⁵² Thomas Allison, lieutenant in the Fifth Regiment. He was the son of John Allison, a farmer, who resided in Forcett Park, in the north riding of Yorkshire, England. Thomas, his eldest son, was baptized, June 26, 1757. He received a commission as lieutenant in the army, July 25, 1781, and in the Fifth Regiment, Aug. 11, 1783. In February, 1798, he sold his commission and left the army to locate at Quebec, where he spent the remainder of his life. In 1795, he married Therese Casety, widow of John Casety and daughter of Jacques Duperon Baby. Lieutenant Allison died at Quebec, Nov. 15, 1822; his widow died, Aug. 6, 1847. Their only
