PATRIARCHS NOTION OF HOW TO "GET EVEN"

Dinah had 12 brothers and no sisters. Like many teens, she wished to socialize with other young girls. So, she "went out to see the daughters of the land" (Gen. 34:1). Where young ladies hang out, young fellows will take notice. Young Prince Shechem saw Dinah and took her (34:2).

Surely Dinah had heard family history about similar encounters among her ancestors. Her lineage passed on accounts that warned of dangers for females roaming in those lands! Pharaoh snatched her married greatgrandmother, Sarai for a potential wife (Gen. 12:15). King Abimelech took her greatgrandmother, Sarai, for an addition to his house (Gen. 20:2-3). A Philistine king warned her granddad and grandmother that Rebekah could easily have been taken by one of his men (Gen. 26:(7) 10).

For thousands of years, I suppose from the beginning of human history, each generation seems to think stories told by old-timers about moral dangers they faced in life, don't apply to the current age. What was Dinah supposing girls enjoying city life could tell her? So, each generation seems to make similar foolish choices.

Shechem "humbled her" and kept her for a period of time. He liked her. He asked his dad to arrange for their marriage (Gen. 34:2-4).

Back at Dinah's home, her father Jacob heard what happened. He passed on that sad news to his sons who "grieved..were very wroth, because he (Shechem) had wrought folly in Israel in lying with Jacob's daughter; which thing ought not to be done" (Gen. 34:6-7). Dinah's brothers talked to Shechem's dad, **negotiating "with guile"** to get not only Shechem, but all the men in his city to become circumcised (Gen. 34:14–17). Ostensibly, townsmen thought this peaceable agreement would result in them getting some of Jacob's wealth (Gen. 34:23).

Remember what happened? Dinah's full blood brothers, Simeon and Levi, did a sneak attack on the town the 3rd day when all the men were incapacitated recovering from getting circumcised. They "slew all the males", "plundered the city" taking its wealth and making captives of women and children (Gen. 34:25-29). Did Simeon and Levi "get even?" Not according to their dad. "You have troubled me to make me odious to the inhabitants of the land.." (Gen. 34:30; see 49:5-7).

Revenge takers and rowdy mobs commonly go beyond what an honorable judge would call justice. Were Dinah's brothers merely defending a sister who was victimized? Here is sample of what sometimes happen when raging men take the law into their own hands. They become law-breakers. They want revenge rather than remaining law-abiding. They might use deception to bait and disarm naive people. They strike with daring acts of violence to prove commitment

to their cause. When we consider human conduct, "there is no new thing under the sun" (Eccl. 1:9).

Ro. 13:3-4 declares a benefit of disputing parties taking their case to a "higher power," a department of justice. By appealing to authorities, those at odds are kept at a distance from the other side until a trial date. So, disputing parties show themselves willing to accept what is deemed fair by allowing **disinterested** parties to express calm, rational judgment, whether by a judge or jury.

Ro. 12:17-19 Christians heeding God's moral laws, resist that impulse to get revenge for an offence. People practicing personal vengeance generally "pay back with interest." They behave like the first recorded polygamist, Lamech, who bragged to his wives, "I have **slain** a man for wounding me; and a young man **for bruising** me; if Cain shall be avenged sevenfold, truly Lamech **seventy and seven fold** (Gen. 4:23-24).

Ro. 12:20-21 Jesus taught us to initiate peace by doing good to a contrary person (Mt. 5:38-48). It is hard to continue hating a person who has shown you kindness.

Routine Worship

But I will sing of your strength; I will sing aloud of your steadfast love in the morning. Psalm 59:16

Some believe that if worship is not spontaneous it is not authentic. It is true that traditions can become lifeless routines, but there are some compelling reasons to have daily and weekly set patterns of worship.

They keep things from crowding God out. Life is a constant moving stream of unexpected twists and turns. There are so many things that pop up every day and demand our time. If our worship traditions are part of our non-negotiable, daily routines we will be much more successful at keeping God where He belongs each day.

They create holy space. It's good to have a time AND a place to worship. Daniel had a window. Jesus had a garden. For you it may be a chair or a break area at work or a certain booth at a coffee house or the side of your bed or your morning drive to work. Those ordinary places and routines become holy places and routines.

They serve as a reminder. We can't ever get too far away from God when we're anchored by these traditions.
