Species of the Day: Arnica montana

Arnica montana, commonly referred to as Leopard's Bane, is listed as 'Least Concern' on the IUCN Red List of Threatened Species™. This perennial herb is widespread in Europe, where it is found in extensively managed, acidic and nutrient-poor alpine meadows. Arnica montana flowers are widely used in traditional remedies, for which there is a growing international commercial market, to treat bruises and wounds.

Arnica montana populations are declining in some parts of Europe partly due to unsustainable levels of collection for use in medicines. Its habitat has been maintained in traditional, subsistence-based farming systems, but these are changing due to intensification (especially the addition of nitrogen fertilizers), over-grazing, abandonment, and reforestation. Currently, the largest demand for trade comes from Eastern Europe, the wild resources having been depleted in the main consumer countries - Germany, Switzerland, and the United Kingdom.

Cultivation of Arnica montana has proved to be costly and complicated, and there is a strong market preference for wild-harvested material. The conservation focus is on protocols for non-destructive (sustainable) harvesting and preservation of traditional cultural landscapes. Population trends should be monitored.
