

REPORT OF THE STATE SURVEY COMMITTEE.

A report submitted to the Wisconsin Archaeological Society by the State Survey Committee, at its annual meeting held in Milwaukee, on March 7, 1913, indicates that the researches conducted under its direction during the year 1912 were of a very successful character, and have contributed greatly to our knowledge of the character, significance and present condition of the prehistoric and historic Indian remains of various archaeologically unexplored sections of Wisconsin. In accordance with the plans prepared by the committee these researches were carried on chiefly in the northern and central counties of the state. The counties in which field-work was undertaken are the following: Chippewa, Columbia, Crawford, Barron, Burnett, Dane, Douglas, Dunn, Eau Claire, Forest, Jackson, Jefferson, Juneau, La Crosse, Monroe, Marinette, Oconto, Oneida, Pepin, Portage, Polk, Rock, Rusk, St. Croix, Sawyer, Taylor, Trempealeau, Vernon, Washburn and Wood—30. Other records from Fond du Lac, Manitowoc and Sauk counties were contributed by members not regularly engaged in the survey. The total number of evidences located in these 33 counties is shown in the report to number 517. These include:

- 166 Groups of mounds.
- 53 Solitary mounds.
- 172 Village and camp sites.
- 28 Cemeteries.
- 24 Solitary burials.
- 9 Cornfields.
- 16 Plots of garden beds.
- 9 Caches of implements.
