The book of the month is non-fiction WHEN LIFE COMES UNDONE by T. J. and Mary Ann Addington.

"Life comes undone for all of us; and when it does, we live with the pain, uncertainty, and questions that come with it." Using biblical perspective, When Life Comes Undone, can help you navigate those times when life is hard and hope is scarce. The book is written out of deep, personal experiences with catastrophic illnesses, and speaks to the question of suffering with the candor and honesty that comes from grappling with pain firsthand. In the midst of pain and suffering, this book will help you:

- -Turn your human scars into divine scars.
- -Understand why bad things happen to God's people.
- -Develop bold faith and understand God's grace and love.
- -Pray boldly.
- -Take life back.
- -Experience the freedom that pain can bring.
- -See how God takes the pain in our lives and turns it into something good and meaningful.
- T. J. writes that *life undone* moments are *unlikely gifts* that forge deeper faith and a closer relationship with our God. *When life Comes Undone,* looks at pain and suffering from both a human and divine perspective, and shows how hard times forge God's character in us like nothing else can. It is a book of hope when life looks hopeless.

Presbyterian Heritage

Many young Presbyterians in the 1940s and 1950s participated in Westminster Fellowship programs. Whether through summer camps, youth conventions, Bible studies, or service projects, Presbyterian young people aged 12 to 23 joined together to enhance their relationships with God, the church, and their peers all over the world. A major gathering of Presbyterian young people occurred in the summer of 1950, when representatives from 45 states descended upon Grinnell College in Grinnell Iowa, to attend the second Westminster Fellowship National Assembly. Modeled after the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in the U.S.A., the gathering provided "an occasion for deep thinking, and penetrating examination of beliefs." Activities included miniature assemblies, seminars, worship, lectures by Presbyterian leaders, singing, sports, and the publication of a daily newspaper, all focused on the theme "Set Aflame His Story." Of the 1,800 delegates, 40 came from outside the United States. The start of the Korean War as delegates traveled to the National Assembly drew particular attention from attendees.

During the assembly youth discussed and debated other pressing issues of the day. Delegates supported the call for a desegregated church and society, and wrestled with the issue of academic freedom in public schools.

Through Westminster Fellowship, Presbyterian youth created new venues for worship, work, study, and friendship that helped them "discover God's will for their lives" and participate in a larger youth movement centered on their faith.

As Christians, our conscience usually nags us terribly after the indiscretion. The larger bad acts like theft of property, murder, or arson, we fear public retribution, and will listen to our conscience more easily. Picture the devil on one shoulder and God on the other whispering in your ear. Which one will you listen too?





RECIPE FOR SEPTEMBER

Taco Casserole

Ingredients

1 pound ground turkey (or ground beef)

1 packet taco seasoning mix

3/4 cup water

1 can (16 oz.) diced tomatoes

1 can (16 oz.) pinto beans, drained & rinsed


2 cups tortilla chips or broken taco shells

1 cup shredded cheddar cheese

4 green onions

1 red bell pepper, diced

1 cup lettuce, chopped



Directions

- 1. Cook ground turkey in skillet until browned. Drain. Add taco seasoning packet and water. Cook about 5 minutes or until sauce is thickened. Add diced tomatoes. Bring to a boil. Reduce heat. Cover and simmer about 10 minutes stirring occasionally.
- 2. Add pinto beans. Cook uncovered another 5 10 minutes or until liquid from tomatoes is reduced.
- 3. In an ungreased 2-quart casserole dish, place broken tortilla chips or taco shells. Top with beef mixture. Sprinkle with cheese. Microwave about 3 minutes to melt cheese.
- 4. Top with lettuce, green onions, and red bell pepper. **Add Salsa if desired.
