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ASH WEDNESDAY, LENT, AND EASTER?

Many in the "Christian" world began the time of Lent with the observance of Ash Wednesday as they look forward to the celebration of Easter. While none of these "Christian observances" are authorized by Scripture, as New Testament Christians set for the defense of the gospel (Phil 1:17; 1 Pt. 3:15) we ought to make ourselves aware of the origin and purpose of them that we might be able give a biblical answer as to why we do not participate.

The word *lent* originates from an old Germanic term meaning "long day" and referred to the lengthening of the days during the springtime of the year. Basically, *lent* simply referred to the spring season. The word has taken on a "religious" significance through Roman Catholic tradition. Today, *Lent* refers to the period between Ash Wednesday and Easter. Lent is supposed to be observed as a forty days time of fasting and spiritual reflection.

Lent has its origins in the traditions of men. While some seek apostolic authority for its observance, the earliest "authority" for the practice is found in such men as Pope Leo I (d. 461), Socrates (d. 433), and Jerome (d. 420). But the church historian Eusebius (d. 339) quoted from a letter written by the Christian apologist, Irenaeus (d. 202?) to Pope Victor I (d. 199) (the Roman church very early referred to their "bishops" as pope), in which Irenaeus observed, "some think they ought to fast for one day, others for two days, and others even for several, while others reckon forty hours both of day and night to their fast." Irenaeus also indicates that this "diversity of fasting" had persisted for many years. This fact clearly indicates that there

was no apostolic teaching on a forty days observance of Lent, but that it was a gradual evolution of Catholic tradition. The forty days which is accepted today is based on either Jesus' forty days fasting in the wilderness (Mt. 2; Lk. 2) or his "forty hours in the tomb." In recent years, Lent has also been adopted by some Protestant denominations.

Ash Wednesday is the first day of the Lenten fast. According to "ancient custom" the participants come to the altar before Mass and the priest dips his thumb into ashes (which have been blessed), and the sign of the cross is placed upon the forehead. As he is placing the ashes on the forehead the priest will say something like, "Remember man that thou art dust and unto dust thou shalt return." The ashes are prepared from the palm branches from the previous year's Palm Sunday celebration. The significant of the ashes is drawn from such passages of Scripture as: "And I set my face unto the Lord God, to seek by prayer and supplications, with fasting, and sackcloth, and ashes" (Dan. 9:3), and Jesus rebuke, "Woe unto thee, Chorazin! woe unto thee, Bethsaida! for if the mighty works, which were done in you, had been done in Tyre and Sidon, they would have repented long ago in sackcloth and ashes" (Mt. 11:21). There is no biblical authority for the observance of Ash Wednesday. The earliest reference to the practice is from the writings of Aelfric of Eynsham (d. 1025), an 11th century English abbot (head of a monastery), who wrote much to promote the worship of saints. In his work, LIVES OF THE SAINTS, Aelfric stated, "We read in the books both in the Old Law and in the New that the men who repented of their sins bestrewed themselves with ashes and clothed their bodies with

sackcloth. Now let us do this little at the beginning of our Lent that we strew ashes upon our heads to signify that we ought to repent of our sins during the Lenten fast." The abbot then warned those who would refuse to participate by recounting an event in which a man "refused to go to church for the ashes on Ash Wednesday and who a few days after was accidentally killed in a boar hunt."

Easter is a holiday surrounded by myth and uncertainty. Bede (d. 735), an English monk and historian, wrote that "April is known as Eostremonath, and is named for a Germanic goddess (Eostre) connected with renewal and fertility that the Anglo-Saxons honored in the spring." Bede further noted that Anglo-Saxon Christians adopted her name and many of the celebratory practices for their Mass of Christ's resurrection. If this is true the Easter holiday has its origins in the paganism of Germanic peoples. No surprise that the Catholic Church denies this.

Of our three "Christian" observances under consideration, only Easter is found in our English Bible. From the book of Acts we read, "And when he had apprehended him, he put him in prison, and delivered him to four quaternions of soldiers to keep him; intending after *Easter* to bring him forth to the people" (Acts 12:4). The Greek word translated Easter is the Greek word referring to the Passover and is so translated in every other instance in the New Testament! The word should be translated Passover here also.

Pope Leo I refers to Easter as the greatest Christian feast. According to Catholic tradition, Easter is "the commemorating of the slaying of the true Lamb of God and the Resurrection of Christ." It is considered by Catholics as "the oldest feast of the Christian Church, as old as Christianity, and the connecting link between the Old and New Testaments." Catholic scholars insist, the fact that neither the Bible nor the Post-Apostolic Fathers (uninspired Christians apologists dating to 150) mention an annual commemoration of Jesus death and that we hear of such principally through a controversy that was addressed as a side item at the first Council of Nicaea (325), nearly three-hundred years after the church was established, "is purely accidental."

The ultimate conclusion is that Ash Wednesday, Lent, and Easter are of human tradition and have no part in New Testament Christianity. The observance of these as special religious days or times of worship have no biblical authority. In fact, one who assume their observance of these days and their "worship celebrations" on these days should give serious heed to the words of Jesus, "But in vain they do worship me, teaching for doctrines the commandments of men." (Mt. 15:9)

Let Go Of The Bee

"To carry a grudge is like being stung to death by one bee" (William H. Walton).

Maybe that person said something very insulting to you. Or maybe they did something to hurt your feelings. It's easy to hold on to those grudges. If we do, all we're really doing is holding on to that furious bee and letting it continue to sting us. The more we hold on, the more it stings. The more it stings, the more miserable we become.

While it's not always easy to do, the solution isn't rocket science: let go of the bee! The Bible is very clear regarding how we should treat each other when it comes to grudges, "Let all bitterness and wrath and anger and clamor and slander be put away from you, along with all malice. Be kind to one another, tender-hearted, forgiving each other, just as God in Christ also has forgiven you" (Ephesians 4:31-32).

If we still need more motivation, then let's consider Matthew 6:14-15, "For if you forgive others for their transgressions, your heavenly Father will also forgive you. But if you do not forgive others, then your Father will not forgive your transgressions."
