Congressman Bradley Byrne Visits AGRI-AFC Facility

Representative Bradley Byrne made a stop at the AGRI-AFC Facility in Atmore as a part of his #AgMatters tour throughout his Congressional District, AL-1. Rep. Byrne took this opportunity to visit an agricultural retail facility to better understand the crop protection indus-



try and to get a firsthand look at the role an agribusiness plays in supporting agriculture. Employees at AGRI-AFC helped Rep. Byrne realize how government regulations and rulemaking can drastically impact the way they do business.

Rep. Byrne was active in requesting House Appropriators to prevent funds from being used

by the Occupational Safety and Health Administration (OSHA) to implement a memo attempting to redefine an exemption on anhydrous ammonia and directs OSHA to go through a formal rulemaking process with stakeholder input before enforcing. This would have greatly impacted 3,800 agricultural retail facilities in the United States including Alabama. In late September a ruling came down from the DC Circuit Court against OSHA requiring OSHA to go through a formal notice and rulemaking process to make any changes to the Process Safety Management (PSM) regulations as it relates to agricultural retailers. AAC appreciates Rep. Byrne's leadership on this.

AAC and the Agricultural Retailers Association coordinated this visit along with AGRI-AFC in Atmore to provide Rep. Byrne with an informative experience on his tour of an ag-retail facili-

Romanian Dignitaries Join Ag Leaders to Discuss Trade

On September 28, AAC hosted lunch and conversation with Romanian dignitaries for Alabama agricultural leaders to promote agriculture and discuss trade opportunities. In 1993 Alabama and Romania entered into an agreement to establish one of the first partnerships in the National Guard State Partnership Program linking U.S. states with partner countries around the world. The United States Ambassador to Romania Hans Klemm, Romanian Secretary of State for Trade and Investments Manuel Costescu and Oana Bizgan with InvestRomania joined ag leaders in Montgomery to discuss developing stronger trade relationship between the two.

The dignitaries travelled to Alabama to spend time visiting with representatives from various industries around the state. This luncheon put the spotlight directly on agriculture. AAC Executive Director Leigha Cauthen led the effort in hosting the guests while Alabama Agriculture & Industries Commissioner John McMillan officially welcomed them to our state and presented them with a gift basket full of Alabama goods and products. Dr. Gary Lemme, Director of the Alabama Cooperative Extension System, prepared a presentation outlining many of the similarities Alabama and Romania share as well as highlighting potential trade opportunities.

An open discussion provided the opportunity for ag leaders to show-case their respective commodities and exchange questions and comments with the Romanian trade leaders. Ambassador Klemm stated that the presentation "served as a catalyst for an enlightening dialogue between all of the guests and increased the potential for future interactions between Alabama and Romania." This was an excellent opportunity for AAC to shine on a world stage and share a bit of southern hospitality with our international partners. This event carried out the Council's mission of working with groups and organizations to effectively promote and enhance the business of agriculture and forestry in Alabama.

Applicants are screened by the AACF Board of Directors.

The scholarship amount is \$1,000 and awarded to the University in the students' honor upon proof of enrollment.
