My Dear Bulger,—Whatever men I can hereafter spare you I shall endeavour to send under the command of Radenhurst, who, in that case, you must contrive to make your assistant Engineer. If so arranged, Mr. Keating, I think may be still continued as military conductor of Stores. The 2nd Batt of the Kings is expected to be reduced, & the officers sent home, which, as it would be extremely injurious to Radenhurst, I shall retain him in this country.

No appointment must be made in the Indian Department, without your concurrence & my approval, nor can any expenditures incurred in it, be paid here, that have not previously been authorized, & certified by you.
