# The Lord's Church Is Different (III)

It is apparent to anyone with the skill of observation that the Lord's church - the church about which we read in the New Testament - is different from the Catholic and Protestant churches to which the masses of christendom profess membership. The Catholicism of today is the result of a departure from the New Testament pattern and a blending of Christianity and Roman paganism over a period of centuries. The Protestantism of our times is the resultant "pendulum effect" of believers moving away from the works salvation of Roman Catholicism to an equally erroneous faith without any works salvation.

From the New Testament one discovers that the Lord's church was established in the city of Jerusalem in about 33 A.D., when the Holy Spirit was poured out and the gospel of repentance and remission of sins in the name of Jesus was first preached. (cf. Joel 2:28-32; Isa. 2:2-3; Mk. 9:1; Lk. 24:44-49; Acts 1:8; Acts 2:1-4, 37-47) The New Testament clearly establishes that the Lord's church was not, and is never to be, denominated by names and creeds of men. (John 17:20-21; Acts 4:12; 1 Cor. 1:10-13; 3:11; Gal. 1:6-9) The fellowship of those in the Lord's church is restricted to those who "continue steadfastly in the apostle's doctrine" (Acts 2:42) and "walk in the light" of God. (1 Jn. 1:1-7) The right hand of Christian fellowship may **not** be extended to any who hold not the doctrine of Christ taught in the first century by the apostles and other inspired men. (2 Cor. 6:14; Rom. 16:17; 2 Thess. 3:6, 14; et al) In fact, we are admonished to "try the spirits whether they are of God" (1 Jn. 4:1) and to reject all who "hold not the doctrine of Christ." (2 Jn. 9-11) Having noted that, by its establishment and fellowship the Lord's church is distinctive from the popular "Christianity" professed and practiced by many today, let us note another way in which the Lord's church is different.

The Lord's church is different by its worship. "But in vain they do worship me, teaching for doctrines the commandments of men." (Mt. 15:9) The worship of New Testament Christians was different and distinctive from the pagan idolatry and heathenism of its day. The heathen temples, pagan priesthood, and idolatrous worship of the ancients have filtered their way into Christian worship. The New Testament church came together every Lord's day to offer the sacrifice of praise with their lips (Mt. 26:30; 1 Cor. 14:15; Eph. 5:19; Col. 3:16); to give thanks, seeking favor and forgiveness through prayer (Acts 2:42; 1 Cor. 14:15; 2 Cor. 1:11); to commemorate the sacrifice of their Savior by partaking of the cup and breaking of the bread in the Lord's Supper (Mt. 26:26-28; Acts 2:42; Acts 20:7); to give of their means to support the work of the church (1 Cor. 16:1-2; 2 Cor. 9:5-7); and to hear the Word of that their spirit might be strengthened for the daily battle against the adversary. (Acts 20:7; Eph. 6:11-18; 1 Pt. 5:8) Even ancient records of secular history bear witness to the New Testament pattern of the early church. Pliny the Younger, appointed governor of Bithynia by the Emperor Trajan (c.a. 112), wrote of the Lord's church gathering together

on an "appointed day" to sing hymns to Christ and to "take food" together. (F.W. Mattox, The Eternal Kingdom, p 36)

The worship of the Lord's church in the first century was simple and according to the apostolic order. (Acts 2:42) There is no trace of a uniform and exclusive liturgy; worship conducted by one of a priestly order; the use of mechanical instruments of music; soloists or choirs giving elaborate performances arousing applause; an order of sacraments; special clothing or titles to identify the ordained priests and ministers; women leading in the public worship; dramas, skits, or special days to commemorate the birth or death of Jesus. The Lord's church of the first century did not pray to the saints, count rosary beads, go to confessional seeking forgiveness from the priest, and they certainly did not pray to Mary as the mother of God!

The worship of the Lord's church is as different from the Catholic and Protestant practices of today as it was from the pagan rituals in the first century. When these differences are pointed out it is often followed by criticism of assumed superiority and accusations of self-righteousness. The truth is that at the heart of the worship of the Lord's church is a pure heart of devotion seeking to approach God according to His commands not the traditions of men. No man is truly worthy to approach God, but God by the shed blood of His only begotten has made us to be "a spiritual house, a holy priesthood, to offer up spiritual sacrifices, acceptable to God by Jesus Christ." (1 Pt. 2:5) Yes, the worship of the Lord's church is different from the traditions and doctrines of men in form and appearance. It is also different because it is accepted as a sweet savor by the Lord. May we always strive to maintain our distinctiveness. May the Lord's church ever be different.

"The God I know would never condemn a person doing \_\_\_\_\_," they say with confidence. And yet, God has clearly condemned it. "All you have to do to be saved is ," they reassure others. And yet, God has made it abundantly clear that baptism is where salvation is found and sins are forgiven (1 Peter 3:21, Acts 22:16; Acts 2:38; Mark 16:16; etc).

Perhaps the greatest tragedy is seeing just how much effort people put towards avoiding God's commands instead of just obeying them. It takes selflessness and humility to read God's commands and obey them. And yet, doing so shows that we love God (John 14:15).

Do we love God? I mean truly love Him. Then let's prove it through obedience.
