In the natural race we can draw strength from the praises of the spectators, encouraging our selves or from those running alongside us.

Well the same goes for our spiritual race! As we run our race, we are to focus on Jesus who is the author and finisher of our faith. We are surrounded by the faithful ones who ran this race before us, Abraham, Isaac, Jacob, Ruth, Esther... just to name a few. We have been surrounded by such a great cloud of witnesses that we may receive encouragement from their testimony to endure our race in the same manner as they. The historical record of their lives, their faith and perseverance is like a

thunderous outburst of encouragement for us, a reminder that we too can finish strong, just as they did!

A successful completion of the race; to obtain our prize - Heaven! And with Jesus as our "Coach," there's no way we can't win!

God never said that the journey would be easy, but He did say the arrival would be worthwhile.
