He says growing up in the Hunnewell area and living in this area all his life has given him a perspective that not everyone has. He became very familiar with the territory and the farm fields we serve while he delivered fuel and propane early in his career at Farmers Elevator. That knowledge base gave him a leg up to direct agronomy seed and ag chemical sales and application activities beginning in 2007. In 2014, fertilizer sales and service was added to the mix of products he was responsible for. Looking back, one of the things that stands out in Gary's mind is the loyalty of our customer base and the interest people take in the operations of their business—the Farmers Elevator. Since he began work here in late December 1978, Gary worked for 3 different general managers as well as with an interesting mix of employees. Reminiscing, Gary said he knew Hilbert Gares (who was Asst Manager in 1978) but he was surprised to learn Hilbert was the same age as Gary's dad, Mrs. Gares was the same age as Gary's mother and both couples were married on the exact same day! Gary also referred to former co-worker Dallas Peters who he said if you wanted to know what Dallas was thinking, all you had to do was ask! Gary recalls one cold winter day being invited to go to Quincy with Dallas to get soybean meal. Gary of course agreed, but after loading 20 tons of soybean meal, one bag at a time, Gary decided that was enough of volunteering for everything! Gary said, "Working in the old office on Vine Street was a unique experience! On very cold days in the winter, the water lines froze up. The walls were made of blocks and there was no insulation. Coats and gloves inside were a must!" Moving to the new office on Summer Street in 2002 was the first time Gary thought, 'Now we are a professional operation—not just another small-town CO-OP.' That building was destroyed by the tornado and sent us back to Vine Street in a double-wide trailer. Gary believes the best part of the tornado was how it brought the employees, management, Board of Directors and community together.

"We all realized then how fast things can change and be gone," Gary said, "Look at Farmers Elevator in 1978 and then fast forward to the Farmers Elevator facility of today.

This lets you can draw your own conclusions of the changes." He believes forward-looking management and employees changed the way we do business and the manner in which we

bring products and services to our customers. Gary said nothing looks like it did in 1978 and believes the campus of Farmers Elevator today is something every stockholder should be proud of, including our feed mill, feed delivery equipment, grain storage and drying facility, dry fertilizer warehouse, the vehicle garage and storage area, the agronomy application equipment, the seed warehouse and seed treater, and of course the area very heavily, and we all know how devastating they can be. main office complex. Gary recalls during the late 1980's and early 90's Farmers Elevator held a Spring EXPO at Holy Rosary Gym. His first role was to work for Ivan Hendrix, Petroleum Manager and deliver refined fuels. His main client was Central Stone where he went every day at 5:00 AM. When Mr. Hendrix died in 1993, Gary was promoted to Petroleum Manager (refined fuels, lubricants and cardtrol). The company entered the propane business in late 90's and Gary delivered LP. When the propane business was sold in 2001, Gary worked with petroleum and as a tender driver in agronomy. He then became a certified custom applicator. In August 2007, Gary was promoted to Agronomy Manager for seed and ag chemical sales and later fertilizer marketing became his responsibility as well. While working here for nearly four decades, Gary said he has seen a lot of changes in services and products we provide. The

customer base has changed a little but many are the same families that he began serving in 1978. Where it used to be the dad's he worked with, now he had the opportunity to work with their sons and daughters. Gary says, "I never looked at the people we called on as customers," he said, "But rather I consider them our friends." He said those life-time relationships will be missed but not forgotten. Some of the things Gary says he will never forget from his career include how tough it was working

through the farm economy issues of the middle 1980's, the fire that destroyed the much of the old Henderson building on St. Patrick's Day one year, the EF-2 tornado in March 2006 that wreaked havoc to buildings and equipment of our company and this city and the tragic loss of former employee Rick Baker. Gary recalled someone once said, 'If you like what you do it's not work.' Crop Care

It's that time of year again! Fireworks stands are popping up everywhere and it feels like summer! This has been another unpredictable year, and

at this point I think Mother Nature just likes to mess with us. We were too wet... then too dry... then wet again. It is Missouri, so if you don't like the weather, just wait five minutes! Anyway, we are still proceeding as normal and doing our best to help you raise a crop. We have planting dates that vary by a couple of months, corn and beans at all different growth stages, and some soybeans being planted as we speak. Even so, now is not the time to abandon our best management practices! Diseases and insects are still present, and managing them is not any less important this year than any other. Japanese beetles are in the We will have the typical diseases to watch out for, Grey Leaf Spot, Common Rust, Northern Corn Leaf Blight, etc. There has already been Northern Corn Leaf Blight spotted in a field just south of Monroe City. We had **rust** in many wheat fields and cover crop rye fields, so we know it's on the ground and likely to make an appearance if the conditions are favorable. Considering all of these factors, applications of fungicide and insecticide sound pretty smart, right? We are committed to making these applications in a timely manner. If you are scouting and see any disease or insect symptomology, don't hesitate to call us! Even if your corn is not yet tasseled or your soybeans aren't yet in R2, fungicide and insecticide can still be very beneficial.

Another practice to consider is side-dressing corn with **nitrogen**. We have had some rain events this season that has very likely lead to the loss of some nitrogen applied via anhydrous. That being said, Farmers Elevator has a spectacular system of UAN application with our 360 Y-drop equipment. This equipment affords us wide windows application, along with pre-

cision placement of product. If you suspect other nutrient deficiencies, for example sulfur, we can pull tissue samples for evidence of such. If sulfur deficiency is present we have products we can add to our UAN application to address that issue. 
From The Feed Bag
