Thomas Pettigrew, Rector of the Church of the Holy Cross in Warrensburg, NY, a local re-enactor and history student of our area. We also thank our staff; our vestry and those who have helped us celebrate 250th commemorative events for the past year. And we thank all of you in attendance. If you are 'regulars' we are blessed to share this day with you as we move into the next 250 years of ministry. And if you are visiting, we invite you to be a part of the St. John's family. You are always welcome to worship and minister with us.

In closing, I end with words of prayer used fifty years ago by the Rev. Robert H. Brock, 29th Rector of this parish, as he welcomed people to the 200th anniversary of St. John's Fr. Brock wrote:

"Let us pray for each other and ask God's blessings upon our efforts to labor and build upon the foundation already laid for the Glory of God and the advancement of His Kingdom."

May we continue to love, to pray, to worship, to work, to minister and to heal in the name of Christ for the next 250 years!

"Make It Simple"

Stewardship is a lifelong journey, but it doesn't have to be complicated. In fact the roadmap that we are using is called "Make it Simple". These are the four themes that will guide us on our journey together:

- 1. Following Jesus Jesus comes to us in the midst of our fears and announces—"Do not worry! God has provided for all of your needs!" What does it mean for us to live in relationship with Jesus? How might our daily discipleship help us to live more simply, trusting in God's abundance?
- **2.** Facing the Truth Imagine being one of the disciples in the boat. When you decide to wake Jesus up, what would you expect of him? What do you need from Jesus in the midst of the storms of your life? Can you hear Jesus' question in the moments of calm in your life? "Why are you afraid? Have you no faith?"

Jesus' question can lead us to hear the words of the psalmist, "Create in me, O God...put a new and right spirit within me...Do not cast me away...do not take away...Restore to me...sustain in me..." Look at all that God does in our lives. Where do we focus? On the wind and waves? Can we focus instead on what God provides? And how do our choices matter for what we see?

3. Acting Together - Jesus commands us to love one another—he calls us into relationships, he calls us into his community. His command is to love one another "as he has loved us!" In this community we move into relationship with Jesus and one another.

This truly is a radical command—in our culture of individualism, none of us has enough. We all are driven to get more. But in this community of Jesus' disciples, we begin to see that God provides us with more than enough!

4. Enough to Share - If we focus on the scarcity, we never have enough. When we focus on God's abundant blessings, there is more than we can ever imagine. Recognizing God's abundant blessings we experience Paul's message to the Philippians in our own lives. We can be content with what we have because we know that we are blessed and can "do all things through him who strengthens us."


