# What Should You Say To Visitors?

o, as you walk through the church building or when sitting in a pew you see a person who is a visitor. What do you say to them? It may be an awkward moment, but it is obvious that saying the right thing is so important. Below are seven ideas of what each of us can say to cause visitors to return again. These ideas are not original (I found them in a blog by Thomas Rainer), but they might help you become a person God can use in an amazing way.

"Thank you for being here." Imagine the impact that saying these simple words would have on visitors to our services. Especially if they heard them many times when they come.

"Let me help you with that." From the moment visitors arrive at our services, the warmth of these words can have a profound impact when they come. It might be helping them carry items into the building—purses, books, diaper bags, coats, etc. The fact you were there, saw their need and offered to help will not be forgotten.

"Please take my seat." Covid-19 and social distancing have created some unusual situations. Imagine a family with two or three children arriving at services and are having trouble finding seats. It would be far easier for you or you and your mate to move to another pew and give your seats to them.

"Here is my email address. Let me know if I can help in any way." These words spoken from your sincere heart reflect the life of Jesus. Newcomers likely have several questions you can answer.

"Can I show you where to go?" Visitors find themselves in a new place not knowing the location of restrooms, nurseries or classrooms. When you see them struggling, go out of your way to help them.

"Let me introduce you to \_\_\_\_." Bring them to one of the preachers or elders. If you learn where they are from or where they work, make sure they meet members who share this in common with them. You will be amazed how "passing a visitor" along to another member will impact their lives.

"Would you join us for lunch?" Almost every week you eat out, perhaps with other members, inviting them to go with the group quickly introduces them to others. Our young adults do an excellent job in this area. Think of how often Jesus ate with others. Studies show what a great impact this has on those who visit.

What would you add to this list? What have you said to visitors which has impacted them?

Just put yourself in the place of a visitor and think of what could be said that will help them see Christ's likeness in the church. Let's work on this together.



# Many Will Seek To Enter And Will Not Be Able

esus "went through the cities and villages" of Perea and was "teaching," while He was "journeying toward Jerusalem" for the last time (<u>Luke 13:22</u>). There were many things He needed to share with the people in these closing weeks of His life.

One message that resonated with "one" of His hearers was when Jesus spoke of "few" who would be "saved" (13:23). Perhaps this follower heard Jesus say, "Narrow is the gate and difficult is the way which leads to life, and (Matt. there are **few** who find it" 7:14). Perhaps He heard Jesus say, "For many are called, but few chosen" (Matt. 20:16). The response of Jesus is striking when the man asked, "Lord, are there few who are saved?" Jesus did not say, "No! What are you talking about?" In fact, Jesus emphasized the point even more.

The words of Jesus in **Luke 13:24** are sobering! He answered intensely, "Strive to enter through the narrow gate, for many, I say to you, will seek to enter and will not be able." Jesus emphasized that the way to salvation is "narrow" (i.e., difficult to navigate), and that one must "strive" (Greek word is *agonizomai*) or "agonize" in every way to enter that narrow door. So, the first part of Jesus' response to the man is affirmative: "Few will be saved!"

The second part of Jesus' response in this verse is just as affirmative. Jesus plays off of the word "few" who will be saved and focuses

on the "many" who will not. Consider carefully what Jesus says: "Many (not a few!), I say to you (not someone else!) will seek to enter (a true desire and endeavor) and will not be able." How sad! How tragic! How sobering! Many will seek to enter into heaven but will not. Why not?

Some seekers will not enter heaven because they have been deceived by human doctrines and are following manmade religion (Mark **7:6-13**). Some seekers will not enter heaven because they do not have a love for the truth and have instead believed a lie (2 Thess. **2:10-12**). Some seekers will not enter heaven because they think that their own goodness or the goodness of their family will secure their entrance (John 8:31-59). Some seekers will not enter heaven because they are led astray by the cares of this world and the deceitfulness of riches (Matt. 13:22). Some seekers will not enter heaven because they are gradually hardened by the deceitfulness of sin in their lives and don't even realize it (Heb. **3:7-18**).

This is no joking matter! This is no "the preacher is too strict" matter! This is an eternal matter that caught a man's attention to ask, "Lord, are there few who are saved?" Jesus said, "Many will seek to enter and will not be able!"
