The Coalition's goal is to provide a safe way to reopen baseball, declaring "We want a dialogue with governing officials as to how to reopen baseball activities. We have safe solutions to propose. Play Ball. Stay Safe."

2020 Tournament Update

Our May tournament schedule was also canceled due to the continued lockdown requirements. We are hopeful that the schedule can resume later in June. For those PG events that were canceled, we have added a new event to our schedule, the PG Super25 Summer Super Qualifier on August 7-9 for 10U, 11U, 12U and 13U. Additional events may be added as well.

For RCBC teams that have had their tournaments canceled, we will attempt to make up with other events later in the season.




RCBC Member "Return To Baseball" Survey Results

Thanks to everyone who responded to our member "Return To Baseball" survey. We received over 120 responses which is a good representation of our members. Here are the results.

1. How comfortable are you returning to playing baseball in general - 65% said they were "very comfortable" (10) while an additional 14% gave it an 8 or 9.




2. Are you willing to travel outside of Staten Island for tournaments or league games - 73% said "yes definitely" (10) while an additional 8% gave it an 8 or 9.






"Return To Baseball" Survey Results (cont'd)

3. How comfortable are you traveling by airplane - mixed responses as 21% said they were "very comfortable" (10) while 30% said they would not fly at all (0).






4. How comfortable are you traveling by bus or van - 34% said they were "very comfortable" (10) while 15% said they "would not travel at all" (0).






5. How comfortable are you staying at a hotel - 54% said they were "comfortable" (8, 9, 10) while 12% "would not stay at all" (0).






"Return To Baseball" Survey Results (cont'd)

5. How comfortable are you of your son being in the dugout with other players - 77% said they were "comfortable" (8, 9, 10).




6. How comfortable are you if your son has to wear a mask during practices or games - mixed responses here as well with 31% "very comfortable" (10), 14%




middle of the road (5), 17% very uncomfortable (1) and 10% "would not let their son play at all" (0).

8. How do you feel if spectators are not allowed at the games - 19% said they were "OK with it" (10), 20% were middle of the road (5), 25% were not OK with it (1, 2) and



12% "would not let their son play at all" (0).

Comments:

The overwhelming response was "let's play ball" with most people being anxious to get back to baseball.

Ensuring that safety precautions and procedures (e.g., social distancing) were in place was also raised.

The most repeated concern was wearing masks on the field or during games. Many felt that there would be other health risks in doing so. Unfortunately we do not know what the requirements will be once we go back. This may be driven by state or even venue requirements.
