A Tribute to Our Heritage

Please join us in a celebration of our 200th anniversary on Sunday, February 22, 2015, at 3:00 p.m.! We will commemorate the George Washington Birthday Feaste, first held in this church on February 22, 1887, by holding "A Tribute to Our Heritage." It will include brief histories of our 200 years and special music,

both vocal and instrumental, that was sung or played "of ye olden tyme." A reception in the Fellowship Hall will follow the service.

The first George Washington
"Feaste" was an elaborate
and gala affair, sponsored by
the Ladies of the First
Presbyterian Church on
February 22, 1887. It was
held in an assembly hall over
Rea's Livery Stable on Main
Street. Over the years, the
location of the feaste changed
from various public
buildings, private homes, and

finally to the church's Fellowship Hall.

It grew into one of the community's biggest church dinners with people waiting in line outside the church to purchase tickets. At some time, the "feaste" became known as a "tea" even though full meals were always served. Everything was done with silver service and beautifully ironed linens. The tea continued to be an annual event in the Madison community until 1955, with the exception of 1918, due to coal being scarce. The tea was again held for the church's 175th anniversary in 1990.

The first event had invitations written on butcher's paper in old-fashioned English script and sent throughout the town requesting folks to attend dressed in Colonial costumes. Many did so, making a lovely and colorful march led by individuals portraying George Washington and his wife, Martha. The young girls of the Sunday school, dressed in colonial gowns, acted as waitresses.


The meals consisted of a bountiful supper.

Throughout the years, the menu included roasted whole pig, ham, veal loaf, roast pie, chicken, and scalloped oysters. Baked beans became a dish that was traditionally served at the tea. Doughnuts, along with pies and cakes, appeared on the dessert menus. In 1899, the cost was 10 cents for admission, and supper cost 15 cents. In 1907, in addition to the 25 cents for the meal, you could purchase frozen cream and cake.

Programs appeared to vary from year to year. The 1899 event featured Scottish-American entertainment consisting of Scotch

songs and recitations. In 1907, there was singing of songs from olden times, including "Auld Lang Syne." In 1937, The Courtship of Miles Standish was read, and there were tableaux of John Alden and Miles Standish and of John Alden and Priscilla at their wedding. This was followed by singing of songs such as "Yankee Doodle," "America," and "Auld Lang Syne."

Do you know about the new look for marriage and family? Our society has changed dramatically over the last 60 years, and nowhere have these changes been seen more clearly than

in the family unit. Many households have two working parents, with six in ten wives, according to the Pew Research Center, working outside the home. Couples living together are less likely to be married and more likely to be interracial or of the same sex. Children may come from previous relationships or marriages or they may be adopted. And many couples, struggling with debt, are postponing or choosing not to have children altogether.

People living in the United States, according to the Pew Research Center, are pretty evenly divided in how they view this growing variety of family types: 34 percent think the change is good, 29 percent think it's bad, and 32 percent think it doesn't make much of a difference either way.

The vast majority of Americans rank family as the most important part of their lives. In fact, 75 percent say they are "very satisfied" with their family, and 85 percent say that their current family unit is just as close or even closer than their family of origin.

The question for the church is whether some, all, or none of these changes are faithful to the gospel. Scripture itself presents many different kinds of family and reflects evolving definitions, ranging from patriarchal families with multiple wives to violence and incest to monogamy to chosen singleness to church as family to more genderegalitarian relationships. Do you know that a "white paper" on ordination standards, marriage has been released? The Office of Theology and Worship of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) has released a "white paper" titled "Our Challenging Way: Faithfulness, Sex, Ordination and Marriage" on its website. It is intended to help Presbyterian leaders and congregations interpret the General Assembly's actions in light of historical, theological, denominational and cultural contexts.

The paper comes months after the 221st General Assembly (2014) took significant and controversial action on the church's understanding of Christian marriage. A discussion guide for engaging the paper currently is in development and will be posted on the webpage as soon as it is available. 
