ITS TRAVEL TIME FOR THE 17U NATIONALS

We are creeping towards Independence Day, an occasion when Americans celebrate having given the middle finger to England in 1776 and becoming its own nation. Coach Nick DeFendis has his own way of celebrating America's freedom....he and his 17 year old team escape south of the Mason Dixon Line!!!! At this moment, the 17U Nationals are competing in the Music City Classic in Nashville, Tennessee. That will be followed by the annual trek to Atlanta, Georgia for the prestigious nationwide Perfect Game World Wood Bat 17U tournament.

In recent years, Richmond County has made an excellent showing in the land of Dixie. Two years ago, the Nationals lost just one game on the entire trip. These tournaments serve an excellent purpose: A. A new set of recruiters are there to see our players an evaluate where they belong on the college level. And....some of the recruiters from New York head to that tournament and can compare our players to the nationwide rosters. B. It's good that our players compare themselves to the players on other teams outside New York and New Jersey. You need to see what other solid players look like so you can make your game even better. You may find that you compare very favorably to the top players on other teams. Or you may see that improvements in your game must be done

to improve your recruiting status.

C. RCBC teams bond well when they travel. Plus it's good to be away from Mommy and Daddy, at least for a little bit.

D. Since the trips are "ALL BASE-BALL," the players focus on games and practices, and very little else. Of course there is fun time, but this is a baseball trip.

E. And....naturally we hope to get our players on the radar of the college recruiters in attendance. Start the college ball rolling.

When Coach DeFendis and my team return to New York, it will be just for a little bit. In late July, both 17 year old teams, Nationals and Americans, will be heading to Cincinnati for a week-long event. Again, there will be recruiters eyeing our players. Meanwhile, on the home-front, there will be action at the RCBC Complex during the July 4th week.

Serious baseball players in the northeast MUST take advantage of the warm weather of June-July-August, and even the mild weather in September. Since our springs "suck," the summer allows players to play a cluster of games with few interruptions. This allows you to work on the areas of your game that need improvement.

Featured Article - Effective Two Strike Hitting By Coach Nick DeFendis

One of the most important areas of offensive baseball is the ability to make good contact with two strikes. The most successful pitchers have the ability to "turn it up a notch" when they have the hitter in a two strike situation. Unfortunately, many hitters do not raise their level of competitiveness accordingly. Not only does a hitter need to make physical adjustments, but he must also turn up his mental focus to prepare for the upcoming confrontation. It should be "personal."

Here are some ideas in dealing with the two strike situation:

- 1. Mental Outlook Imagine yourself backed into a corner of an alley. Someone confronts you and wants your last five dollars. You can either:
- A. Submit and give up
- B. Try and negotiate a settlement
- C. Fight your way out of it

We would like players to have the "C" mentality

- 2. Physical Adjustments -
- A. Choke up on the bat slightly. Bat control is important
- B. Move slightly closer to the plate. Take away the outside strike
- C. Spread out slightly to ensure balance
- D. Slightly crouch to shorten the strike zone. This adjustment helps in identifying and laying off the high pitch

Featured Article - Effective Two Strike Hitting (cont'd) By Coach Nick DeFendis

- 3. Mental Adjustments Taking a third strike is unacceptable. There is no doubt that sometimes a hitter is fooled by a great pitch, and he cannot pull the trigger. However, this situation requires a feisty, competitive mode.
- A. Look fastball and adjust
- B. Look to go up the middle and opposite field. Protect outside to in
- C. Foul off any borderline strikes
- D. Fight off or block off inside strikes
- 4. Ultimate Objective Putting the ball in play has so many possibilities. Keep the strikeouts down to find a correlation with run production. The difference between ten strikeouts and six strikeouts in a contest is huge! The difference with those four contacts can result in any of the following:
- A. Advanced runners
- B. Forced errors
- C. Bloop hits
- D. Bad hops/lost in the sun
- E. Frustrated pitcher
- 5. Conclusion
- A. Effective two strike hitting can be enhanced in practice settings
- B. Establish count settings in the cages or in front toss drills
- C. Include this in batting practice scenarios live on the field
- D. Players must understand the concepts and see the fruits of their labor.

Coaches should be complementary when players compete in two strike situations.
