To have and to hold the said Premises and every Part and Parcel thereof unto the said John Askin his Heirs and assigns forever without any let Suit Trouble, molestation or interruption from the said Joseph Cadet his Heirs, Executors, Administrators, assigns, or from any other Person or Persons whatsoever. IN WITNESS whereof the said Parties have to these Presents interchangeably set there hands and seals at Detroit aforesaid, the Day month and year first above written.
