

On 08/04/2015 at approximately 1903 hours I, Officer McGrew, was dispatched to a suspicious package call at 27326 Robinson Rd., Suite 117, the Space Cadets comic store.

Upon arrival to the location, I met with Jennifer King, Texas driver's license number xx who advised that they received a suspicious package on 08/03/2015, at approximately 10:00 AM in the United States Postal Service mail. King, the owner of Space Cadets, advised that they received a USPS envelope that showed a sender address of Space Cadets Collection, 27326 Robinson Rd., Oak Ridge North, TX 77385. She advised that she opened the package and observed the general contents. The package had a return to sender label on the front, indicating that the package had been sent to xxx, xx North 40th Street, Apartment 5D, New York, NY 10016 and returned. The return to sender label indicated a date of 07/18/2015. King stated that the package appeared odd as it had an Oak Ridge North city address instead of the Conroe city address. King's business did not send mail from an Oak Ridge North address. King said that the package had not been sent by her or any of her employees. Kind advised that the package contained an invoice with a "Space Cadets" logo that appeared to have been taken off of the web site page. I asked King how she knew that and she stated that it had a black boarder and logo that matched that of the web site. Inside the package, King observed two packages of Magic the Gathering Game cards. The cards were packaged in a plastic envelope and sealed with a paper sticker seal that displayed the Space Cadets company logo. King stated that both the invoice contained in the USPS envelope and the Space Cadets seals were counterfeit. King said that her company did not possess or use either style of seal or invoice.

The next day, 08/04/2015, King asked her employees about the package. All of her employees stated that they had not sent the package nor did they have any knowledge of the package. King and her employees removed the two packages of Magic the Gathering Game cards. King and her employees opened one of the game card packages and observed a small silver metallic plastic pouch that contained an unknown substance that had been vacuum sealed inside of the metallic silver plastic pouch. King and her employees opened the silver pouch and observed a small clear plastic vacuum sealed bag that contained a brown crystal type substance. At that time, she contacted the Oak Ridge North Police Department, due to the suspicious substance. The invoice inside the USPS document folder reads: Space Cadets Collection, 27326 Robinson Rd., Oak Ridge

North, TX 77385, Invoice number 0014, date: Jun 29, 2015, Bill to: Lucky Facebook Giveaway Winner! Item-Random Magic the Gathering Card(s), Quantity: 1, Rate: \$0, Amount: \$0, Subtotal: \$0, Total: \$0, Notes: Thanks for participating! The tracking number displayed on the package, #9114 9011 5981 8461 9270 60, indicated that the package details were as followed: xxxxxxxxxxxx. King said that she had not had any problems with any customers or employees and the employees who were employed at the business were longtime employees. I observed the brown grainy crystal like substance in the clear bag. Due to the suspicious substance, I aired for the Montgomery County Sheriff's Office Radio Dispatch to dispatch the South Montgomery County Fire and a HAZMAT Team to our location.

A short time later, South Montgomery County Fire and HAZMAT arrived on location and evacuated the building. Officer Kennerly, with the Oak Ridge North Police Department, arrived on location to assist. Myself and Officer Kennerly escorted the employees and store patrons outside and to the side of the building. HAZMAT began testing the store for contaminants. No contaminants were found. Utilizing a methamphetamine NIK field test kit that I placed next to the suspicious substance, HAZMAT obtained a positive test for methamphetamine from the brown substance concealed in the package. I conducted a second test and also obtained a positive test for methamphetamine. I also tested the second package of brown crystal substance and observed a positive test for methamphetamine. I confiscated the narcotics, package, invoice, and game cards for further testing. The package, package contents, and methamphetamine were labeled and inventoried. I weighed the methamphetamine on a triple beam scale and observed that the methamphetamine weighed 2.5 grams. The package contents and methamphetamine were then placed into the Oak Ridge North Police Department evidence locker. I asked King if she knew of anyone who would have used her business to ship narcotics and she advised that she did not. King stated that she had never had any packages like this one show up at her business. Sgt. Straight, of the Oak Ridge North Police Department, was contacted and notified of the incident. Sgt. Straight arrived on location a short time later. After it was determined that no contaminant threat posed a danger to the customers or employees, they were released. King was given an Oak Ridge North Police Department case number for the incident. I advised King to contact the Oak Ridge North Police Department should she obtain any further information on the package or suspicious activity.

On 08/04/15 Off. K. Kennerly, #2747, was dispatched to a disturbance at 27029 N. Harlan. A subject in the disturbance, identified as Cameron Smith, b/m, DOB xx/88, left the residence on foot and Off. Kennerly was unable to locate him. Smith had been involved in the disturbance with his mother, Gwendolyn Smith. A short time later I, Off. J. Walden #2734, located Cameron Smith at the Kwik Serv gas station at 27328 Woodson Rd. I spoke with Smith about the earlier incident with his mother and advised him his mother did not want him to return to the residence. I then conducted a warrant check on Smith through MCSO dispatch. That check showed that Smith had an outstanding capias through Montgomery County Court at Law #5, warrant #15-307720, \$10,000 bond. The warrant was then confirmed. Smith was taken into custody and transported to the MCSO jail for booking. Off. Kennerly determined that no assault had taken place in reference to the earlier disturbance call, therefore no additional charges were filed.

On 08-05-15 at about 0040 hrs. I, Officer B. Rogers (2715), along with Officer J. Walden (2734), responded to the intersection of Pine Manor Drive and Pine Manor Court for a Disturbance call. An anonymous caller had called the ORNPD answering service to report an intoxicated young white male playing loud music from a maroon SUV near that intersection. The anonymous caller had reported that they had walked out to the intoxicated male, requested that he turn down the music, and that the intoxicated male told the anonymous caller to "FUCK OFF!"

Officer Walden and I arrived at the location about 0043 hrs. I then observed a white male stumbling around in the roadway on Pine Manor Drive, just west of Pine Manor Court. The male was later identified as Jonathan Tanner Doyel (W/M; DOB xx-95; TX DL # xx, 19 years of age). Doyel was shirtless, was sweating profusely, and had a hard time keeping his balance. There was a maroon Chevy Trailblazer (4 door SUV) parked in a residential driveway about 15 feet away (at 28119 Pine Manor Ct., which is Doyel's place of residence), and the driver's door was standing wide open. The Chevy was bearing Texas license plate # CD1P933. There was extremely loud rock music playing on the Chevy's radio. It was so loud that it was hard to talk over the loudness. There were several broken and intact beer bottles and large potted shrubs laying on their side in front of the Chevy. The

pots were about two feet in diameter and two feet tall, with about seven foot tall shrubs in them, and they probably weighed about 100 pounds each. It appeared that Doyel had probably knocked those over too. We had Doyel turn down the music, and then I engaged Doyel in conversation. Doyel was confrontational from the beginning, and became belligerent when asked simple questions. I quickly recognized Doyel as a Suspect in an Assault Family Violence call from about one week prior. While talking with him, I could smell a strong odor of alcohol coming from his breath and person, and it got stronger as he spoke. His eyes were also bloodshot and glassy, and he slurred his speech. Doyel admitted to drinking alcohol prior to my contact with him, even stating that he had drunk "too much". Doyel stated that he was planning on leaving and driving the Chevy to a friend's house in the Rayford Road vicinity. I determined Doyel to be a danger to himself and others due to his high level of intoxication and due to the fact he advised he intended to drive in his current state of intoxication. I advised Doyel that he was under arrest, and I asked Doyel to put his hands behind his back so that I could restrain him in handcuffs. Doyel ignored my request, and took an offensive posture as if he was going to fight me off if I tried to restrain him. I un-holstered my department issued Taser, aimed it at Doyel, and again ordered him to put his hands behind his back. At this point, Officer Walden was standing close by. Doyel made a quick movement as if he was going to make an offensive maneuver. Officer Walden grabbed Doyel's left arm and wrist in an attempt to take physical control of him. Doyel immediately pulled away with great physical force, in an obvious attempt to resist our efforts to restrain him, and possibly attempt to flee. I re-holstered my Taser and joined Officer Walden by grabbing Doyel's right arm and wrist. After a few moments of pulling back and forth with Doyel, we were able to overpower him and restrain him in handcuffs. I then placed Doyel in the rear seat of my patrol car. I transported Doyel to the MCSO Jail. He was quiet during that trip.

Once we arrived at the jail, Doyel was issued citation # 70654 for Public Intoxication. Upon arriving at the MCSO main jail in Conroe at about 0128 hrs., Sgt. Hensley (MCSO) met me in the sally port to begin the intake procedure. I then remanded custody of Doyel to Sgt. Hensley. Sgt. Hensley performed the safety search of Doyel for the intake processing. Sgt. Hensley and I then walked Doyel to the property and dress out room in the jail. Deputy Johnson (MCSO) also joined us while Doyel was getting undressed. Doyel became belligerent again, making offensive and colorful statements about homosexuality and homosexuals. I

remember at one point that Doyel made the statement, "This is some gay ass shit right here." At that point, Doyel was asked by Sgt. Hensley to remove his underwear (standard procedure) and hand them to him (Sgt. Hensley). Doyel pulled down his underwear to just above his knees, stared directly at Sgt. Hensley, and began fondling and stroking his penis and genitalia in what seemed to be an offensive and provocative nature. Sgt. Hensley again told Doyel to remove his underwear and hand them to him. Doyel ignored Sgt. Hensley, kept fondling and stroking his penis and genitalia as described before, and also began to bite and writhe his lips while staring at Sgt. Hensley. Sgt. Hensley again told Doyel to remove his underwear and hand them to him. At this point Doyel became agitated, quickly and hastily removed his underwear, and threw (not handed) them at Sgt. Hensley's face. Sgt. Hensley was able to stop the underwear in mid air, keeping them from striking him in the face. All of this happened very quickly. Next, Doyel made a furtive movement, taking an offensive posture as if he was preparing to attack Sgt. Hensley (unknown why). It was obvious to me that Doyel was being completely unreasonable and it appeared that he was going to execute some type of physical attack on Sgt. Hensley. Sgt. Hensley quickly reacted to defend himself by closing the short distance between him and Doyel, pushing Doyel up against the wall to take him off balance and using the wall as leverage to pin him (Doyel) against the wall. Doyel physically struggled with Sgt. Hensley at this point, trying to push Sgt. Hensley away. Deputy Johnson joined Sgt. Hensley, and they were able to restrain Doyel in handcuffs again to keep him from attacking anymore. After Sgt. Hensley and Deputy Johnson restrained Doyel, it was learned that Doyel sustained a laceration to the back of his head during the struggle. Sgt. Hensley immediately summoned the jail nurse/medic to treat Doyel's injuries. I completed the booking paperwork and went back in service at about 0320 hrs. I presented this case to the on-call ADA (Dudley) and he accepted the charge of RESISTING ARREST/SEARCH/TRANSPORT against Doyel. End of narrative.

On 08/04/15 Lt. Hubbard and I, Sgt. Nation, learned the whereabouts of a wanted person out of our agency by the name of Felicia Shay Fessenden, w/f, dob xx/92. I received information from a concerned relative that Ms. Fessenden was staying at the Extended Stay Suites in room #204, Spring, TX. At approximately 1100 hours we checked out at the Extended Stay Suites, room #204, and we made contact with Ms. Fessenden at the door. She allowed us inside the room. Once inside the

room, Ms. Fessenden identified herself to me by name to be the defendant. I executed a Capias Pro Fine Warrant: #103728F - Failure To Appear/Bail Jumping with a fine and court cost of \$228.50. Ms. Fessenden requested one more day to come up the fine amount. I advised her that was not possible. Ms. Fessenden advised us she was ill and could not be without her service dog, a 4 month old lab that was in the room with her. I asked if she was staying at the hotel with another person. Ms. Fessenden advised she been living there for 2 months by herself. She said a friend, Gregory Fox, pays her rent. I allowed Ms. Fessenden to text her friend, Gregory, to come get the dog from the room. After she sent the message we transported her to the Montgomery County Jail. While in transit to the jail, communications confirmed a Theft Warrant out of Harris County - #2010543 (\$1,000 Bond). Upon our arrival to the jail, Ms. Fessenden was booked in on both warrants and released to jail staff without incident. After leaving the jail, I called the Extended Stay Suites and spoke with Phil, the front desk manager. I advised him we had arrested a female out of room #204 and there was dog inside the room. I also advised Phil that the arrestee stated to me the gentleman who rented the room is going to bail her out of jail and come back to get the dog. Phil thanked me for the information and hung up.

While on patrol at approximately 2317 hours on 08-05-2015 I, Sgt. Straight, was traveling southbound on Westwood Drive at Eastwood Drive. I observed a silver pick-up truck traveling northbound on Westwood Drive approaching Eastwood Drive. The truck stopped at the stop sign and turned eastbound onto Eastwood Drive, disregarding the road closure sign located on the south side of Eastwood Drive. The truck had to go around the road close sign to travel eastbound on Eastwood Drive. As the truck turned down Eastwood Drive, I ran TX LP # FSG2536 (VIN# 2Gxx19xx30xx29) on my MDT. The vehicle registration shows the vehicle to be out of Onalaska, TX and is registered to Ashley Anne Hewett, 536 Magnolia Park, Onalaska, TX 77360. I continued southbound on Westwood Drive and turned around on Hillside Drive and traveled northbound towards Eastwood Drive. Before I reached Eastwood Drive, I turned off my headlights and eased up to the intersection. I exited my patrol unit and walked closer to the intersection. As I reached the intersection of Westwood Drive and Eastwood Drive, I observed

the truck driving very slow on Eastwood Drive and turn into a driveway on the east side of Eastwood Drive. The truck backed out of the driveway and was now traveling westbound on Westwood Drive. The truck then stopped in the middle of Eastwood Drive. After a few minutes the truck pulled to the north (right) side of Eastwood Drive and stopped. After a few more minutes the truck backed into a driveway on the north side of Eastwood Drive and sat there for several minutes. I walked back to my patrol unit and traveled northbound on Westwood Drive, turning eastbound on Ridgewood Drive. I traveled eastbound on Ridgewood Drive and turned my headlights off before I reached Eastwood Drive (east end). After several minutes, I observed the truck pull out of the driveway and travel eastbound on Eastwood Drive towards the intersection. The truck turned westbound onto Ridgewood Drive from Eastwood Drive. As the truck passed by my location, I observed the truck was occupied two times and the driver was a white male. I turned around, caught up the to truck, and confirmed TX LP # FSG2536 to be the same truck that was driving into different residents driveways.

I followed the truck on Westwood Drive to Robinson Road and when the traffic signal turned green, I activated my emergency lights (red, white, and blue). The truck continued westbound and drove onto the Northeast Loop of Woodlands Parkway. The truck continued on the Northeast Loop towards the IH-45 North east service road and turned northbound on the IH-45 North east service road. After turning onto the IH-45 North east service road, the truck pulled into the parking lot of the bowling alley (Bowlero) located at 27000 IH-45 North. I approached the truck on the driver's side and confirmed the vehicle was occupied by two males. As I made my approach to the driver's side window, I observed a rifle sitting on the rear seat, in plain view, behind the driver's seat. I made contact with the driver and he identified himself by TX DL # xx as Jeremy David Bellamy, W/M, DOB x-1980. I asked subject Bellamy if he has ever been arrested and he stated to me that he has been arrested multiple times. I checked subject Bellamy for warrants on my MDT and he showed to have outstanding warrants through Trinity County. MCSO dispatch confirmed warrant number 00150315 for Theft with a \$2,500 bond. I asked subject Bellamy where the owner of the vehicle was and he stated that he bought the vehicle. MCSO dispatch ran a CCH (complete criminal history) on subject Bellamy and subject Bellamy shows to have several felony convictions. ADA Dudley was notified and stated he would accept charges of felon in possession of firearm. Subject Bellamy was in possession of a firearm (rifle) and is being charged with felon in possession of a firearm. The Marlin model

783, .22 caliber rifle, serial number xxx7xxx4, was run through MCSO dispatch for stolen and is not entered as stolen at this time. The Marlin rifle was loaded with a total of seven rounds and one of those rounds was chambered. The Marlin rifle was unloaded and placed into evidence at Oak Ridge North PD. The truck was towed by Steven's Towing to 18901 Main Street, Conroe, TX 77385. The truck is in poor condition.

The front right passenger was identified as Marcus Lorenzo Lillie, B/M, DOB xx1981, who does not have a valid driver's license and was released. Subject Lillie was sitting in the front right seat of the truck and was in arms reach of the rifle. MCSO dispatch ran a CCH (complete criminal history) on subject Lillie and he shows to have several felony convictions. Oak Ridge North PD will be filing a warrant on subject Lillie for felon in possession of firearm.

On 08-06-2015 at approximately 0845 hours I, Officer Teske, was advised by ORNPD Lt. Libby of a found property call at the intersection of Ridgewood and Westwood. Lt. Libby advised that workers in the area found a bag in the ditch near that intersection. I arrived on scene and met with the reportee, Bill Harrison (xxxxxxx). Mr. Harrison advised that he found a bag in the ditch at the intersection that contained drugs, paraphernalia, and several credit cards and driver's licenses. Mr. Harrison pointed me to a small black zippered bag with red stripe. The bag was divided into two sections. I opened the bag and observed inside a black zippered bag that contained a clear/orange syringe with unknown clear substance, metal spoon, clear plastic bag that contained numerous empty clear and black plastic bags commonly used to store drugs, red plastic bag that contained trace amounts of methamphetamine, and red/yellow plastic container that contained 2.0 grams marijuana (clear plastic bag that contained marijuana and piece of burnt blunt). I opened the other compartment and located a black credit card type holder that contained the following:

1. Arkansas DL # x5 issued to Willie M. Clark, w/f, x-1931. A check on my MDT showed that Clark had been issued TX ID x with an address of x Piney Meadow Dr, Conroe, TX 77301. Her ID return showed that she was reported deceased.
2. Texas DL # 10759673 (expired 10/13/2007) issued to Allen Lee Hill, w/m, dob x1959. A check on my MDT showed Hill's TDL to be current and his current address to be x Piney Meadow Dr, Conroe, TX 77301.

3. Guanajuato (Mexico) DL # Lx issued to Lorenza Luz-Lira.
4. Jewelry Express (Diamonds International) credit card # x
5. Discover credit card # x issued to Lawrence Ross. Card has zip code "78038" written in green marker on back.
6. Master card # x, issued to Dorothy E. Martinez. Card has zip code "78025" written in green marker on the back.
7. Master card gift card # x.
8. Social Security card # x, issued to Phillip W Mentz.
9. Social Security card # x, issued to Donna M. Coleman.
10. Social Security card # x, issued to Joel Angel Maldonado.
11. Social Security card # x, issued to Crystal Maldonado.
12. Social Security card # x, issued to Katelyn Maldonado.
13. Social Security card # x, issued to Lizette Marie Maldonado.

I transported all property to the ORNPD where it was marked and tagged and placed into evidence.

On 08-05-2015 at approximately 1930 hours I, Officer McGrew, was on routine patrol in the parking lot of 26900 IH 45. I observed a white Nissan Murano, bearing Texas temporary license plate number 57L2229, parked near a scrap mound of metal at a construction site. I knew that all of the construction crew had gone home for the day and that no one should be at the location. I observed a male exit the vehicle and walk over to a commercial air conditioning unit on the ground. I observed that the male was wearing a white T-shirt and jeans and not that of a construction uniform. Due to the suspicious nature of the male in an

unauthorized area, I parked my patrol vehicle near the white Nissan, exited my patrol vehicle, and approached the male on foot.

Upon making contact with the male, I asked him what he was doing. The male stated that sometimes he scraps metal for money and was looking at the scrap mound to see about scrapping some of the metal. I advised the male that he would need to speak with the construction crew during regular working hours for permission to remove the materials. I then asked the male for identification. The male advised that his identification was in the white Nissan. As the male walked over to the vehicle, I observed that there was another occupant, a female, in the front passenger seat. I also observed a small female child in the rear seat. The male then produced a Texas driver's license that identified him as Terrill Clark, Texas driver's license number x. While running Clark through my mobile data computer, I observed that he showed to have an active protective order that originated on July 1st, 2015 out of the Harris County Sheriff's Office. I observed that the protectee was Kim Ross, date of x-1986. I asked Clark who was seated in the passenger seat of the white Nissan. Clark advised, "My fiance." I asked Clark what his fiance's name was and he advised, "Kim." I then advised Clark to remain by my patrol vehicle while I spoke with the front passenger. Clark complied. I asked the front passenger what her name was and for identification. The front passenger identified herself as Kim Ross, date of x. I asked Ross about the protective order. Ross stated that the protective order was in place due to an incident that took place between her and Clark. Ross stated that the State put the order in place but she did not want the order in place. Ross further advised that Clark was the only one in the household working at this time and that she relied on him for support. While speaking with Clark, Clark asked if we could simply send her on her way and not arrest him. Clark stated that he had been arrested twice for family violence with Ross and that he was currently out on bond for family violence. While running Clark through TLETS for a criminal history check, I observed that Clark had a conviction for family violence in 2014 but did not see any recent arrest for family violence this year. The Harris County Sheriff's Office, the issuing agency, was contacted to confirm the protective order. Harris County confirmed the protective order. I contacted Assistant District Attorney Fryer who accepted charges for violation of protective order. Due to the potential risk of danger to Ross and the fact that Clark failed to obey the terms of the protective order; I placed Clark in custody for violation of protective order (MA). Clark was transported to the Montgomery County Sheriff's Office, South Montgomery County Jail, located in The Woodlands, Texas for booking. Ross and her child were

released with the vehicle. This incident was recorded on Unit 31's digital video system.

On 08/07/15 at 0011 hrs. I, Off. J. Walden #2734, was dispatched to 26834 IH 45 North (Oak Ridge Liquor) reference an alarm. Myself and MCSO Unit 2P102 (Sgt. Barber) arrived on scene at 0012 hrs. and observed there had been forced entry to the business by breaking out the glass of the front door. Myself and Sgt. Barber then cleared the interior of the business and were unable to locate any suspect(s) still on scene. The cash register drawer was open and there were packs of cigars and cigarettes knocked down from the display case behind the counter. No other items inside the store appeared to have been disturbed.

I located the key holder for the business, Gurnam Singh Jagat (W/M; DOB x64; TX DL # x), who was contacted and arrived on scene at 0110 hrs. Mr. Jagat was then able to assist me with reviewing the store's security camera video. At approximately 0005 hrs (time stamp on video states 0405 hrs.), two black males are seen approaching the business on foot from the north. The first suspect (suspect #1) is seen wearing a black t-shirt, and a red baseball hat with the word "True" on the front. The second suspect (suspect #2) is seen wearing a blue shirt, black baseball hat, and a gold watch on his left wrist.

Both suspects approach the front windows of the business and look inside, where the face of suspect #1 can clearly be seen on video at 0005.50 hrs (0405.50 hrs. on time stamp). Suspect #2 is seen covering his face with some type of cloth or towel as he passes the cameras. Suspect #1 is seen breaking out the glass of the front door with an unknown object. Suspect #2 then enters the business, jumps behind the counter, and takes an unknown number of packs of cigarettes and cigars. Suspect #2 then exits the business, again jumping over the counter, and is briefly out of view of the cameras. Suspect #2 then enters the business a second time, once again jumping over the counter, grabbing a plastic bag, and filling it with an unknown amount of cigars and cigarettes, then exiting the business. Both suspects can then be seen leaving the area on foot to the north. As clearly seen on video, suspect #2 who entered the business, was not wearing gloves, and placed his hand on the counter in the same location each time he jumped the counter. Suspect #2 can also be seen dropping a pack of cigars on top of the counter as he jumps across. I checked the immediate area of the business, where

I located a pack of Camel cigarettes in the parking lot along the sidewalk in front of the business.

Photographs of the business, as well of still security camera shots of the suspects, were taken and attached to this report. The pack of Camel cigarettes and Royal cigars were collected as evidence, both possibly having the latent prints of suspect #2 who entered the business. I also located several latent prints, possibly left by suspect #2, on the counter where his left hand was placed as he jumped across. All evidence was logged into the ORNPD evidence locker at 0530 hrs. Damage to the front door of the business is estimated at \$250.00. An unknown amount of cigars and cigarettes appeared to be the only items taken during the burglary, value is unknown.

While on patrol at approximately 2130 hours I, Sgt. Straight, was sitting stationary in a parking located at 26400 IH-45 North east service road. I observed a white passenger vehicle traveling at a high rate of speed on the northbound service road. I confirmed the vehicle's speed with LIDAR to be 70 mph in a 45 mph posted zone. I traveled northbound on the IH-45 North east service road, caught up to the white 2011 Chevrolet Impala, bearing TX LP # BCL6457 (VIN # 2x65), and activated my emergency lights (red and blues). I activated my emergency lights as we passed Lane Ln on the IH-45 North east service road. The vehicle continued to travel northbound on the service road. I observed the driver and front right passenger making a lot of movement in the front seat. After we passed Woodlands Parkway the vehicle moved over to the right lane and the vehicle pulled into the parking lot of Chi (27100 IH-45 North). I approached the driver's side of the vehicle and observed the vehicle was occupied by the driver and a front right passenger. I made contact with the driver who stated he did not have his Texas driver's license with him. He gave me his name as Roberto Molina Jr., W/M, DOB x/1997. Molina shows to have TX DL # x. While I was speaking with subject Molina, I could smell a strong odor of burnt marijuana coming from inside of the vehicle. I had subject Molina exit his vehicle and stand in front of my patrol unit. I asked for a second Unit to assist. Unit #2735, Officer Helton, arrived on scene, had the front right passenger exit the vehicle, and stand in front of the suspect vehicle. I asked the driver where he was coming from. He told me South Houston and he also stated that he lives in Trinity, TX. I asked subject Molina how long he was in South Houston. He stated one and a half hours (1 1/2 hrs) and they were driving back to Trinity, TX. I conducted a probable cause search of the

vehicle and located, in the front right passenger door, a hand rolled cigar with suspected marijuana inside of the cigar. I continued to search the vehicle and located marijuana debris on the front right passenger seat and driver's seat. While searching the vehicle a black/white Apple Iphone cell phone continued to ring and receive multiple text messages non stop. I continued to search the inside of the vehicle and located a box of sandwich bags and a black digital scale on the seat in between both subjects. I opened up the digital scale container and observed marijuana debris inside of the scale container. On the front seat, I located a Garmin GPS with multiple addresses displayed. A further search of the vehicle's trunk was conducted and a white plastic bag was located under a car seat. In the white plastic bag was a large clear food saver bag containing suspected marijuana inside of it.

The front right passenger was later identified as Jonathan Feliciano Delacruz, W/M, DOB x/1997, TX ID # x. Subject Delacruz stated the white Apple Iphone was his phone and the other cell phone belong to subject Molina. I asked subject Delacruz where he was coming from and he stated South Houston, TX and they were going back to Trinity, TX. I asked subject Delacruz how long he was in South Houston and he stated two hours (2 hrs).

Subject Molina was issued citation #423532 for Speeding 70/45, fail to display DL, and fail to maintain financial responsibility.

The suspected marijuana was tested with a NIK field test kit and tested positive for marijuana. The bag of marijuana was weighed on the Ohaus triple beam balance scale and weighs approximately 165.278 grams (5.83 oz). The marijuana cigar was weighed on the Ohaus triple beam balance scale and weighs approximately .2 grams. All marijuana was placed into the evidence locker at Oak Ridge North PD.

I also seized the Garmin GPS device, an AWS digital scale, subject Molina's cell phone, subject Delacruz's cell phone, and \$79.00 in cash. All items were placed in the evidence locker at Oak Ridge North PD.

The cash consisted of:

1 - \$20

1 - \$10

6 - \$5 (\$30)
19 - \$1 (\$19)

The vehicle (poor condition) was towed to 18901 Main Street, Conroe, TX 77385 by CFM Towing.

On 08/07/2015 at approximately 0307 hours I, Officer Stafford, was dispatched to a motor vehicle accident with unknown injuries located at 27100 Interstate 45 North in Oak Ridge North, TX. Upon arriving on scene, I observed a gray 2006 Dodge Ram 2500 Mega Cab that was sitting on top of the guard rail on the east side of the roadway. A hispanic male was observed standing at the front of the truck in the grass median between the freeway and the feeder street.

I exited my patrol vehicle and, while walking past the truck, noticed that the vehicle was smoking from under the hood and the motor was turned off. I made contact with the hispanic male, identified as Javier Estrada Jr (DOB x/88) from his verbal statement. I asked Javier if he was driving and he stated that he was. While speaking with Javier, I could smell the odor of an alcoholic beverage coming from his mouth while he was speaking, and his eyes were glassy and bloodshot. It was further observed that Javier was unsteady on his feet and wasn't making sense about what he was saying concerning the accident. Javier was asked about the accident and he stated that he didn't know how the truck got onto the guard rail. Javier further stated that he had no clue as to how he got to the location when I made contact with him. While speaking with Javier, EMS arrived and checked Javier out. Javier stated that he was okay and that he didn't need to go to the hospital since he was not hurt.

After a refusal from Javier stating that he was not hurt and didn't want to go to the hospital; I asked Javier, to sit in the back seat of my patrol vehicle. I gave him a ride to the parking lot of Chair King so that I could continue my investigation of suspicion of driving while intoxicated. When I entered the parking lot of Chair King, I stopped my patrol vehicle so that a white line that was painted in the parking lot of directly in front of my vehicle. I asked Javier to exit my patrol vehicle and stand at the front of my car.

I asked Javier where he was coming from. Javier stated that he had left Whiskey River on FM 1960 and that he thought he left around 1 am or 2 am. I asked him what time it was at the moment and he stated that he didn't know. Javier was asked how much he had to drink and stated that he knew he had a couple of shots but couldn't remember if he had anything else. I asked Javier if he would be willing to perform Standardized Field Sobriety Tests. He stated that he would try but knew he was going to fail. I asked why he thought he was going to fail and he stated that he was drunk, but still decided to perform the tests.

Javier performed the Horizontal Gaze Nystagmus (HGN). Upon starting the test, I observed that Javier had equal tracking and equal pupil size in both eyes. I checked Javier's eyes for lack of smooth pursuit and observed clues in both his right and left eye. I performed distinct and sustained Nystagmus at maximum deviation and observed the clues in both the right and left eye. I performed the onset Nystagmus prior to 45 degrees and observed the clues in both the right and left eye. On the Horizontal Gaze Nystagmus test Javier had a total of six clues.

After finishing the HGN test, I instructed Javier on how to perform the walk and turn. He stated that he understood my instructions. I asked Javier to perform the Walk and Turn and I observed that Javier couldn't balance during instructions, missed heel to toe, stepped of the line, made an improper turn, and took the wrong number of steps. On the walk and turn Javier had a total of five clues.

After finishing the walk and turn test, Javier was instructed on how to perform the One Leg Stand test. He stated that he understood the instructions. I had Javier perform the One Leg Stand test and observed that while doing the test he swayed and put his foot down. When I observed that Javier placed his foot on the ground, I asked him to continue. When restarting, Javier placed the heel of the foot that he was supposed to raise onto the ground and tried to finish the test. During the One Leg Stand test, I observed a total of two clues.

After finishing the SFST tests, Javier stated again that he was drunk. I placed him under arrest for Driving While Intoxicated and placed him into the rear seat of my patrol vehicle. Javier was then advised of his Miranda warning. He stated that he understood and stated that he would speak with me about the incident. I informed Javier that I needed to read the DIC-24 (Statutory Warning) form to him.

After I finished reading the warning to him he consented to give a sample of his breath.

Javier's truck was towed by Quik Tow to 28075 Robinson in poor condition. Javier is aware of the storage location. Javier was taken to MCSO male booking without any further incident. Upon arriving to MCSO jail, I was met by Officer Herrera, with the Conroe Police Department. Officer Herrera operated the Intoxilyzer 5000 and received test results on Javier's breath sample. After completing both breath samples, the results were .170 and .162, which is more than twice the legal limit. Javier was released into MCSO custody and I returned to Oak Ridge North to complete my paperwork. After arriving at Oak Ridge North, I placed the original copy of Javier's paperwork of the test results, statutory warning (DIC-24), notice of suspension (DIC-25), and peace officer's sworn statement (DIC-23) in with my arrest record in the report box.

On 08-08-2015 at approximately 0824 hours I, Officer Teske, was checking vehicle speeds on the IH 45 North Feeder Road, using a Kustom Pro Laser 4 Infrared Lidar System. I observed a black Mercedes E550, displaying TX LP # FMD3740, traveling at a high rate of speed. The Lidar indicated the vehicle was traveling 93 mph (at 520.0 feet from my location). The highest posted speed limit is 45 mph. I stopped the vehicle on the IH 45 North Feeder Road near Tamina. The driver identified himself by TX ID # x as Brian Wyatt, b/m, dob x/1984. I advised Wyatt that he was stopped for speeding, 93 in a 45 zone, and asked what the hurry was. Wyatt advised he was going fast but didn't think he was going that fast. He advised that he was on his way to coach youth football and was running late. Wyatt advised that he had a driver's license but there was currently a hold on it. A check on my MDT showed that his TDL, # xx, expired 01/01/2008 and was currently suspended. A check on my MDT and through MCSO Dispatch revealed that Wyatt had an open warrant, #2010-64791, through Harris County Pct 4 (the 311th Judicial Court) for Child Support Violation. The warrant was confirmed and I placed Wyatt under arrest for the warrant. I transported Wyatt to the MCSO South County Jail for booking. The vehicle was towed by The Woodlands Wrecker and was stored at 18901 Main Street. Wyatt was issued ORNPD citation 105584 for Speeding (93/45) and Driving While License Invalid.

On 08/08/15 at approximately 1615 hours I, Officer Kennerly, was dispatched to a crash at 26700 IH 45 South. Upon my arrival, I observed a white 2013 Dodge Challenger, displaying Texas license plate number CBN5831, on the inside shoulder and a silver Porsche Boxster, displaying Texas license plate number GG96YJ, on the outside shoulder. Both vehicles appeared to be badly damaged. I asked the driver of the Dodge what happened. The driver, identified as Evan Smith, Texas driver's license number 2x, told me that he was in the 4th lane. He got cut off by a unknown vehicle and lost control, causing him to swerve right into the outside shoulder concrete barricade. The vehicle then caromed back into the far right lane striking the silver Porsche in the right rear side. This caused the Porsche to spin toward the outside shoulder concrete barricade. The Dodge went across all lanes of traffic after striking the Porsche and struck the concrete barricade head on. Fire and EMS were on scene, as well. A few of the men from the Fire Department advised that they were on a call prior to this one, about 2 miles north of my crash location, on the same roadway. They advised that they saw the Dodge and another vehicle, a red Camaro, traveling at a very high rate of speed, as if they were racing. Fire left the scene before I was able to get a statement from them. Smith's vehicle (the Dodge) also had an odor of marijuana coming from his vehicle. I detained Smith and his two passengers, Jamarkus Bailey, Texas driver's license number xx, and Corey Atkins, Texas driver's license number xx. I placed them in the back of my patrol vehicle while the tow trucks loaded the vehicles and we moved to a safer location. We moved both vehicles to the Ashley Furniture parking lot, located at 25403 IH 45 South. A search was performed on Smith's vehicle, but only a small amount of marijuana debris was found. All parties were checked through Montgomery County Radio Dispatch for warrants. Smith showed to have a Class B warrant, number 2005363, for Reckless Driving. The warrant was confirmed and Smith was placed in custody. I called Montgomery County ADA Justin in reference to the possible racing or reckless driving that the firemen observed Smith and the other vehicle doing. I explained to Justin what happened and Justin advised that there was not enough to prove racing or reckless driving. Smith also would not admit to racing. I transported Smith to the South County Jail for booking. Smith's vehicle was towed by RES Towing and stored at 27714 Robinson Road. Smith received citation number 962078, for Unsafe Speed, Fail to Maintain Financial Responsibility, and Driving While License Invalid.

On 08/09/15 at approximately 1630 hours I, Officer Kennerly, made contact with Carol Smith, Evan's mother, in reference to getting proof of insurance on the Dodge Challenger. I had spoken with Carol on 08/08/15, and she advised she would have to look for his insurance to his vehicle. I told her I would call her back later for the information. She was able to get the insurance information for me and I was able to get the other party to the crash the information as well. The information was also put in the crash report.

On 08-08-2015 at approximately 1630 hours I, Officer Helton, was on patrol traveling eastbound on Woodson Rd. approaching Patsy Ln. I observed a grey Pontiac traveling eastbound in front of my patrol vehicle. The Pontiac was bearing Texas license plate number DVC4591. I observed the driver of the Pontiac drive up to a stop sign located at Woodson and Patsy. The driver of the vehicle crossed over the stop line and stopped 2 feet after the stop line. I ran the license plate on my mobile data computer and the registration showed that the insurance was unconfirmed for 45 days or more, which means that there has been a lapse in insurance coverage.

Due to the driver of the vehicle failing to stop at the stop line and the unconfirmed insurance. I activated my emergency red/blue lights and conducted a traffic stop. The driver of the vehicle stopped in front of 27021 W. Jimmy Ln. The driver started to exit the vehicle and I advised him to get back in the vehicle; he complied. I made contact with the driver, who was identified as Wesley Knutson, white male, date of x-1986. Knutson stated that he was driving the vehicle to his parents house for his father, who arrived during the traffic stop. Knutson was asked about the insurance on the vehicle. He stated that the vehicle was just bought and showed a bill of sale that showed that information. While I was talking to Knutson about the insurance, I had the Montgomery County Sheriff's Office Dispatch run Knutson. Dispatch advised that Knutson showed to have a warrant out of their agency.

Knutson had a warrant for Assault causes Bodily Injury - Family Violence (MA) out of the Montgomery County Sheriff's Office. Dispatch confirmed the warrant and advised that they had hard copy on that warrant. I placed Knutson in custody on the warrant and issued a written warning for the traffic violation. The vehicle was not towed and Knutson was transported to the Montgomery South County Jail, located in The Woodlands.

On 08-10-15 at about 0126 hrs. I, Officer B. Rogers (2715), was on routine patrol, travelling westbound on Robinson from the intersection of Blueberry Hill. I was in a distinctly marked ORNPD Police patrol car, with push bumper, spotlight, and full light bar on top. I was in full ORNPD Police patrol uniform. It was night time, slightly illuminated by artificial lighting. I observed a black Dodge Charger (4 door passenger car) travelling eastbound on Robinson from the intersection of Patsy (I observed the Dodge coming eastbound over the Robinson overpass of IH45). The Dodge appeared to be travelling faster than the posted speed limit. I measured the speed of the Dodge using my dash mounted radar (Kustom Signals, Inc.; Raptor). The Dodge was travelling at 64 miles per hour, the posted speed limit on Robinson is 30 miles per hour. The Dodge was bearing Texas license plate # FMY4415. The Dodge passed me at the intersection of Harlan. There I was already stopped in the roadway and preparing to turn around on the Dodge. The driver of the Dodge must have noticed my intention and he slowed down abruptly just before passing me. I observed only one male in the vehicle, the driver. He was a light brown skinned male with long curly afro hair. There I turned around, caught up the Dodge, and followed it briefly. The Dodge then turned left, northbound, onto Blueberry Hill. There I activated my emergency red/blue lights to perform a traffic stop on the Dodge. The driver of the Dodge immediately accelerated hard and fled from me. It was obvious at that time that the driver of the Dodge was intentionally fleeing from me and my attempt to detain him for the traffic offense. It should have also been apparent to the driver of the Dodge that I was a Peace Officer. I activated my emergency siren and I notified MCSO dispatch of the situation, and began to pursue the driver of the Dodge. The Dodge accelerated to speeds near 100 miles per hour while travelling northbound on Blueberry Hill. The Dodge then turned right, eastbound, onto Woodson and accelerated hard. The Dodge ran the stop sign at Hanna, proceeded eastbound across the railroad tracks (going airborne), and proceeded eastbound on Chateau Woods at speeds near 80 miles per hour. The Dodge then ran the stop sign at the intersection of Stone Gate Drive, and continued eastbound on Chateau Woods. The Dodge then ran the stop sign at Fairview, and turned right, southbound) onto Fairview and accelerated hard. The Dodge then veered left (still southbound) onto Twin Oak Drive, and there I lost sight of him briefly. I knew that Twin Oak was the only way out of the neighborhood, so I stopped at Twin Oak and Fairview, waited for other units to arrive to back me up, and to see if the Dodge would come back out of the neighborhood. Moments later Deputy Moody (MCC3 unit # 8312), Officer Stafford

(2723), and Sgt. Brokhoeft (SHPD unit # 2810) arrived to back me up. At the same time they arrived I observed the Dodge travelling northbound on Twin Oak. Deputy Moody and I activated our emergency lights in an attempt to stop the Dodge. The Dodge then made a U-turn, and continued evading, travelling southbound on Twin Oak. We activated our sirens and again pursued the Dodge. The Dodge then turned left, eastbound onto Sweetgum, and accelerated hard travelling eastbound on Sweetgum. The Dodge then ran the stop sign at Longleaf, turned right (southbound) onto Longleaf, and accelerated hard. The Dodge then turned right (westbound) onto Primrose and accelerated hard. The Dodge then ran the stop sign at Twin Oak, turned right (northbound) onto Twin Oak and accelerated hard. The Dodge then ran the stop sign at Fairview, and veered right (still northbound) onto Fairview. At that intersection Sgt. Brokhoeft was waiting and was able to deploy spike strips in an attempt to deflate the tires of the Dodge. Sgt. Brokhoeft was successful in his attempt, striking both the right front and the right rear tires. Those tires deflated within seconds. The Dodge continued to evade and we continued to pursue. At the intersection of Chateau Woods the Dodge ran the stop sign, turned left (westbound) onto Chateau Woods, and accelerated hard. Just before the next intersection (Stone Gate) there is a set of "S" curves. At that S curve the driver of the Dodge was unable to control the vehicle and drove into the ditch on the right (north) side of the roadway. There the Dodge became disabled and came to a stop, near the residential address of 816 Chateau Woods. The driver then exited the Dodge and continued evading on foot, running northbound through the grassy yard. I observed him to be wearing a grey short sleeved shirt, camouflage shorts, red/orange shoes, with very distinct long curly (afro) hair. I lost sight of the suspect as he was running northwest through the yard. We set up a perimeter and continued searching the area for the suspect for the next hour or so. At about 0240 hrs. MCSO dispatch received a 911 call from the homeowner (unknown name) at 10226 Sleepy Hollow, which was directly north, through the woods, from where the Dodge came to a stop. The homeowner there had observed the male in his back yard and called 911 for Police assistance. I was too far away and on foot, but Officer Stafford responded over there and took the suspect in question into custody. The suspect there at 10226 Sleepy Hollow was the driver of the Dodge. Officer Stafford transported the suspect back to the scene at 816 Chateau Woods. I positively identified (by sight) the suspect he had in custody to be the driver of the Dodge during this pursuit. I then took custody of him. He was identified as Byron Dirk Jenkins 18 yoa (mixed race male, DOB: xx-97). He identified himself verbally, as he did not have

any form of identification with him. MCSO dispatch also confirmed that Jenkins does not have a driver's license or state ID issued to him from any state. The Dodge was towed by South County Wrecker, towed to the parking lot of the Kwik Serv gas station located at Woodson and Hanna. There I performed an inventory of the Dodge.

In the middle console I located a clear plastic baggy containing an obvious amount of a green leafy substance that I recognize as marijuana. I can recognize marijuana by sight and smell due to my training and experience as a Police Officer. I used a NIK field test kit on the marijuana, and it tested positive for marijuana. The marijuana was later weighed on an O-haus triple beam balance scale, and it weighed 5.7 grams. Also in the middle console was a single set of brass knuckles, a prohibited weapon. In the glove box was a handgun. It was a Springfield Armory, model XD-M, .40 caliber, serial number Mxx2. I was loaded with one in the chamber and 16 in the magazine. Also in the glove box were four more handgun magazines. One was a fully loaded (16 rounds) magazine for the .40 caliber Springfield handgun mentioned before. One was an extended magazine (30?) for the .40 caliber Springfield handgun, and it appeared to be fully loaded. One was an extended magazine designed for a Glock handgun, and it had only a few .40 caliber rounds in it. The last magazine was a regular magazine designed for a Glock handgun, and it had nine rounds of .40 in it. I did not unload any of the magazines. On the driver's seat was a large wad of cash. All of these items were seized as evidence and later submitted to the evidence locker at the ORNPD office. The wad of cash totaled \$548.00, there were twenty-seven \$20 dollar bills, one \$5 dollar bill, and three \$1 dollar bills.

The Dodge was bearing Texas license plate # FMY4415. I checked the registration through TLETS, and it returned as the following: 2015 Dodge Charger, 4 door, black color, VIN # 2xxx9, owner: xxxxxxx, 7310 Ponderosa Trail, Montgomery, TX 77316. There was no lien on the Dodge. The Dodge was towed to 28075 Robinson Road in Conroe, and a hold was placed on the Dodge, for ORNPD Detectives to investigate for an asset forfeiture. Sgt. Brokhoeft took several digital pictures at the scene for me. I'll obtain copies of them at a later date. I notified Sgt. Straight and Lt. Libby of this incident via text message.

I transported Jenkins to MCSO jail without further incident. End of narrative.

Chief's Note: Sometimes I've just got to say it. An 18 year old high school student, with a brand new 50,000 dollar, hemi equipped, sport car, a military / combat style pistol, loaded with one in the chamber and three extended high capacity magazines, dope and 500 + in cash. What are we doin' with these kids?? NO matter what the excuse people will make for his actions, it was the responsibility, the sworn duty of some good men and women in uniform to stop him. And not only stop him, but not hurt him and make sure that his rights weren't violated. Sounds to me like in the great scheme of things, someone isn't holding up their end of the deal. Parents still have the responsibility to raise their kids, no matter their socioeconomic standard, educational level, race, color or creed. It's my understanding that the MCSO went to his house and there found more narcotics.....at the home of a high school student. Last week, if you remember, Officer Rogers caught one of three young men robbing the Valero in Shenandoah. They were armed. The thing you didn't catch because we blanked it out was that one of the "suspects" was 15 years old....a high school student. It's not the guns fault. It's not the cars fault. It's the kids fault. It's the parents fault. It's our fault. There are kids out there who apparently don't know the difference between right and wrong, have no empathy for others, and only care about having the most expensive pair of basketball shoes on the rack or a wad of cash in their pockets, so they can "have respect". What a screwed up, dangerous world.
