

On 02/23/15 at approximately 1516 hours I, Officer Kennerly, was advised by Montgomery County Radio Dispatch that Montgomery County Precinct 3 Deputy Sandoval, (8332), was out on Shannon Trammer, Texas driver's license number xxx, at Spring Trails Bend/Frost Springs Ln. Trammer was showing to have outstanding warrants through Oak Ridge North. I confirmed one outstanding warrant and met Sandoval at the Texaco at Rayford/Richards. I took custody of Trammer and asked her if she could pay the warrants. Trammer advised yes. I transported her to 27424 Robinson Road at the Oak Ridge North Municipal Courthouse, where she made restitution for warrant number 901650A01, for Failure To Appear/Bail Jumping for a fine amount of \$119.00. Trammer was released at that point.

On 02/23/15 at approximately 1653 hours I, Officer Kennerly, went to a family violence in progress at 19565 Carmita to assist Montgomery County Sheriff's Department. Myself and Officer Helton made the scene first. Paul Rhodes, Texas driver's license number xxx, was the actor. Prior to our arrival, Rhodes was hitting his mother and brother with an umbrella. As Rhodes walked out of the house, he picked up a concrete block and threw it into the windshield of his mother's car. Rhodes was in the garage behind the house when we arrived. We approached the door, me with my duty weapon drawn and Helton with his taser. I made contact with Rhodes and ask him to step outside. He complied. I asked him to put his hands against the wall so I could check him for weapons. He complied with that as well. After checking him for weapons, I started to grab his arms to detain him but he immediately took his hands off the wall and ran inside the garage saying, "I am not going to be put in handcuffs again and I not going to jail again". Rhodes said that his dad is about to be here and he would go with him, because they are going out to eat today. I asked Rhodes to calm down, but he continually got louder, saying that he was not about to go to jail. I tried to continue to calmly talk with him and convince him that we had to detain him and figure out what was going on. Officer Helton had his taser on him the whole time I was trying to talk to him. Rhodes then said, "I will let you put handcuffs on me, if you make him go away with that taser". I advised Rhodes that he would not be tased if he would just cooperate. Rhodes then tried to step out of the garage as if he were about to run from us. I jumped in front of him, unholstered my taser, and told him to put his hands behind his back. He finally complied. Officer Helton put Rhodes against the wall, and started placing handcuffs on him as I continued holding my taser on him. Rhodes was resisting a little, but Helton was able

to cuff him without too much trouble. This is not the first time that we have had to assist at this location with Rhodes. The last time Rhodes broke every window in his mother's house and assaulted his mother and brother as well. I had to tase him on that call, because he was resisting three other Officers. Rhodes has some mental health problem, but I am unsure of the diagnoses. MCSO arrived and took custody of Rhodes after we detained him.

On 02/23/15 at approximately 0920 hours I, Sgt. Nation, checked out at the Liberty County Jail located at 2400 Beaumont Ave., Liberty, TX. in reference to a warrant service on Joshua Daniel Marlow, w/m, dob xxx. The Liberty County Sheriff had detained Mr. Marlow on the following Oak Ridge North Capias Pro Fine Warrant: Driving While License Invalid - #25168502 with a fine amount of \$432.20. I made contact with Mr. Marlow as he was being release from the Sheriff's custody and I executed his warrant. I transported Mr. Marlow to the South Montgomery County Jail. Upon our arrival to the jail, Mr. Marlow was booked in on the Capias Pro Fine Warrant and released to jail staff without incident.

On 02/23/15 at approximately 1420 hours I, Sgt. Nation, checked out at the Harris County Jail located at 1201 Commerce St., Houston, TX. in reference to a warrant service on Christina Marie Toland, w/f, dob 04/18/77, and Felicia Shay Fessenden, w/f, dob 07/01/92. Harris County Sheriff's Dept. had detained Ms. Toland on the following three Oak Ridge North Municipal Warrants: Allowing Unlicensed Person To Drive - #10252401, Fail To Maintain Financial Responsibility - #10252402, and Failure To Appear/Bail Jumping - #102524F01 for a total in fines and court cost of \$927.00. Ms. Fessenden also being held by the Harris County Sheriff's Office on the following two warrants: Expired Registration - #10372801 and Failure To Appear - #103728F01 for a total in fines and court cost of \$595.00. I executed all warrants on both females. Ms. Toland and Ms. Fessenden both wanted to pay their fines to the court in lieu of going to the Montgomery County Jail. I transported both females to the Oak Ridge North Municipal Court. Upon our arrival to the court, Ms. Toland and Ms. Fessenden both paid their fines and court cost to the court and were released.

On 02/25/15 at approximately 1600 hours I, Officer Kennerly, was listening to Montgomery County Radio Dispatch when they aired an attempt to locate at Robinson/Hanna for a red Ford F-250, bearing Texas license plate number DBR3046. The truck was last seen heading westbound toward IH 45 from that intersection. The truck was reported by Mindy Vanschoick, the wife of the driver, later identified as, Christopher Vanschoick, Texas driver's license number xxx. Mindy stated that Christopher was in possession of marijuana and liquid steroids. I was waiting on the overpass at Woodlands Parkway and observed the truck take the northeast loop of Robinson to get on the IH 45 North Service Road. I got turned around and attempted to catch up with the vehicle. I finally caught up to the vehicle at the on ramp to get on IH 45 North. I was a few cars behind Vanschoick and observed him disregard a traffic control device in order to get in the second lane from the right. I activated my emergency lights but was still a couple of cars behind him. As I got closer to him, I observed Vanschoick throw a plastic bag full of numerous items out the driver side window, which spread out over a couple of lanes on the main lanes upon contacting the roadway. I continued pursuing Vanschoick. He exited at the HWY 242 exit and pulled into the BJ's restaurant parking lot. I told Vanschoick, by my PA system, to step out of the vehicle with his hands up and walk toward me with his back facing me. He complied and was detained. Oak Ridge North Officer McGrew and Sergeant Barry were able to collect the evidence that Vanschoick threw out of his vehicle and on to the roadway. Fortunately, some of the evidence had not been destroyed by other vehicles running over it. Christopher was placed in custody, was mirandized, and advised he understood his rights. He was transported to the Oak Ridge North Police Department for paperwork. While at the Police Department, Vanschoick advised that the items that he threw out contained approximately 2 to 3 grams of marijuana, approximately 3 to 4 glass vials of testosterone, approximately 3 to 4 glass vials of Trenbolone, and approximately 20 pills of Methandrostenolone (dianabol). All of the glass items of testosterone and Trenbolone were destroyed when they hit the concrete and were run over by other vehicles on the roadway. Those items were in a paper envelope which, when recovered, was completely saturated with the Testosterone and Trenbolone. The paper envelope was later placed in an evidence bag. Only 9 of the 20 pills of Dianabol were recovered by Officer McGrew and Sgt. Barry, the others were destroyed by vehicles running over it. The marijuana was recovered and tested positive using a NIK test kit. The marijuana was weighed on an Ohaus Dial-O-Gram scale at 2 grams. I weighed the Trenbolone and testosterone with an

Ohaus Dial-O- Gram scale at approximately 4 grams. The Dianabol was weighed by an Ohaus Dial-O-Gram scale and approximately 2 grams. The evidence was placed in the Oak Ridge North evidence locker. I then transported Vanschoick to the South County Jail for booking. Vanschoick's vehicle was towed by RES Towing and stored at 27714 Robinson Road. Vanschoick was charged with Tampering With Physical Evidence and Possession of a Controlled Substance, Penalty Group 3 - Less than 28 Grams.

On 02/26/2015 at approximately 0624 hours I, Officer Teske, observed a gold Jeep Cherokee, displaying California LP # 4ENC011, parked on the Woodlands Pkwy Overpass. The vehicle was parked on the westbound shoulder over IH 45 North, and the driver's side tires were parked on the solid white separating the shoulder from the roadway. Part of the vehicle/driver side mirror was sticking into the westbound lane of travel, making the vehicle a traffic hazard. The owner of the vehicle was not on location and the vehicle appeared to have been parked for a while as the vehicle and windows were covered in frost/ice. A check of the registration showed the owner to be Tiffany Marie Coleman, 21 Gamay Ct, Red Bluff, CA 96080. A check of the license plate showed the registration expired xxx, and had been suspended on 08/19/2013. Because it was a traffic hazard, the vehicle was towed by Rockwell Towing and was stored at 28075 Robinson Road. A copy of this report was sent to MCSO Dispatch so the vehicle could be entered stored/abandoned. The vehicle was entered stored/abandoned on 02/26/2015 at 0802 hours by Z1003/Gibson with TIC # TV2029950663.

On 02-27-15 at 0102 hrs. I, Off. J. Walden #2734, observed a white passenger car, bearing NM LP JJX819, traveling northbound in the 27500 block of the IH 45 North service road. The vehicle had its front passenger side headlight out and it was inoperative. I conducted a traffic stop on the vehicle for the equipment violation and met with the driver, who was identified by TX DL as Randy Connelly, w/m, DOB xxx, and passenger, identified as Joshua Pacheco, w/m, DOB xxx. Connelly's TX DL showed to be expired as of 2011. A further check on Connelly showed his driver's license was also suspended. I had Connelly exit the vehicle and explained to him that, due to neither he nor the passenger of the vehicle having a valid driver's license, the vehicle would have to be towed. At that time I also received verbal consent from Connelly to conduct a search of the vehicle's

interior. Off. D. Stafford, ORNPD #2723, arrived to assist with the search. During the search a small metal tin used for smokeless tobacco was located on the floorboard behind the driver's seat, which contained two small plastic bags. The first bag contained a white substance, which tested positive for cocaine using a NIK cocaine wipe field test kit. The second bag contained a white crystal like substance which tested positive for methamphetamine using a NIK field test kit. Both substances were small amounts which appeared to be under one gram. Connelly and Pacheco were detained so a further search of the vehicle could be conducted. Connelly, while being detained in the back of Off. Stafford's patrol vehicle, attempted to conceal a small metal pipe, commonly used for the smoking of cocaine, under the seat of the patrol car. Connelly was then placed under arrest for PCS and transported to the MCSO, South County Jail for booking. Pacheco was released from the scene on foot and the vehicle was towed by Rockwell Towing to 28075 Robinson Rd. Back at ORNPD, both substances were weighed using an Ohaus Dial-o-gram scale which showed the methamphetamine to have a total weight of 0.5 grams. The cocaine showed a total weight of 0.6 grams. Both controlled substances, along with the metal tin tobacco can they were located in and the metal pipe, were submitted into the ORNPD evidence locker.

On 02-26-2015 at approx. 2100 hours I, Sgt. Barry, arrested Jonathan Erick Clemons, DOB xxx, at the South East Houston Police station at 8300 Mykawa. Clemons had three outstanding Oak Ridge North warrants as follows: #42274901 - fail to maintain financial responsibility, #422749F01 - FTA, and #422749FF01 - FTA with a total fine amount of \$1,311.90. Clemons was transported and booked into the South Montgomery County Jail.

On 02/27/15 at approximately 1045 hours I, Sgt. Nation, checked out at 20810 Meadowhill, Spring, TX. in reference to a warrant service on Justin Blake Davidson, w/m, dob xxx. I made contact with Mr. Davidson at his front door and he identified himself to me by name and date of birth to be the defendant. I executed the following two Oak Ridge North Municipal Warrants on him: Speeding - #10477201 and Failure To Appear/Bail Jumping - #104772F01 for a total in fines and court cost of \$633.00. Mr. Davidson requested to pay his fines to the court in lieu of going to jail. Mr. Davidson, via cell phone, paid his fines in full to the court. After making full restitution to the court, Mr. Davidson was released.

On 02/27/2015 at approximately 0831 hours I, Officer Stafford, was notified by Lt. Libby (ORNPD) that he had just received a complaint that the brothers that live on Robinson Road who are selling firewood, have also been selling narcotics. When I came to work at approximately 2145 hours, I informed my shift partner that I was going to watch the house for short stay, in and out traffic. On 02/28/2015 at approximately 0113 hours, I was sitting east of the residence in question and observed a green 1999 Ford Expedition pass by my location traveling west and pull into the driveway of the residence that I was watching. I watched the location for about another 15 minutes and observed the green Ford Expedition back from the driveway and head west on Robinson. I left the location where I was parked and caught up with the vehicle, bearing TX LP 63WMJ7, in the 27400 block of Robinson Road. I followed the vehicle to the 100 block of Robinson. The vehicle turned right on the northeast loop, so that the vehicle could go north onto the IH 45 North Feeder. While the vehicle was making the turn onto the northeast loop, the vehicle failed to signal within the required distance and did not even signal at all. After the vehicle turned north onto the Feeder, I activated my emergency lighting and stopped the vehicle in the 27700 block of the IH 45 North Feeder. I exited my patrol vehicle and made contact with a white female driver, identified as Loran McCarty (W/F; DOB xxx) from her Texas driver's license #xxx. While speaking with the female, she appeared nervous. I asked her to exit her vehicle for my safety and stand at the rear of her vehicle. I ran Loran through the MCSO database to make sure that her license was valid and that she had no outstanding warrants for her arrest. After running her through the MCSO database, I exited my patrol vehicle and asked Loran if she had anything illegal in the vehicle. She stated no. I asked for consent to search the vehicle and she stated that I could. While searching the vehicle, I located a makeup bag that was sitting under Loran's pursue. Upon looking into the makeup bag, I observed a clear straw with a powder residue. I looked into a black lip stick case and found a small, clear zip lock style bag with an imprint of spades on one side of the bag. Inside the clear bag was a crystal substance I was able to identify as methamphetamine from my training and experience as a Police Officer. I took the makeup bag

back to Loran and asked her if the bag belonged to her. She stated that it did. I then showed Loran the clear bag that contained methamphetamine and she stated that the make up bag was hers but not the methamphetamine. At this time a field test was performed using a NIK test kit and I received a positive test result. After receiving the positive test result, I contacted ADA Dudley and informed him of the incident. He accepted the charge of possession of a controlled substance penalty group 2, less than a gram. Loran was placed under arrest and transported to MCSO female booking without any further incident. After placing Loran into MCSO custody, I returned to the Oak Ridge North PD. I weighed the methamphetamine using a Ohaus triple beam balance and received a weight of 0.9 grams. I then placed the methamphetamine into evidence along with the black lip stick case and her cell phone, that could possibly have evidence of narcotic dealing in the messages.

On Saturday, 02-28-15, at approximately 0958 hrs I, Officer James Kipness of the ORNPD, was dispatched to xxx Laura Ln. in reference to a Criminal Mischief Past. Upon arrival, I met with the reportee, who identified himself as Complainant, w/m, dob xxxx. Complainant showed me graffiti that had been written on his front porch and on some of his vehicles. The writing was in red ink (possibly from a marker) and appeared to be satanic in nature. Written on the pavement of the front porch was "Satan" and a pentagram. The driver's side window of Complainant's black BMW had a pentagram drawn on it and his blue Hyundai and an upside down cross drawn on the windshield with "Sin" written next to it.

I was standing near the house speaking with Complainant's wife, and he advised me that he hadn't yet checked his son's truck (a red Dodge Ram) for any vandalism. The truck was parked curbside in front of the house. Mr. Complainant advised me that there was graffiti on the truck also. I observed a red upside down cross on the driver's side window. Complainant also advised me that he had observed some suspicious behavior at approximately 0130 hrs. this morning. He advised that he and his wife were awakened by their dog barking. He woke up to see what the dog was barking at and looked out the front window where the dog was standing. Complainant observed a person laying down on the street in front of his house. He walked outside to check on the welfare of the person and saw three other people standing around the person lying on the ground (all

appeared to be white teenage males). The three that were standing were chanting something. Complainant said it sounded like some type of satanic ritual. He advised me that he got scared and started saying Jesus's name in Hebrew. This apparently caused the person lying down to get up and all four males fled the scene on foot. Complainant then called 911 and said that he observed several patrol cars drive by his house a few minutes later.

There is no cost for cleaning up the graffiti, as I was able to wipe the red ink off the vehicles's windows with my finger. The graffiti on the pavement of the front porch could be cleaned up with some type of cleaning agent. I took photos of the graffiti, then returned to service.
