Captain Duncan Graham of the Western Indian Department ordered into close arrest by Captain Bulger Commanding Fort McKay and on the Mississippi upon the following charge:

For language on the 29th of April, 1815, tending to excite discontent and dissatisfaction against the commanding officer of Fort McKay, also calculated to create much mischief amongst the Indians by impressing them with a bad opinion of the officer appointed to represent His Majesty on the Mississippi, and consequently to diminish that respect and influence which he ought to maintain amongst them. Such conduct on the part of the said Captain Duncan Graham endangering the peace and security of this Garrison, being in violation of his duty as an officer, prejudicial to good order, and Military Discipline and contrary to the Articles of War.
