committing any hostile act against the Americans. Lieut. Langlade, of the Indian Department, is the bearer of these dispatches.

## WRIT ISSUED BY REAUME, IN 1816

By authority of the United States, etc.

Pierre Chalifoux, constable, [is] authorized by the United States to take André La Chaine with him, to search for the property which Mr. John Dousman left at Green Bay, carried away from the house of Mr. Reaume by Jean B'te La Borde, and transferred to different houses by the said La Borde, his¹ father-in-law. Thereupon, the two persons who shall make the recovery [of the property], shall cause it to be brought and carried to the house of the undersigned so that an inventory may be made of it, and that it may be delivered to Mr. John Drew, who shall have it put aboard the Mink. The present [writ] is granted to be executed at Green Bay, on the 10th of August of the present year, 1816.

## DICKSON TO LAWE

Eighteen miles from La Baye,<sup>2</sup> November 25th, 1816.

Dear Lawe:—After a series of storms and difficulties, I have got so far. We left Mackinac \* \* \* \*
