

Local Pros To Compete In Reading Open Golf Tourney Starting Today

Rod Munday, Mike Rooney and Dave Hendry among field of 138 professionals entered.

Reading, Pa.—More than 50 members of the PGA's touring links brigade, upwards of 40 "working pros" from clubs within a radius of 75 miles of this city and the district's leading amateurs are all set to tee off in the fifth annual \$15,000 Reading Open golf

tournament at the Berklegh Country club this morning. Rod Munday, Country Club of York; Mike Rooney, Cool Creek Country club, and Dave Hendry, Hanover Country club, will represent York county in the event.

Munday is scheduled to tee off at 2:29 p. m. (DST) in a threesome with Al Smith, Danville, Pa., and George Griffin, Jr., Conshohocken.

Rooney starts his round at 12:30 p. m. (DST) in company with Bob Richmond, Dallas, Tex., and Jim Simpson, Fort Worth, Tex.

Hendry's starting time is 12:23 p. m. (DST) and he will be paired with Mike Hansen, Allentown, and Robert Dinsmore, Reading.

The first threesome in the event is scheduled to start action at 9:12 a. m. with the final golfers leaving the starting tee at 2:57 p. m.

Eighteen-hole rounds will be played Thursday through Sunday on the 6,600-yard par-70 Berklegh course, ten miles north of the city on the Reading-Allentown highway near Kutztown.

Lloyd Mangrum, of Niles, Ill., and Jim Ferrer, transplanted Australian, now playing out of San Francisco, the year's two leading money-winners, head the star-studded field, which also includes Dr. Cary Middlecoff, holder of the Reading Open record—a 266 fired at the Reading Country club in the 1949 classic, and winner of the Eastern Open in Baltimore last week with a 279.

The Philadelphia district will be represented by such outstanding entries as George Fazio, Conshohocken; Dave Douglas, Wilmington; Willie Polombo, Kennett Square, and Rod Munday, of York, Philadelphia PGA champion, Teri Johnson, pro at the DuPont Country club, Wilmington, Del., only golfer ever to can a hole-in-one in the Reading Open, also will be on hand.

Munday was the recent winner of the Philadelphia District PGA tournament. The Country Club of York pro was nothing less than sensational in the 1948 Reading Open at the Berkshire when he started with rounds of 65 and 67 to share the halfway lead with Freddie Haas. He followed with 72 and 72 for a 72-hole score of 276 and a cash reward of \$590, largest ever collected by a "working pro" in the Reading classic.

Munday's victim in the Philadelphia District finals this year, incidentally, was Henry Williams, Jr., 2 and 1, and the popular Berklegh pro would like nothing better than to outscore his friendly enemy in the coming 72-hole test.

Officials of the tournament announced last night that all but four of the nation's leading professionals are included in the field of 138 professionals who will vie for the \$15,000 prize.

Ben Hogan, Jimmy Demaret, Sam Snead and E. J. (Dutch) Harrison are the absentees. Snead and Harrison are engaged in a series of exhibition matches in Hawaii at the present time.

Pete Kilgore Is Susquehanna Batting Champ

Lucky A.A. infielder compiles spectacular .505 average to cop crown. Merle Reidel, Windsor star, is runnerup.

Pete Kilgore, hard-hitting infielder of the Lucky nine, captured the individual batting championship of the Susquehanna Baseball league for the 1951 season with a lusty .505 average. Going to bat 97 times, Kilgore banded out 49 hits to win the title. Players had to go to bat 85 times to be eligible for the batting crown.

Merle Reidel, whose hitting was a major factor in Windsor gaining a playoff berth and eventually winning the post-season championship title, was the runnerup to Kilgore with an impressive .470 average. Reidel collected 55 hits, highest total in the league, in 117 times at bat.

The Conrads nine, which finished in a deadlock with Lucky for the regular season pennant, and then won the flag in a playoff, had the highest team batting mark with a .340 average. Winterstown with a .330 average was the runner-up in the team hitting.
