Your response in M1100 indicates that this patient lives alone but has someone in the home 24hrs/day available to provide assistance. This item is a two-part question. First determine the patient's Living Arrangement then the Availability of Assistance. Please verify your response.

The patient's dialysis access, such as a fistula or shunt should be considered a surgical wound and reported in M1340 when answering the OASIS. OASIS Q&A 105.1 states that, "as long as the venous access device is in place, it is considered to be a surgical wound whether or not it is functional or currently being accessed." Please correct M1340.

M1840 indicates that this patient needs human assistance to get to and from the toilet safely and/or transfer on and off the toilet safely. Your response in M1860 indicates that he can ambulate independently with a one-handed device. If the assistance required in M1840 is referring to ambulation, please verify your response in M1860.

M2030 indicates that this patient is on no injectable medications, but Procrit is included on the medication profile. Please review your response.

Your response in M2250b indicates interventions for diabetic foot care, but there is no physician documented diagnosis of diabetes. Please review your response.
