

Great Evening of Worship on Good Friday

The stop sign on Good Hope Rd. slowed traffic just enough to allow drivers and passengers time to take in an unexpected image. A man draped in a white sheet was walking slowly along the street carrying a large wooden cross. It was an image that served as a powerful reminder that it was Good Friday.

"Somebody actually stopped and said, 'Thank you for your salvation," said Scotty Lewis, one of the four men who carried the cross. Linwood Holland, Richard Okogun and Clarence Snuggs also took turns portraying Jesus for a total of two hours.

"This is nothing compared to the ridicule, the struggle, the abuse that He suffered," said Snuggs. "I just tried to think about that and every step I was just trying to anticipate



what He was going through. It was a humbling experience."

Still carrying the cross, Snuggs led a procession of mourners into the sanctuary. Each of the mourners was dressed in all black and wore a red ribbon pinned over their hearts to symbolize the blood of Jesus. They then brought the congregation along on a memorable journey through the 14 Stations of the Cross. "The ultimate goal was

to get the congregation to experience what the people that were with Jesus in His last days experienced." said Eric Quarles, who, along with Audrey Alleyne, organized the service. "We wanted to create atmosphere or mood. We wanted to get people to focus on the setting, putting themselves in the place. It was supposed to be a dark service, kind of like a funeral service."

The sanctuary was dimly lit and there was no accompaniment for the hymns that were sung. The focus was on Jesus' journey to Calvary.

The readers for each of the 14 stations offered powerful and emotional accounts, beginning with Jesus being condemned to

death and ending with his body in the tomb. And after the closing prayer by Pastor Stacey Cole Wilson, the congregation left the sanctuary in silence.

The service opened with an uplifting liturgical dance by Faith In Motion before delving into the darker tone that followed. According to the program, the Stations of the Cross began as a devotion in the Middle Ages for people who couldn't travel to the Holy Land to experience Jesus' journey to Calvary. Nine of the 14 stations are taken directly from scripture, while the remaining five are taken from early Christian tradition.

Darnell Davis and the Remnant Move Gospel Music Forward

A quilt is a blanket made up of several different pieces of fabric. The best quilts share a cohesive theme that can warm your heart as easily as curling up under one warms your body. Gospel music can work the same way and the new release by Darnell Davis and the Remnant is one quilt of an album. The 12 tracks on "Moving Forward" range in style from old school gospel to praise songs to slow, solo-driven tunes with a deep message. A quick listen might not be enough to truly enjoy the album, but with time you may find some beauty in this quilt.

"Moving Forward" is Darnell Davis and the Remnant's fourth studio album and their first on the RCA Inspiration label. Davis first received recognition as a songwriter and producer for his work on the 2002 album "Soul Interpretations" by Minneapolis-based choir Excel-



sior. That album won a Stellar Award in 2002 and was nominated for a Grammy in 2003.

The first time I listened to the new album, I caught glimpses of influential artists all over - Hezekiah Walker here, Tye Tribbett there and a little James Fortune for good measure. The next few times I played it, I started to hear the twists Davis put on those familiar sounds.

Tracks like "So In Love With You" and "Moving Forward" sound like they were

written for Kirk Franklin, and they also happen to be some of the more enjoyable songs of the bunch. Praise songs "It Won't Work" and "I've Got the Victory" are fun and forceful, but depending on your mood, can also make you feel like someone is shouting at you. The various sounds between help to balance out these two extremes.


The writer/producer label might not be enough to describe Davis. I'm not sure how often I use the term "band leader" in reference to gospel singers, but anyone who blends a horn section, electric guitar and Hammond organ in one song is worthy of the label. Listen close and you will hear a jam session in the background of most of the up-tempo tracks. The choir has its moments, too. Sudden shifts in harmony or an unexpected leap from a high note to a really, really high note can be expected throughout the album.

I like the quilt that Darnell Davis and the Remnant has put together. If you stare long enough at the patchwork, you might enjoy it as well.





of art that had been collected and presented in a way that would capture the hearts of anyone who steps foot in this independent, grassroots establishment. The young men had an opportunity to see and touch an actual cross-section of a slave clipper ship, huts built by real indigenous African tribes, and hand made textiles and furniture dating back

hundreds of years. After taking in such a plethora of information, I can't begin to describe how eye opening the experience was.

Each session lasts about an hour. There is no "teacher" per se, and members of the group sometimes take turns facilitating the discussion, which is often deep and insightful. We consider ourselves travelers not only because we set out to study the entire bible from Genesis to Revelation, but because we discuss practical steps for daily spiritual growth, and examine ways to apply The Word in our lives. The journey is enlightening.

The group takes a break from its routine whenever there is a church-wide bible study, such as during Lent. This year, as in the past, we welcomed additional participants during the Lenten bible study, as we engaged in spirited discussion of the book *Give up something bad for Lent*. Without exception, all participants enjoyed the writer's style. They found it simple, but engaging. They could relate to the illustrations and gained new insight from them. Discussion was candid, as people confessed to having bad habits and engaging in selfpity, among other things. We read familiar passages, such as Luke 9:10-17 and Luke 19:1-10, with new vision, and felt empowered to do more to represent Christ.

As a catalyst for self-examination, *Give up Something Bad* does the job. Bitterness (week 1) and harsh judgments (week 2) were challenging topics to start with. Personal accounts were sparse, but the conversation was meaningful. By weeks 3 and 4 we were making reference to the earlier lessons, and deepening our conversation with what we had learned. Lent 2014 had the potential to sharpen our discipleship focus like never before. With resurrection power in us, we can realize in a new way what it means to be Easter People.


