

The Righteous Shall Be Stronger And Stronger

Some of the most amazing words of faith found anywhere in Scripture are from the book of Job. Destroyed though innocent, Job concluded that only one had the power to bring such swift destruction. Why did God count him as an enemy (13:24; 19:11)? Why was God persecuting him (16:9)? Why was God crushing him without a cause (9:17)?

Finite of mind and lacking all knowledge, Job was unaware that the adverse of God and man had swallowed him whole as a serpent of its prey. Fully convinced that God had "destroyed me on every side" (19:10), Job still maintained his faith and trust in the Almighty. Statements such as, "Though he slay me, yet will I trust in him: but I will maintain mine own ways before him. He also shall be my salvation" (13:15-16a); and "But he knoweth the way that I take: when he hath tried me, I shall come forth as gold" (23:10), seem to be beyond comprehension. Such was Job's faith in God.

Another statement that astounds the reader denotes Job's faith as both strong **and** enduring.

Upright men shall be astonied at this, and the innocent shall stir up himself against the hypocrite. The righteous also shall hold on his way, and he that hath clean

hands shall be stronger and stronger (Job 17:8-9).

Indeed, righteous men are appalled at the destruction of such a just man like Job. Moreover, the slanderous attacks and false accusations hurled at Job, stir our spirits against Eliphaz and his cohorts (4:7-8; 8:5-6; 11:5-6; et al). But Job's attitude that "the righteous" will not only "hold his way" but also "be stronger and stronger" may be the monumental statement of the book!

Job, the righteous man of our text, knew he was innocent of all charges. He could not understand or explain his suffering, but he refused falsely to confess wrong (27:5). Job could say without fear of contradiction, "My foot hath held his steps, his way have I kept, and not declined" (23:11). And, though falsely charged with violence and oppression (22:5-9), he knew God could see all his ways and was counting all his steps (31:4). Therefore, Job would walk in his integrity. He would maintain the right ways of God. He would trust in his Redeemer (19:25).

Job did not understand why God was "destroying" him. Job was unaware that Satan was the persecutor. He could not explain his suffering. But Job knew that by trusting in God through such trials he would come forth "stronger and stronger."

In this life, we also face trials that defy and keep His way. In so doing, we will not only explanation. We cannot understand "Why God is grow stronger and stronger but also glorify and doing this." In truth, man's sufferings originate magnify God. with the adversary, not the Almighty.

Brothers and sisters, let us continue to walk in our integrity. Let us hold the steps of God

CONQUERING AI (Joshua 8)

The lesson of Achan behind them, Joshua and the people of war are encouraged by the Lord to try taking Ai again. In fact, God exhorts his leader, Joshua, saying, "Do not fear or be dismayed...." With sin properly dealt with, God's people could focus on accomplishing the objective they started at Jericho. There is a simple, effective pattern revealed in the taking of Ai that will help us dare greatly in trying to accomplish God's will for us today. In fact, we will utterly fail if we do not follow the principles of this pattern. Notice.

GET YOUR ORDERS FROM GOD (1-2). While it appears that the Lord tells Joshua more than just this (see 8), here we find the specific commands to His leader--"take," "arise," "go," "do," "take," and "set." The commands are straightforward and unambiguous. When I think of God's orders for making and growing disciples, from the teaching to the worship, from the daily living and sharing, He has given us His will for us. We have no wheels to reinvent, only a will to follow!

PLAN YOUR WORK (3-9). Look at how they planned. The leadership was "with all the people" (3,9). Sufficient workers were chosen and sent (3; instead of 3,000, like the first time, he sends out 30,000!). Plans were specifically, thoroughly communicated (4-8). It was emphasized that while he was their earthly leader, this was God's work and His will being followed (8). Think about how God organized His church, with shepherds overseeing our work. For that work to succeed, the leaders should be among the people. The work is of a magnitude that we need so many involved! We need to formulate a plan, a vision with goals and objectives. Then, we need to be reminded that our purpose is to carry out God's will, our very reason for existence (Eph. 3:20-21).

WORK YOUR PLAN (10-29). The heart of this chapter is devoted to the riveting account of the battle. Read through the masterful plan they enact. They lay a trap for Ai and ambush them. Then, the Lord has Joshua do what he had Moses to do in Exodus 17:9 against the Amalekites. As on that day, Joshua holds up his javelin (18) until the battle was

won (26). They kill the 12,000 inhabitants of the city (25), burn the city (28) and executed their king (29). They strictly followed God's orders, taking only the plunder He permitted them to take (27). What happened when they followed the divine orders and plan? Complete success! May I suggest that it can still be that way today! God has promised to be with us (Mat. 28:20; Heb. 13:5-6). As we strive to help the needy (Gal. 6:10; Jas 1:27), build up the saints (1 Th. 5:11; Eph. 4:29), and reach the lost (Acts 8:4; Mat. 28:19), devoting time, mental energy, money, and other resources, we will achieve great success! It's the law of the harvest, of sowing and reaping!

GIVE THE GLORY TO GOD (30-35). This follow up is so impressive. So often, in the throes of victory, we forget whose will and work it is. What does Israel do after this resounding success? They worship wholeheartedly (30), gave prominence and emphasis to the Law (with Joshua even copying the Law of Moses onto uncut stones)(31-33), and read the Word (34-35). This had to etch into the people's minds how this work was God's work and their success was enabled by Him. Today, every success--measured in baptisms, attendance, giving, spiritual maturity, greater involvement, successful event, etc.--should elicit the same response from us. Our hearts should be driven to acknowledge God, worship Him, learn His Word, and remind ourselves that He gives the victory! As Paul said in ending the "doctrinal" section of Romans, so it is today: "For from Him and through Him and to Him are all things. To Him be the glory forever. Amen" (Rom. 11:36)!
