The business session began Monday morning with the election of new Council president 2016-2017

AAC Board of Directors. The AAC Heritage Award was presented by Mike Wood to the late Floyd "Shady" Gilliland. The Heritage Award is presented



to someone who has supported the growth and development of the Council. Gilliland was a long time AAC Board Member who unselfishly served the Council through his legal talent and exceptional knowledge of agriculture. Gilliland's wife Janie accepted the award on his behalf.

The first speaker on the program was Dr. William Puckett, Executive Director of the Soil and Water Conservation Committee. He spoke on Conserve

Alabama, a new initiative formed to increase awareness on conserving our natural re-

sources. Steve Flowers, author of *Of Goats & Governors*, followed with some of Alabama's rich and rowdy political stories.
