The New Year: A Time for Laughter

I was present when an elder gathered her flock at the front of the church for the pre-Christmas children's message. In a very serious and studious voice, she asked her young brood, "Does anybody know what season it is?" Without hesitation, her four-year old grandson cried out, "Duck!" The congregation fell into chaotic laughter. This was a "God moment." The congregation needed to laugh after negotiating a very difficult time in its corporate life. The child's innocent response reminded the congregation that we should not take ourselves too seriously.

I was recently reading excerpts from the minutes of the FPC in Monticello, AR where Elder Lamar Williamson was the Clerk of Session from 1916-1957. (I know some of you will say, "Mark, you need to get a life!") These excerpts, however, are from ...A Time to Laugh complied and edited by Jerry Tompkins. Throughout his tenure Mr. Williamson took seriously Eccles. 3:4b- "..., and a time to laugh;."

In recording the finances of the church he penned, "The Pastor reported the condition of the Treasury to be low (like the outside thermometer and the inside spiritual conditions) but not alarming: in other words, worse after being better." Regarding membership, he quipped, "....Mrs. Campster requested no Letter because the Baptist Church does not recognize the existence or validity of the Presbyterian Church, but the Session insisted on recognizing our Baptist brethren and loving them whether they like it or not." The Pastor was not immune. The Session minutes of Oct. 19, 1941, stated, "The Pastor urged each of the elders to attend the Evening Service to hear his report on 'Synod of Arkansas.' Six of the seven elders did so,- and wondered why." He also poked fun at himself when he wrote, ".... The Clerk also appeared but was entirely out of harmony with the proceedings, and was therefore properly ignored." As Presbyterians we take seriously our tasks of helping individuals and the institutions glorify God. We, however, can't take our role and ourselves too seriously. At our base, Presbyterians do what we do best when we live according to the answer to the first question of the Westminster Shorter Catechism "What is the chief end of man [sic]?" When we "glorify God and enjoy Him forever" we can and need to have fun, laugh at ourselves and do what we do with a joyful spirit. (Perhaps our denominations declining membership is because we have been taking our tasks, our polity issues, our monetary problems and ourselves way too seriously.)

Let's resolve to have fun this year. Let's resolve to build in and celebrate opportunities for laughter. Let's resolve to be joy-filled ambassadors of Jesus. If you are not having fun, doing what you are doing, perhaps a New Year's resolution is in order.

Butterflies are a symbol of new life. Connect the dotted lines and color the butterfly with the colors listed below, or your choice of colors.



STEWARDSHIP FOOD FOR THOUGHT

TOOLS FOR LIVING WELL: BUDGETING IN TOUGH TIMES

The Philosophy: In times of economic stress, setting the annual church budget can be daunting. Whether resources are few or plentiful, it is helpful to think of the process not as a spending exercise, but as investing decisions to build God's Kingdom. A strong budget process can drive strategic thinking about how a church fulfills its unique calling within God's kingdom. Along those lines, it is helpful to do the following:

- Engage ministry leaders, encouraging them to take ownership of their budgets and to be accountable for actual results-they know their ministries best and can make informed decisions about prioritizing investments.
- Require individual ministries to show "all in" costs for each ministry (postage, staff resources, promotion, events, etc.) so they have a clear understanding of the resources needed to support their ministries.
- Link the budget and stewardship messages. Do not just ask members to support the church; provide tools to help them manage their personal finances from a Biblical perspective.

The process: Churches should start the budgeting process early, allowing time for thoughtful planning consistent with overall ministry goals for the next year and awareness of the local economy. Our church's fiscal year is the calendar year. The annual budget process is as follows:

- In September, a "top-down" budget is prepared with guidance and expectations management from the staff leadership team and finance committee and is communicated to the staff, church governance board and congregation.
- In October this budget is updated from the "bottom up" as ministry leaders submit detailed budgets showing curriculum, personnel resources, events, etc. for the coming year by ministry. The staff leadership team and finance committee review these plans and may make changes for relative strategic investment and consistency with the overall church plans for the next year.
- In November and December budgets go to ministry committees for review and input. Committee ownership is essential, as the committees are charged with discerning God's will for the individual ministries and they will present/defend the budgets to the governing board.
- In December the budget is sent to the church governing board for preliminary review, pending the final actual results of the current year.
- In January the finance committee and governing board review the final current year results (which typically are difficult to predict during the year since 20 percent of our congregational contributions come in during December) and the final budget is approved by the governing board.

Adjusting to the current economic climate: In the face of economic crisis and fear, it is important that the church be a non-anxious presence. At the same time, it is vital for ministry leaders to acknowledge the anxiety and communicate expectations about the church's steps toward responsible stewardship. Other things to consider:

- Annual budgets often have a "faith element"- the gap between written pledges received and the income
 needed to cover planned expenses. This may be larger than usual this year, as members are nervous to
 commit in this economy.
- It may be helpful for faith communities to prepare several budget versions for differing scenarios: 7

- 1. Business as usual—the regular church budget
- 2. Prudent budget focusing on potential savings for discretionary items such as carpet replacement, new choir robes, etc.
- 3. Conservative or flat budget with no increases across the board
- 4. Reductions budget identifying areas of potential expense cuts beyond discretionary spending
- If budget cuts are a probability, leaders should discuss these **before** a crisis hits and nerves and emotions fray. While these types of discussions are not easy, having them now rather than in the midst of the crisis may lead to better decisions. Be transparent-let the faith community know that contingency plans have been made and potential hard decisions have been carefully deliberated, but that the church is moving forward in faith and hopes to implement these plans.

Al Holtkamp recently sent this:

So what have we learned in 2 millennia?

"The budget should be balanced, the Treasury should be refilled, public debt should be reduced, the arrogance of officialdom should be tempered and controlled, and the assistance to foreign lands should be curtailed lest *ROME* become bankrupt. People must again learn to work, instead of living on public assistance."

Apparently nothing!

They were touched at receiving the trays of goodies and expressed their joy and appreciation for being remembered. A large bowl of these goodies were also delivered to Care Free Living for all their residents.

We have called upon our church family for assistance many times during the year. We appreciate and thank you for your willingness and eagerness to help. What a blessing you have been! We couldn't have done it without you.
