WHAT IS COMING NEXT?

The past few months have been a wild ride for the grain industry. I have shared with our PCC Board of Directors on many occasions that our grain merchandising activity at the elevator is not driving down the road at a nice steady 55 mph pace anymore.

Due to the many whipsaw actions of the marketplace today, our grain program is either going 0 or 110 mph. Prairie Central carried 1.5 years' worth of soybeans in our grain bins from 2018 harvest all the way through 2019. Due to the fact that China was not buying from the United States, we continued to carry beans well into 2020. But now, China is buying from the United States again and we cannot ship beans out fast enough!

The wind damages from summer storms effected the crops in our area more than initially thought as yields were disappointing and below expectations. Our Chenoa facility was impacted as well when high winds in July destroyed two new bins under construction. In the blink of an eye, Chenoa had an additional 1.5 million bushels of bin space pre-harvest collapse and cause a whole new challenge for us to adjust around.

Luckily, we were able to get one bin rebuilt and able to use before harvest was completed. The farmer was frustrated with cash prices in the spring as we saw almost no new crop sales being made, and this continued all the way up until harvest began. During harvest we saw the markets strongly rally thanks to the incredible demand today from China for both export corn and beans. Within a matter of days, we saw the farmer sell 75% of their harvest and PCC staff could not answer the phone fast enough as farmers made sales. The amount of money that went out for January payment reached record levels.

Oddly enough for 2020, I have not even mentioned COVID-19 yet. Navigating during a pandemic has been challenging enough for everyone but navigating through a pandemic during harvest was a whole different ball game. I am beyond proud of the way our farmers worked with our PCC staff during these unprecedented circumstances. The policies and procedures that we implemented prior to harvest due to COVID-19 were accepted and handled very well by all of our patrons, and I thank you for that. Due to COVID-19, PCC Board of Directors have also gone to holding board meetings via Zoom, and our Annual Meeting was made available to be viewed online. On to 2021.

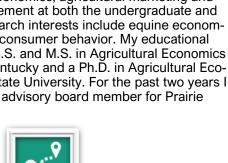

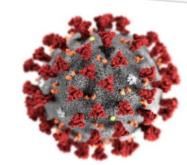

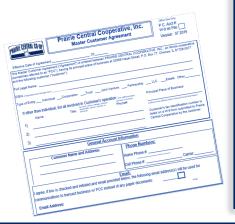

the **RECIPE**

from PCC

INGREDIENTS

- 2 (10.5 ounce) cans cream of chicken soup
- 3 cups chopped cooked chicken, or more to taste
- 1 cup finely chopped celery
- 2 cup cornflakes cereal
- 1 (8 ounce) can sliced water chestnuts, drained
- 1 cup silvered almonds
- 1/2 cup mayonnaise
- 1/2 cup finely chopped onion
- 1 box Rice-A-Roni
- 2 tablespoons butter, melted or as needed

INSTRUCTIONS

Preheat oven to 350 degrees F. Mix cream of chicken soup, cooked chicken, celery, 1 cup cornflakes, water chestnuts, almonds, mayonnaise, Rice-A-Roni, and onions together in a large bowl. Spread mixture into a 9x13-inch casserole dish. Mix 1 cup corn flakes and melted butter together n a bowl until coated; sprinkle over casserole. Bake in the preheated oven until casserole is bubbling and topping is crisp, about 45 mins.

A LITTLE BIT OF EVERYTHING

Just like the year 2020, harvest season 2020 had a little bit of everything in it. Highly variable yields, ranging corn moistures harvested, wind and hail damage, price rallies, and COVID-19 precautions.

We saw some good yields in places this fall, but overall many were disappointed with this years' harvest. Big swings in weather conditions during the growing season and pockets of wind and hail damage were all contributing factors. This was true not only for here in Central IL, but for a majority of the U.S. While some may

not have been surprised by the lower than expected yields, it was a surprise to see a price rally right in the middle of harvest season. Continued U.S. export business getting booked this fall along with the lower production helped drive prices higher. Just in the six weeks or so from the start of harvest in mid-September to the end of October, the price of corn increased by about 60 cents/bu and the price of soybeans by about \$1.00/bu. While it was a challenging year, everyone enjoyed seeing the higher prices.

Many of us in the industry also needed to take extra precautions to help ensure we could keep both our employees and our patrons safe and healthy throughout the 2020 harvest. We thank you for your understanding and cooperation with the new precautions that we implemented. 2020 was full of changes and adversity for all of us and it looks to continue into the New Year. Thank you for your business this past year and we are looking forward to what 2021 brings.
