

# Learning To Avoid Unnecessary Suffering In Life (part 5)

#### CHOICE OF FRIENDS AND ASSOCIATIONS

Avoiding suffering by prudently choosing good companions is emphasized from the opening of the book of Proverbs (cf. 1:10-18). The ancient Latin term for companion was "companionem," literally "bread fellow." (Online Etymology Dictionary) The word denotes a close relationship between two; so close they share bread.

Proverbs 13:20 and 27:17 each underscore the importance of choosing friends and, in truth, stand in compliment with each other.

He that walketh with wise men shall be wise: but a companion of fools shall be destroyed (Proverbs 13:20).

Iron sharpeneth iron; so a man sharpeneth the countenance of his friend (Proverbs 27:17).

The friend that "sharpeneth the countenance of his friend" to wisdom is to be chosen over the friend that "sharpeneth the countenance of his friend" to folly. The association of ungodly companions not only leads to foolishness but is also a workshop of unnecessary suffering.

To teach wisdom, Solomon instructed, "Make no friendship with an angry man; and with a furious man thou shalt not go: Lest thou learn his ways, and get a snare to thy soul" (Proverbs 22:24, 25). Consider also this sage guidance for avoiding unnecessary suffering:

An ungodly man diggeth up evil: and in his lips there is as a burning fire. A froward man soweth strife: and a whisperer separateth chief friends. A violent man enticeth his neighbour, and leadeth him into the way that is not good (Proverbs 16:27-29).

A man whose companions are ungodly, perverse, and violent will find himself "sharing a meal" with needless and avoidable suffering.

#### LISTEN TO WISE COUNSEL AND INSTRUCTION

The most poetic of the proverbs that emphasize the prudence of listening to wise counsel paint a picture of the ear, bending to hear: "My son, attend unto my wisdom, and bow thine ear to my understanding" (Proverbs 5:1; cf. 22:17). Perhaps James had these proverbs in mind when he penned, "Wherefore, my beloved brethren, let every man be swift to hear" (James 1:19).

The book of Proverbs is abundant with the admonitions to hear and attain to wise counsel:

A wise man will hear, and will increase learning; and a man of understanding shall attain unto wise counsels (Proverbs 1:5).

My son, hear the instruction of thy father (Proverbs 1:8a).

The wise in heart will receive commandments: but a prating fool shall fall (Proverbs 10:8).

The blessings of given heed to wise counsel are also consistently noted: "He is in the way of life that keepeth instruction: but he that refuseth reproof erreth (Proverbs 10:17).

The law of the wise is a fountain of life, to depart from the snares of death" (Proverbs 13:14).

Cease, my son, to hear the instruction that causeth to err from the words of knowledge (Proverbs 19:27).

# **UNEXPECTEDLY CONQUERED (Joshua 7:1-15)**

Can you imagine the elation that Israel felt, whose fathers felt like grasshoppers but who now, owing to Jehovah's power, shouted down the city wall of mighty Jericho? They are still riding that burst of confidence when Joshua sends spies over to Ai, east of Bethel. The spies' report is incredibly optimistic. There are at least 12,000 inhabitants of Ai (8:25). Israel has over 600,000 men who could serve in battle (Num. 26:51). The two and a half trans-Jordan tribes alone had 40,000 soldiers (4:13). But, the spies recommend a force of two or three thousand (3). Joshua sends the larger number, but they flee from Ai (4) and suffer 36 casualties in the battle (5).

The tables have turned. Now, it is Israel whose hearts melt and become as water (6; cf. 2:11). Joshua is devastated and falls before the Lord, pleading with and petitioning Him in horror over his army's unexpected loss (7-9). He asks God, "Why?" (7). "What can I say?" (8). "What will you do?" (9). God's answer was a jolt to Joshua. God tells him to get up and pull himself together (10). This happened for a reason. The need of the moment was not mourning, but reckoning. Why was Israel conquered by such an inferior foe? God explains that Israel was unfaithful (1), sinful (11), transgressors (11), accursed and abandoned (12). All of this was because one man, Achan, "took some of the things under the ban, therefore the anger of the Lord burned against the sons of Israel" (1).

Because of the sin of one man, the nation was held accountable. God uses the word "they" as He describes the sin problem (12). Have you ever heard it said, "You reap what you sow. You reap more than you sow. You reap longer than you sow. You reap what others sow"? The principle is borne out in passages like Proverbs 22:8, Hosea 8:7, and Galatians 6:7-8. Achan did the crime, but all Israel was doing the time.

God lays out the remedy for this calamity: Rise up, consecrate yourselves, and identify the source of the problem (13-15). This was not a hopeless cause, but passivity and inaction were not the solution. They had to deal with the issue if they were to achieve victory and future success. The consequences must be swift and severe (15). The holiness and purity of God's people were at stake.

It is a helpful reminder to us to revisit this account in Joshua 7. It reminds us of how seriously God takes sin. It shows us that the sin of one can and often does impact so many others. It reveals that God expects His people to decisively deal with the sin of a brother or sister, not ignore, excuse, or even glorify it (cf. 1 Cor. 5:1ff). Otherwise, we cannot expect God's aid and assistance in the great battle in which we find ourselves (2 Cor. 10:3-5; Eph. 6:10ff). How many times have the people of God been overcome by the "lesser enemy" because of "sin in the camp"?
