000, the addition of the third pool has had an understandably negative effect on the pool departmental budget and this in turn will reduce the amount of funds to be contributed to the reserve fund.

Director Livingston stated the board should have consulted with the finance committee before making the decision to open the third pool in order to understand the impact on the full budget. The finance policy states that the board should consult with the finance committee on decisions that have a major impact on the budget.

Committee Reports Activities

President Moldof reported that the Silent Movie and Jazz event is scheduled for May 20. Free popcorn will be served. There has been a good response from participants wanting to be in the Fourth of July festivities. Approximately 100 people participated in the Volksmarch. Next year the event will be for Brandermill residents.

Pool Committee

Director Rayfield said that as of May 19 there are 441 members and

he expects more people to join after the pools open. Membership usually tapers off around mid-June. Landscaping

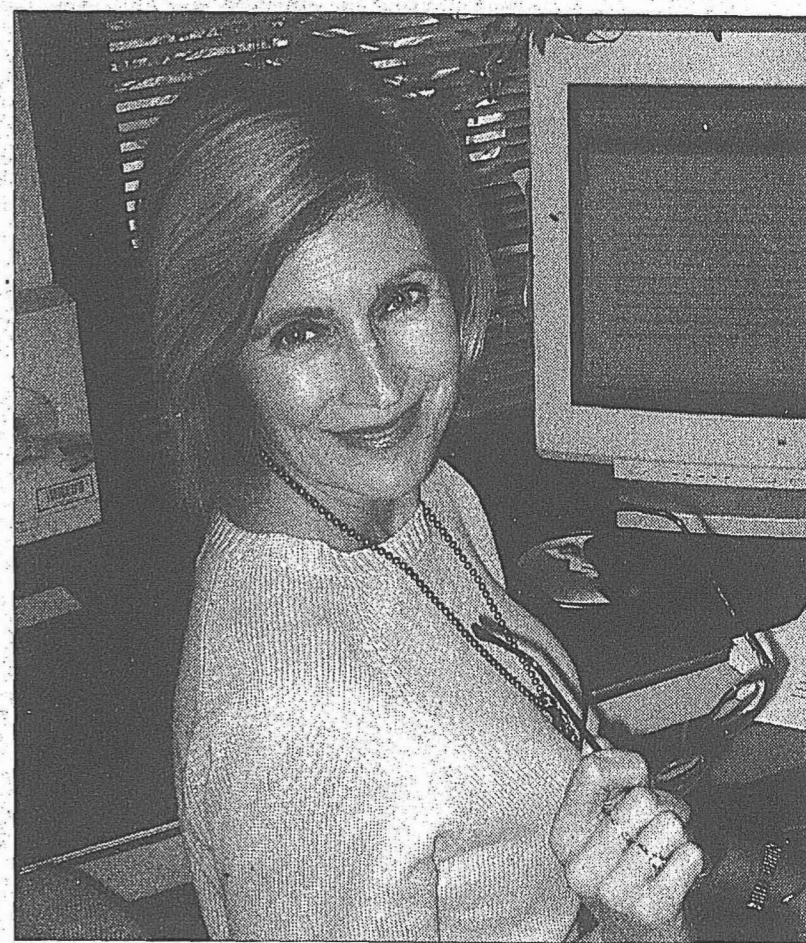
Community Manager Divita said the spring planting of annuals is in progress and will be completed soon.

Is it a driveway or a driving range?

A well-maintained driveway is an asset to any home. Lately, some driveways in the community look more like lawns than attractive entranceways to properties.

In Brandermill, driveways may be hard surfaces such as asphalt, brick pavers, aggregate, or concrete. Such driveways require little maintenance

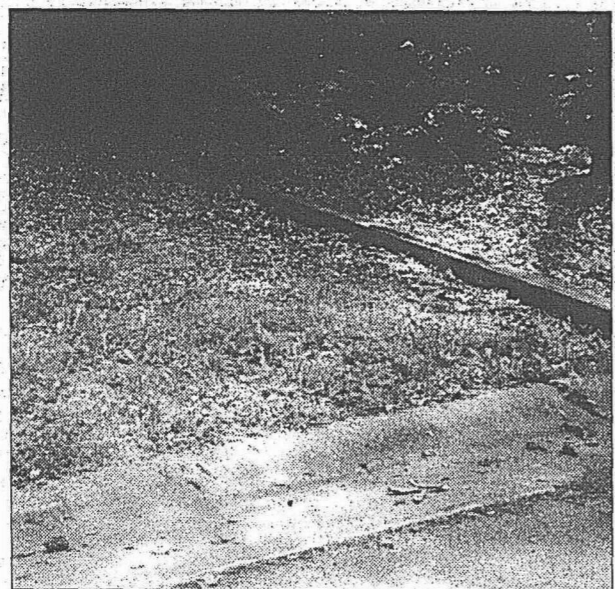

other than clearing leaves and pine needles and repairing occasional cracks. Proponents of gravel driveways believe they are more environmentally friendly since they reduce runoff into the reservoir. Without proper maintenance and upkeep, however, a gravel driveway can become unsightly. Gravel driveways should be maintained in such a way that landscaped areas and parking areas are clearly defined and recognizable. Although these areas may have been defined when the driveway was new, mulch and gravel tend to blend together through the years. Landscape timbers are an inexpensive way to con-

tain and line a gravel driveway. Other residents prefer to use plants or any of the stone edgings currently available. Edging is not required, however, as long as there is a clear definition on all sides and along the entire length of the driveway.

In addition, potholes may develop and cause dirt to rise to the surface, indicating that new gravel needs to be added. And during the spring and summer months, gravel driveways can look more like yards when stubborn weeds and grass proliferate. The growth must be pulled by hand or eradicated with an environmentally safe spray.

BCA rental boats are polished and ready to go

The Fleet is In

The Brandermill Sailing Center in Sunday Park is open for the season. The boats have been scrubbed; the decks have been hosed down fore and aft, and the batteries are charged.

The sailing center is open Thursday through Sunday from 1 p.m. to 7 p.m. until the second week in September. Canoes, two-man kayaks, jon boats with and without motors, pedal boats and three kinds of sailboats can be rented. Rentals include all equipment and life jackets.

The rental rate for all boats is \$10 per hour with a two-hour minimum for all boats except the pedal boats. Electric motors are available for the jon boats for an additional \$5 per hour with a two-hour minimum.

To rent a boat, you must be a resident and at least 18 years of age. Brochures on the boat rental program and boating rules are available at the BCA office and at the sailing center.

Guest Rentals & Day Passes

The sailing center and Sunday Park are for the enjoyment of Brandermill residents and their accompanying guests.

Guests may also use the launching facilities at Sunday Park and at The Landing. Residents and guests who launch boats from trailers in Sunday Park must park their trailers in the overflow parking lot.

Day passes for guests may be ob-

tained at the BCA office during the week and at the sailing center during hours of operation. The resident sponsor must be present to obtain a day pass. Weekly or seasonal passes are not available for guests.

Guest boat rentals are available at the sailing center. The sponsoring resident must be present to sign the rental agreement. A written note or telephone call is not sufficient since the resident must accept, in writing, responsibility for the equipment and the safety and behavior of the guests.

It's Sticker Time Again

All resident boat owners who store boats or launch their boats from BCA property should have paid their yearly fee by now and received their 2003 registration stickers.

If you have not done so, please contact Community Services Director Dena Sindelar at 744-1035x104.

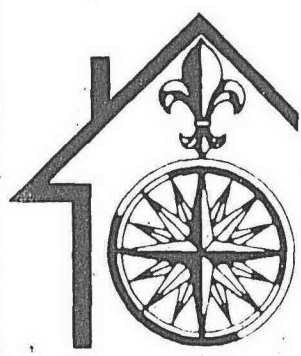

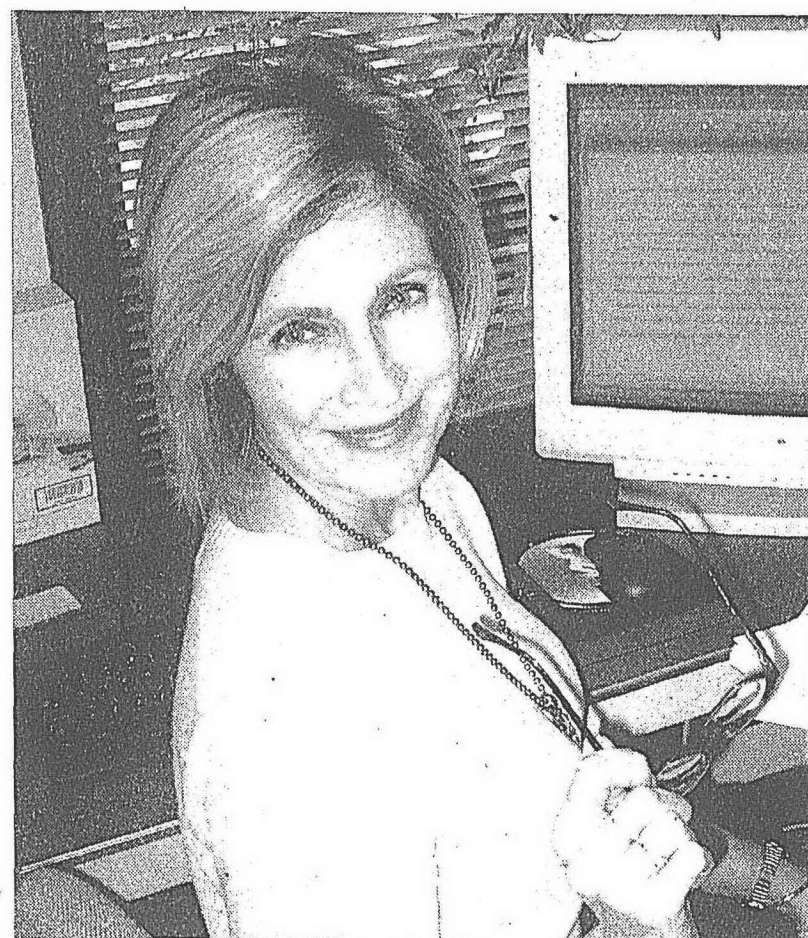

Is it a driveway or a driving range?

A well-maintained driveway is an asset to any home. Lately, some driveways in the community look more like lawns than attractive entrances to properties.

In Brandermill, driveways may be hard surfaces such as asphalt, brick pavers, aggregate, or concrete. Such driveways require little maintenance

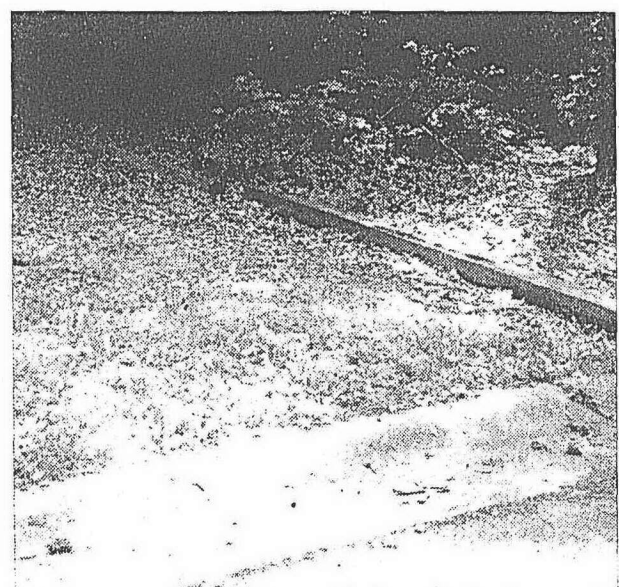

other than clearing leaves and pine needles and repairing occasional cracks. Proponents of gravel driveways believe they are more environmentally friendly since they reduce runoff into the reservoir. Without proper maintenance and upkeep, however, a gravel driveway can become unsightly. Gravel driveways should be maintained in such a way that landscaped areas and parking areas are clearly defined and recognizable. Although these areas may have been defined when the driveway was new, mulch and gravel tend to blend together through the years. Landscape timbers are an inexpensive way to con-

tain and line a gravel driveway. Other residents prefer to use plants or any of the stone edgings currently available. Edging is not required, however, as long as there is a clear definition on all sides and along the entire length of the driveway.

In addition, potholes may develop and cause dirt to rise to the surface, indicating that new gravel needs to be added. And during the spring and summer months, gravel driveways can look more like yards when stubborn weeds and grass proliferate. The growth must be pulled by hand or eradicated with an environmentally safe spray.

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Madeline's House provides shelter for abuse victims

One of the charities dearest to the Brandermill Woman's Club members' hearts is Madeline's House, a non-profit emergency shelter for women and children victims of domestic violence and sexual assault. "Each fall we choose seven to nine charities that we want to sponsor," says Karen Murphy, chairperson of BWC Community Services. "We raise funds through raffles, a fashion show, and an in-house jewelry sale, where members donate their own and buy one another's jewelry." Murphy adds that the necessity for Madeline's House touched BWC members deeply. "Sometimes women arrive at Madeline's House with nothing but the clothes on their backs," says Murphy. "Madeline's House is special, and we want to do all we can to get the word out."

Madeline's House provides temporary emergency shelter for women and their children who flee life-threatening situations in their own homes. The average stay for these victims is six to eight weeks. During this time, they have an opportunity to heal and begin the process of putting their lives back together again. "Madeline's House provides gift certificates so that the women can buy clothing and other necessities," Murphy states. "Phone cards are also provided so they can

anonymously contact family and friends." Some of the services provided by Madeline's House include: counseling and support; assistance with local housing or relocation; transportation to and from job interviews, appointments and court hearings; community referrals; and aftercare follow-up.

Madeline's House was founded in 1999. It is dedicated to a Virginia woman who was murdered by her husband in September 1998. After the system that was supposed to protect her failed to do so, Madeline's husband shot her, then turned the gun on himself. The murder-suicide orphaned Madeline's two little girls.

Operating from an undisclosed Virginia location, Madeline's House opened its doors in July 1999, and to date has provided emergency shelter and care for over 500 victims of domestic violence and sexual abuse. The goal of Madeline's House is to break the cycle of violence by helping women and children break free and move on to start new lives.

According to statistics, in the next 60 seconds across the nation, 78 women will be raped; 240 women will be battered; and 360 new cases of child

abuse and neglect; and 84 new cases of stalking will be reported.

The women who have been cared for by Madeline's House come from all over Virginia and the United States. Right now, there are 33 beds, and sometimes women have to be turned away. There are plans for expansion so that there never has to be another tragedy such as Madeline's, but building an addition to the existing structure is costly.

Sylvia Stewart, the Richmond representative for Madeline's House, explains "A large number, (56 percent) of the total number of victims needing shelter, have to be turned away. There is only one domestic violence program for every 2,170 battered women, yet there are three animal shelters in this country for every woman's shelter."

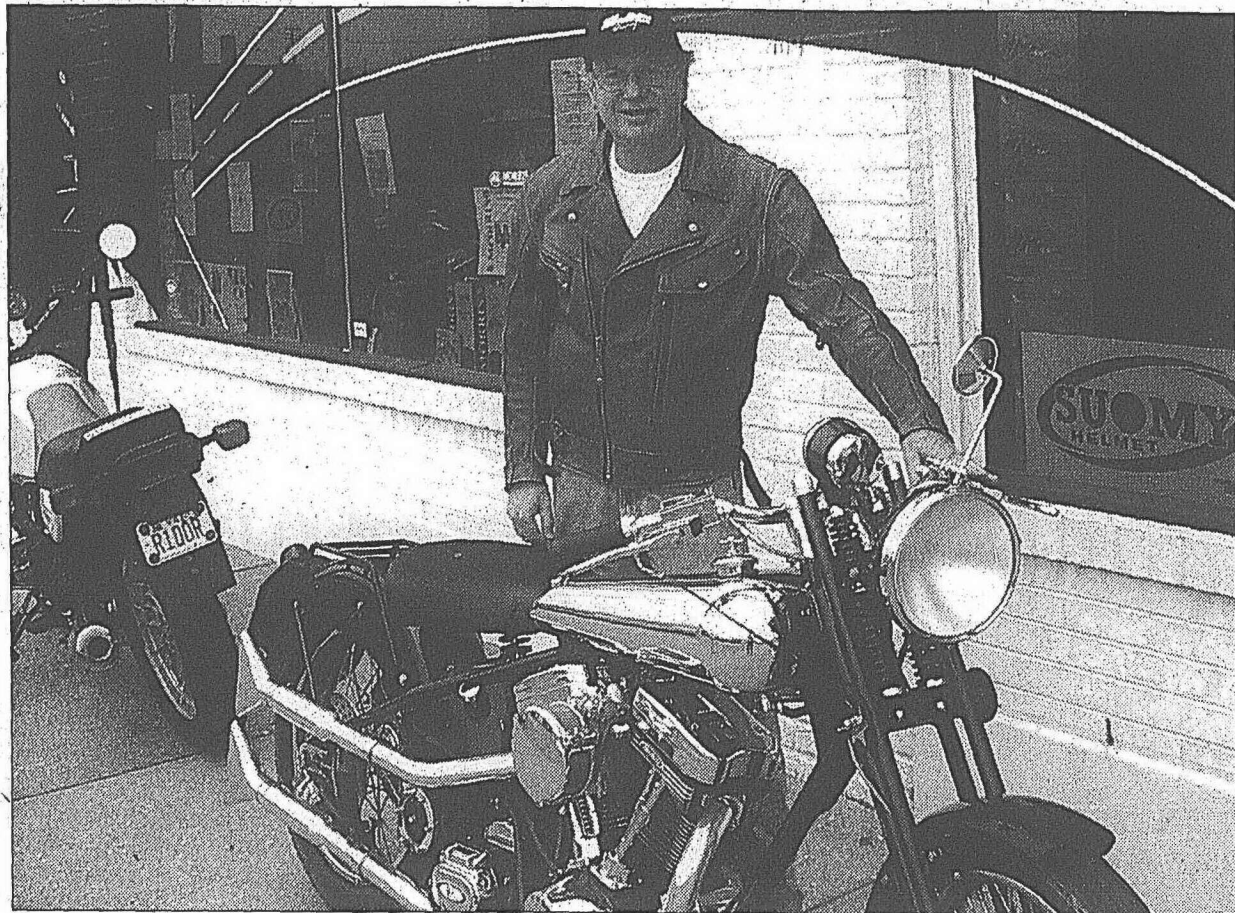

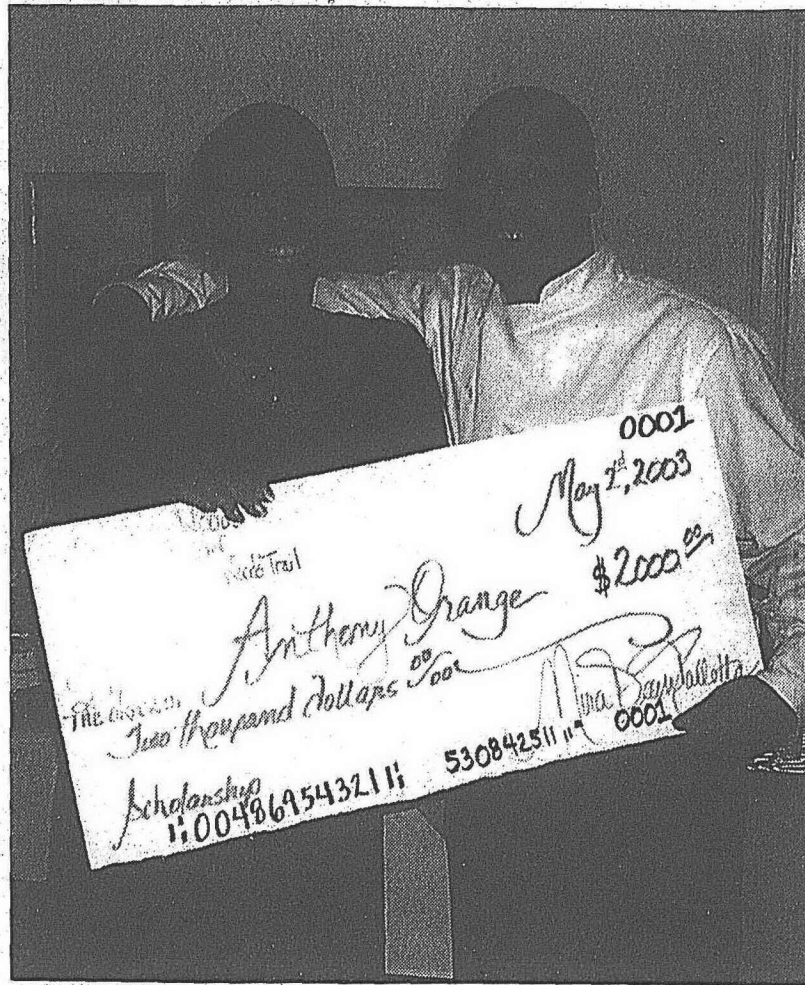
Brandermill Woods Retirement Community held its second annual Casino Night on May 2.

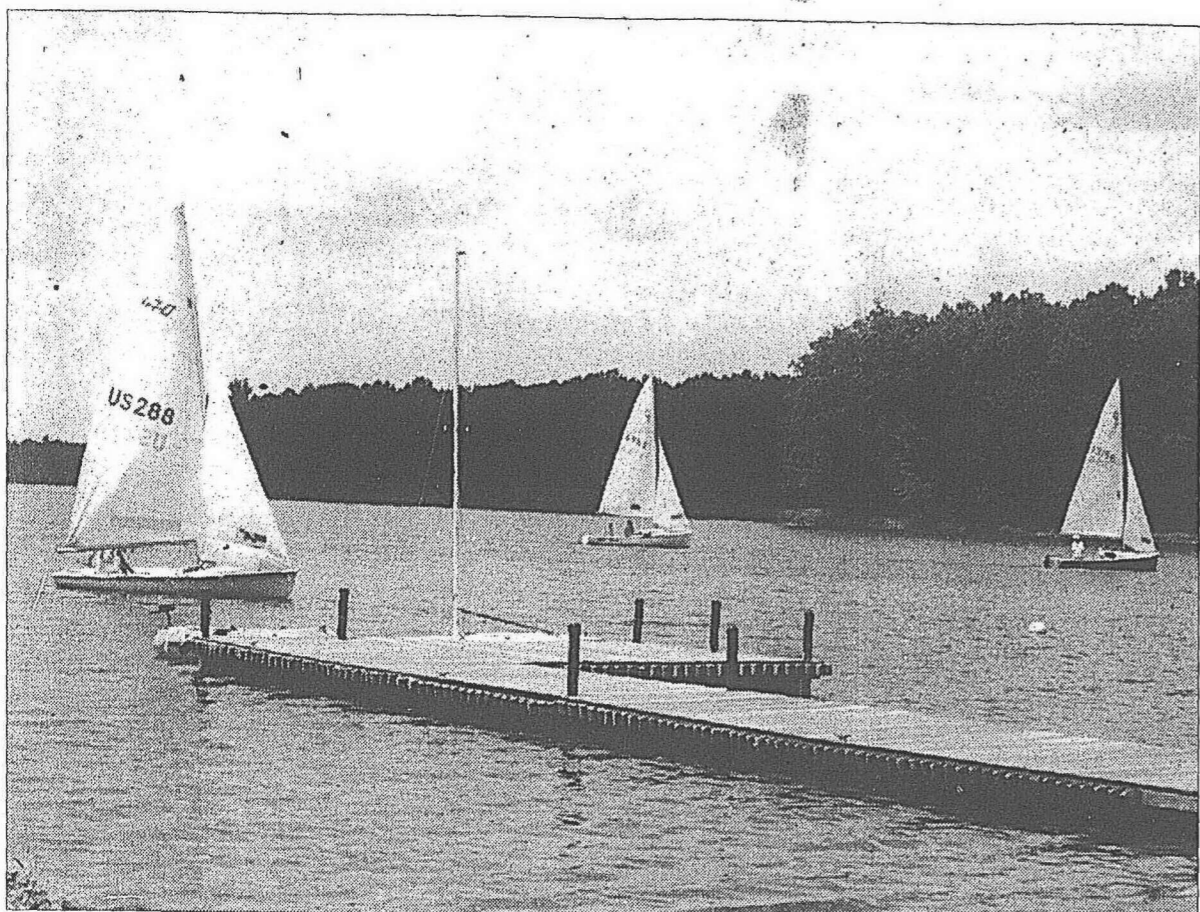

Wearing life jackets while boating could prevent a tragedy

The main cause of small-boat fatalities is capsizing and falls overboard. The majority of these deaths are preventable if boaters wear personal flotation devices (PFDs). Life jackets today are attractive in appearance and comfortable to wear. When properly fitted, a PFD could prevent a tragedy for both the wearer and the wearer's family.

Most boaters believe that a life jacket close at hand is all the protection they need in case of emergency. If something happens, such as a capsizing, people think they will save themselves by putting on devices once in the water. Doing so is not easy and requires practice, skill and dexterity. The best precaution is to wear your life jacket before you end up in the water.

Remain cool around aggressive drivers

Aggressive drivers, those who operate a motor vehicle in a manner that endangers persons or property, are becoming more common on congested roadways. To help fight this problem, the Virginia General Assembly passed an aggressive driving law.

The law defines aggressive driving as committing one or more traffic violations such as following too closely; failure to observe traffic lanes; and stopping on roads with the intent to harass or intimidate other people. The law makes aggressive driving a Class 2 misdemeanor. Aggressive driving with the intent to injure another person is a Class 1 misdemeanor.

Aggressive driving includes speeding; tailgating; failure to yield the right of way; improper lane changes; and running red lights. To avoid conflict with other drivers, see DMV advice at right.

How to Deal with Road Rage

- Don't take other drivers' errors personally.
- Drive in a courteous and considerate manner.
- Plan your route in advance.
- Make a conscious decision not to take your problems with you when you get on the road.
- Keep a safe distance from other vehicles and obey speed limits.
- Avoid eye contact and listen to relaxing music.
- Ignore gestures and drive to the nearest police station if you are being followed.
- Leave the passing lane clear if not passing.

To report an aggressive driver, dial #77 on cellular phones to reach the Virginia State Police.

Callers should be prepared to give a description of the situation as well as the location, direction of travel, vehicle description and license plate number.

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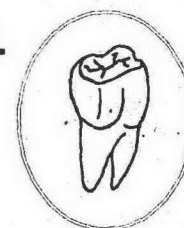
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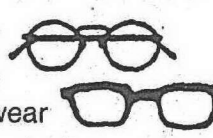


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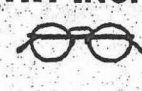
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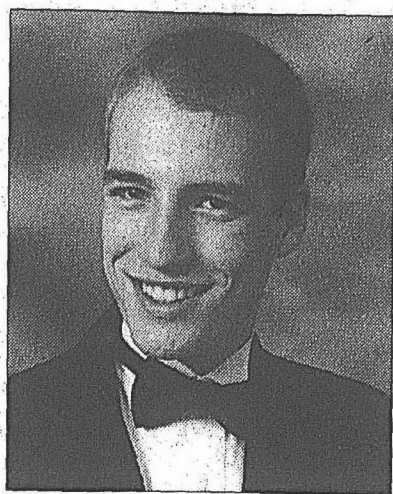
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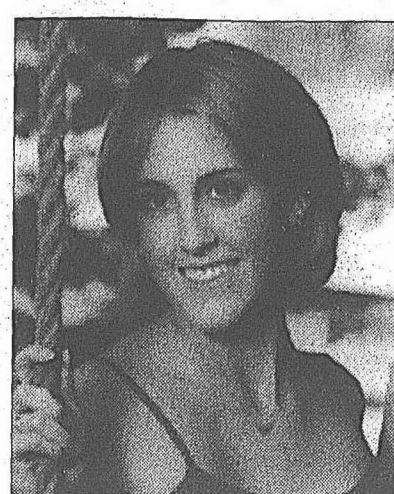

Seniors experience joy and sadness in final class activities

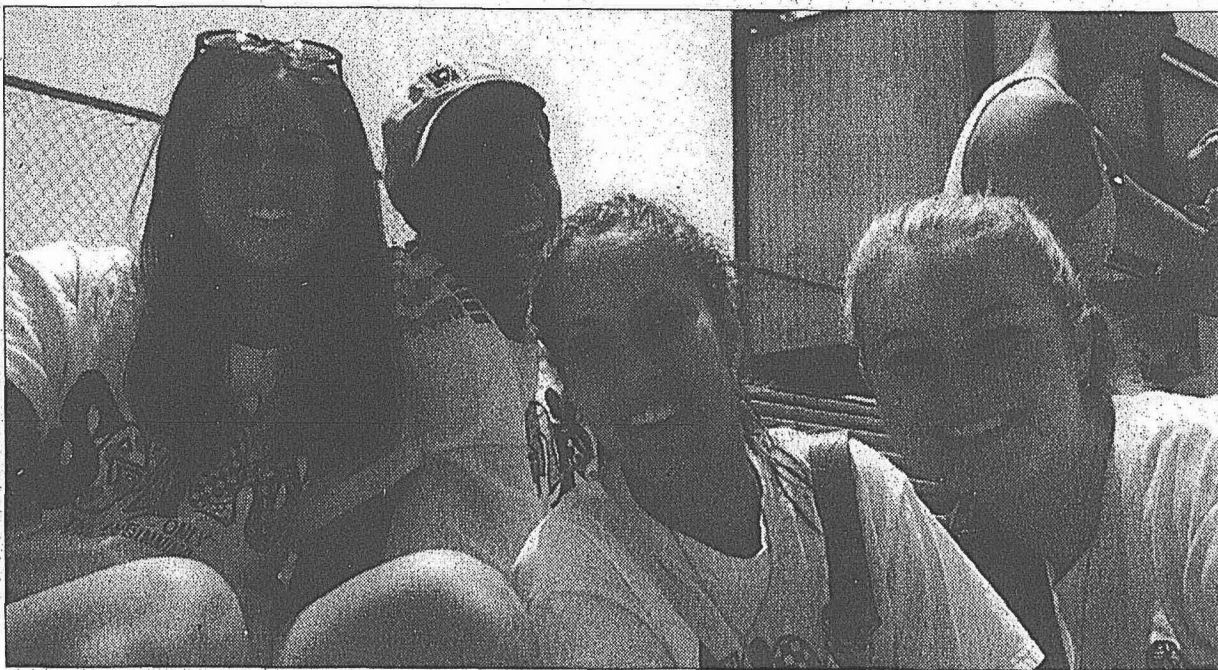

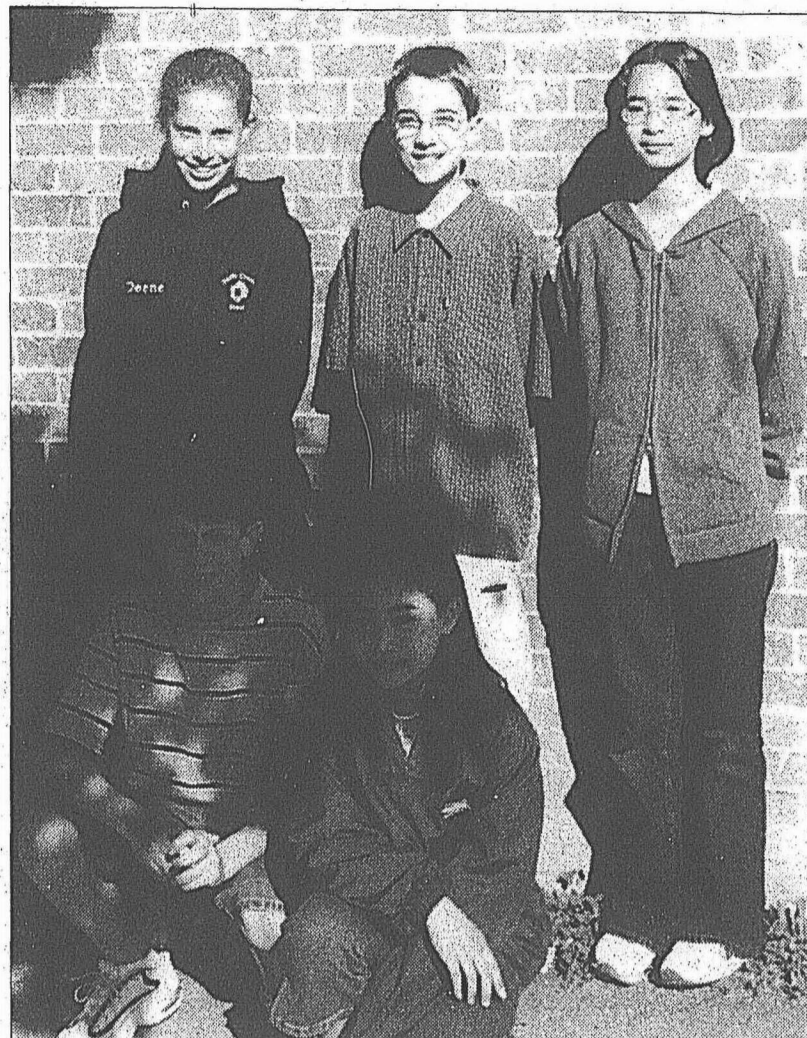

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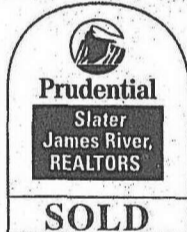
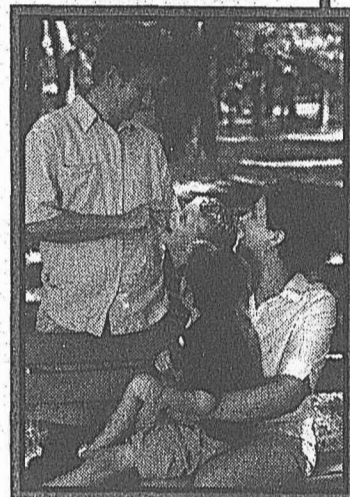
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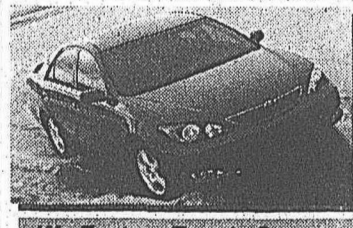
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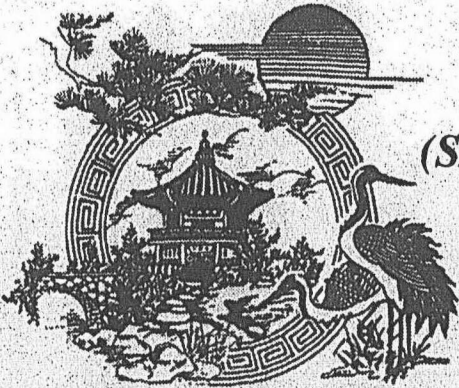
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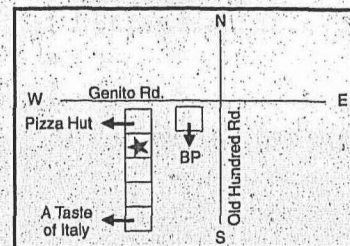
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Seventy-four fishermen participate in fishing tournament

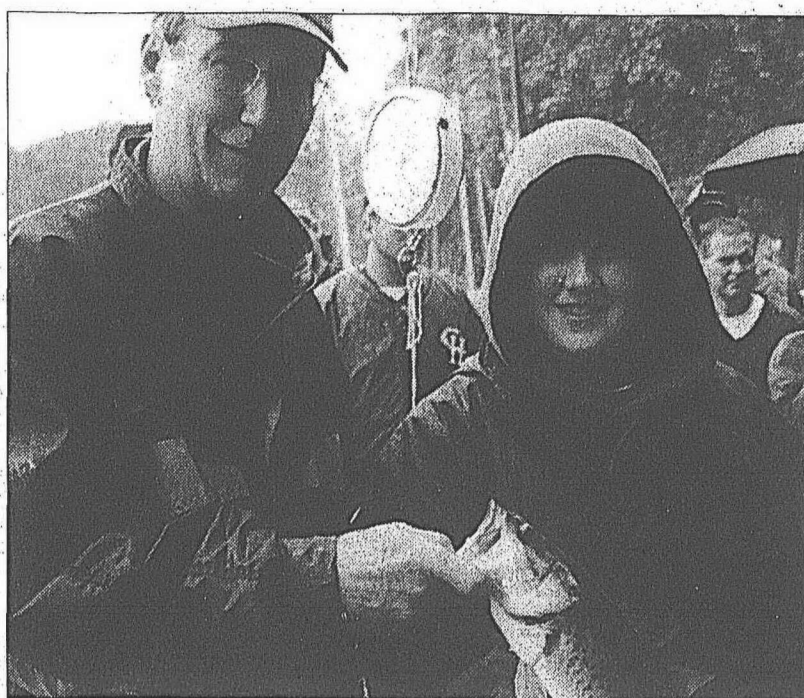

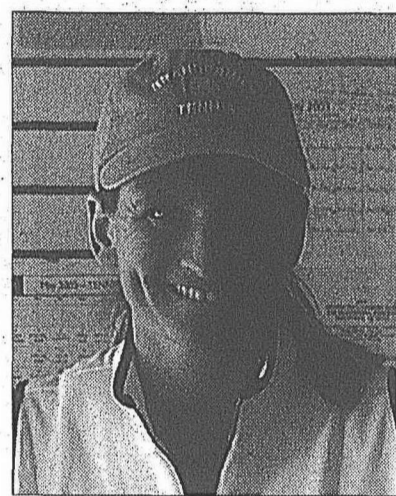
All proceeds from the Lions Club bass fishing tournament go to aid the sight and hearing impaired in the area.

Gale became the first four-time singles winner since Sarah Townsend, who lost the title in 1971. The tournament is open to all Richmond area players.

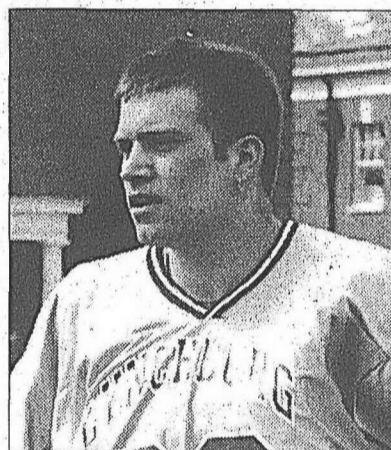


Vern Akins of Seven Oaks, with his son Jonathan, displays his 5-pound heaviest-fish win.

On April 10, the Lynchburg College Hornet men's lacrosse team upset number one nationally ranked Salisbury State University, 13-12. 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Emily Renkin is Clover Hill Senior Athlete of the Year

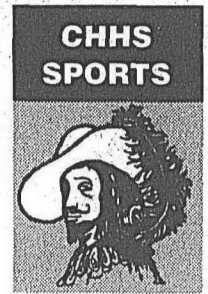

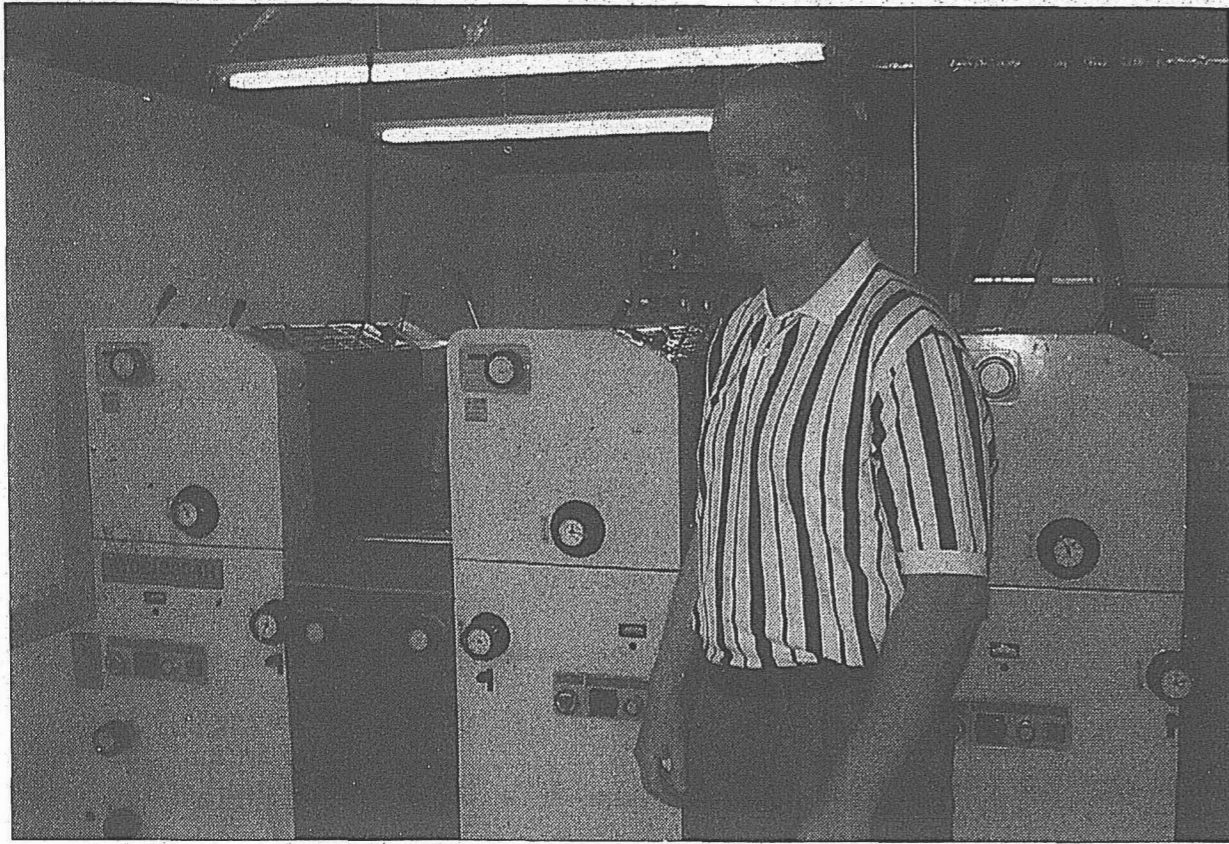

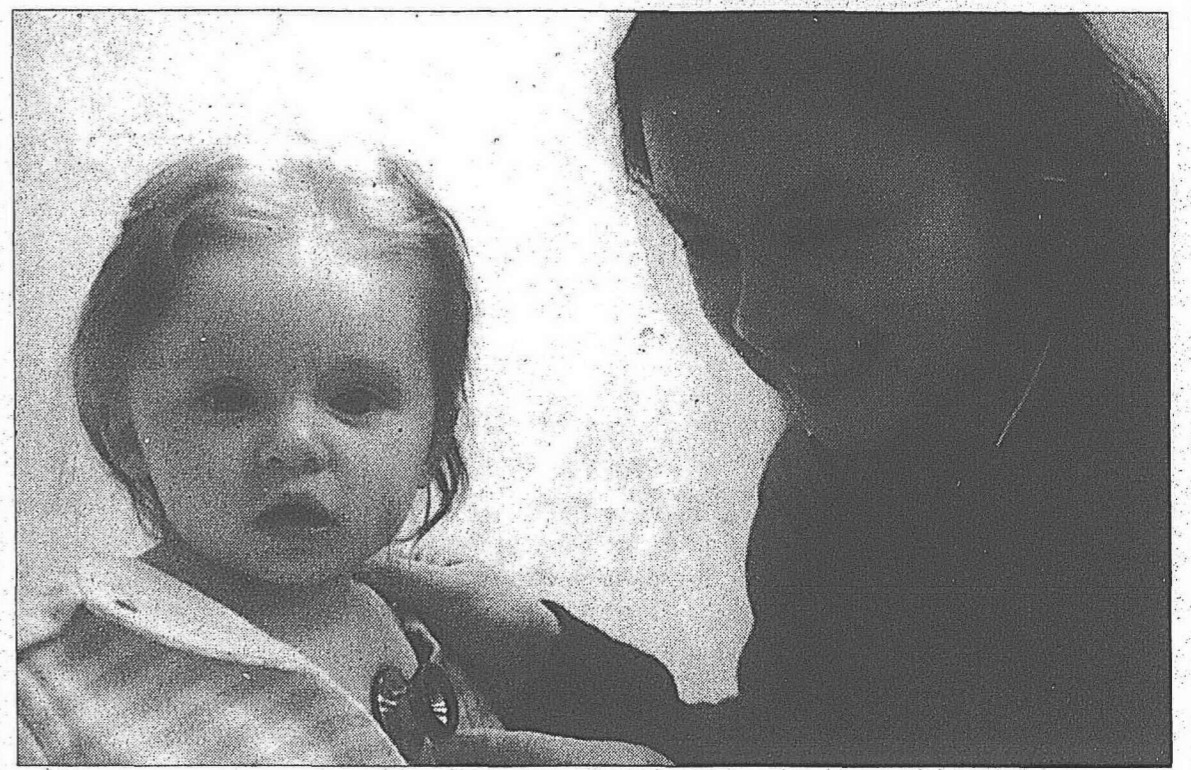
Printing employees."
