TUT, TUT! APOLLOS

Y ears ago my family visited a display of items taken from the treasury in the tomb of young Egyptian King Tutankhamen. Among the relics stood the famous golden death mask, which certainly grabs attention of all who view those exhibits.

Also on display sat a small treasure **chest**. Carefully constructed from wood. craftsmen gilded it with gold and ornate paint. That chest is what I remember most from the tomb of King Tut. Something about it caught my eye. Though beautifully adorned with gold and an attractive image of a charioteer riding among what look like many corpses, the chest's symmetry seemed a bit off. Its lid did not quite fit the box's dimensions. What should have been parallel lines in its rectangular construction seemed cockeyed.

Perhaps because of my former employment drawing blueprints for a machine shop, eyeing something that looks askew catches my notice. This is not to say that I could design Tut's treasure box, dream up images from that culture to paint on it, nor do I possess gold gilding skills. Not me! My estimation is more like when a sports fan, after a professional ball game is over, imagines himself playing quarterback and critiquing how a pivotal play should have been made.

People who lack expertise commonly give negative reviews about experts who make an error. We non-professionals criticize even when we possess incomplete or defective information. So it is when "laymen" listen to proficient religious speakers. We commoners, who lack expertise of such accomplished preachers, critique those who make the slightest errors. "He split the infinitive" or "he actually used a double negative!"

How did Priscilla and Aquila behave when they heard Apollos speak? They did not claim equal skills as public speakers. People respected Apollos' eloquence (Acts 18:24). His might in the scriptures was legend. Priscilla and Aquila's approach to the man was not to publicly humiliate him, neither was it caustic. Apollos just needed an update, better information. So, "they took him unto them and expounded unto him the way of God more accurately" (Acts 18:26). The couple's heart-felt care or love for Apollos inclined him to give ear to their update.

What resulted? The church encouraged him and wrote to the disciples to receive him (at Achaia). When Apollos arrived there, he helped them much that had believed through grace; for he powerfully confuted the Jews, and that publicly, showing by the scriptures that Jesus was the Christ (Acts 18:27-28).

Occasionally you hear a well-studied preacher or teacher mishandle a verse. He might be mistaken about the location of a verse or how Bible characters were related. No need to insult his effort or skill as a public speaker. We can complement his effective style conveying a great deal of truth. Our approach should not be mean-spirited. Perhaps a humble, receptive speaker just needs an update, or better information. Putting yourself in his place, wouldn't you prefer someone approach you that way rather than coming across as hyper-picky or hostile?

"Let your speech be always with grace, seasoned with salt, that ye may know how ye ought to answer each one." (Col. 4:6)

Have You Looked In the Mirror Lately?

When is the last time you looked in the mirror?

No, not your bathroom mirror; I'm talking about the mirror of God's Word. When's the last time you took a long hard look at yourself in that mirror?

When we look into God's Word it shows us our imperfections. It reveals all of our flaws. It shows us these things in great (and often painful) detail. It's like one of those magnifying mirrors where every blemish will show up. It's like a mirror that is surrounded by lots of bright light bulbs.

It's not at all flattering. That's why we often would rather not look at ourselves there.

Two quick points here:

 We need to spend more time in front of the mirror. If you don't spend time in the Word, flaws in your character will go undetected. We've got to keep our mirror before us every day.

We need to improve the quality of our time before the mirror. Don't jump in front of the mirror and then run away. Don't put down the mirror and forget what needs correction. We're not just reading for information, but for transformation (read James 1:22-25).
