

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

DO THE WALK

Men's class has been studying through the book of Ephesians. One of the dominant themes in the book is – walking. Knowing this theme can guide us in godly living.

We are to walk in the best behavior. Ephesians 4:1-2 says to "walk in a manner worthy of the calling to which you have been called, in all humility and gentleness and patience, bearing with one another in love." Through the gospel (2 Thess.2:14), God calls us to him. This is a high calling (Phil.3:12-14), a holy calling (I Peter 1:15), a humble calling (I Cor.1:26-29) and a harmonious calling (I Cor.1:9).

Obeying Jesus means we are "created in Christ Jesus unto good works" (Eph.2:10). That same verse says we are to 'walk" in these good works. This exhortation reminds us to be "zealous of good works" (Titus 2:14).

Ephesians 5:1-2 says we are to "walk in love." This is challenging because Paul adds we are to walk in love "as Christ loved us and gave himself up for us" (Eph.5:2). Plus, Ephesians 5:1 says we are "to be imitators of God, as beloved children." Such reminds us of Jesus' conversation with his disciples "as I have loved you, that you also love one another" (John 13:34,35). To be as self-denying and as sacrificial as Jesus is the goal of every faithful Christian.

Likewise, as followers of Christ, we are to "walk as children of light" (Eph.5:8). We were "once darkness, but are now light in the Lord" (Eph.5:8). To walk in the light means we do not participate in works of darkness. The paragraph of Ephesians 5:3-14 lists several works of darkness which should never be "named" among us fornication, impurity, covetousness, filthy talk, foolish talk, crude joking, deception. The point is clear: "because of these things the wrath of God comes upon the sons of disobedience" (Eph.5:6). In fact, we are to "take no part in the unfruitful works of darkness, but instead expose them, for it is shameful even to speak of the things that they do in secret" (Eph.5:11-12).

Ephesians 5:15-21 says we are to "walk in wisdom." Note several wise things: making the most of time (16), understanding the will of God (17), being filled with the Spirit (18), worshipping heartily (19-20), and submitting to one another (21).

I must ask myself – do I read and digest the above passages or merely pass over them? Satan wants us to be preoccupied; he lulls us into a state of unawareness. No wonder Paul adds, "Awake, O sleeper, and arise from the dead, and Christ will shine on you" (Eph.5:14).

Many reasonably good people seldom, if ever, "go to church." Meeting with others to study the Bible, God's word, and to publicly worship Him is something easily ignored in our busy world. To these, church is where you go for a wedding or a funeral, but

The early Christians didn't just "go to church"—they were the church. They were the ekklesia, the "called-out-ones," called out of the world by the gospel of Christ to be a light to the world. They were a community of believers, commonly referred to as "the body of Christ" and even "the bride of Christ." In Christ, they were bound together in "one body. And one Spirit...one hope...one Lord, one faith, one baptism" and "one God." (Ephesians 4:4-6). As such, to not meet with other Christians to encourage one another and jointly express their devotion to the Lord was not considered an option.

Had not the Lord said, "Where two or three are gathered together in my name, there am I in the midst of them" (Matthew 18:20)? Had He not instructed them in the partaking of the Lord's Supper, saying, "This do in remembrance of me" (Luke 22:17-22; 1 Corinthians 11:23-26)? From the first, the church, consisting of penitent baptized believers, "continued steadfastly in the apostles' doctrine, in the fellowship, in the breaking of bread, and in prayers" (Acts 2:42). Acts 20:7 tells us that "Upon the first day of the week...the disciples came together to break bread." Christians who were becoming neglectful were admonished, "Not forsaking the assembling of yourselves who were becoming neglectful were admonished, "Not forsaking the assembling of yourselves together, as the manner of some is, but exhorting one another, and so much the more as ye see the day approaching" (Hebrews 10:25).

Christians are not called to be "lone rangers" in a world hostile to God, but to be bound together with brothers and sisters in Christ in a common struggle. Sharing together in worship and in the word of God should be something much desired by those who love the Lord.

WHAT IS THE PERFECT IN I CORINTHIANS 13:10?

At the time of Paul's writings, I believe the NT was not yet written, incomplete. The "imperfect" I believe is the miraculous spiritual gifts which ceased. What do you think the "perfect" is in 1 Cor. 13:10?

"The perfect" in this passage is the coming completion of the revelation of God to man in what we have today as the New Testament. It is the "perfect law of liberty" according to James 1:25. Ephesians 4 also speaks about the coming of the unity of "the faith." So it was not the incomplete revelation, but the coming completed revelation. That is "that which is perfect/complete."

This makes sense in the context too. What was incomplete? Prophecies, tongues, knowledge. What are those things? They are ways of revealing the truth. Well, when you have all of the truth, then you no longer need those things that reveal the truth to you. Jesus promised that the apostles would be guided into "all truth" (John 16:13). So that is what we must believe that happened.

Paul was speaking at a time when that was not yet accomplished. So, they still needed those prophecies, tongues, and knowledge. However, when that which is perfect/complete is come, then that which is incomplete would be done away.
