

## SENIORS WIN ALLEN TROPHY

The seniors captured first place honors from the juniors and sophomores to win the Virginia Allen Trophy in the Gymnastic Contest sponsored by the Girl's Athletic Association of Swarthmore High School. The contest took place Friday, March 7 in the high school gymnasium.

The contest, an outgrowth of work done in regular girl's gym class opened with competition on the travelling rings. Taking first place in the event was Beth Brobeck, second was Mary Ellen Cozine and third was Sue Coleman.

The second event on the program was the balance beam. Each contestant is required to do a two-minute exercise. This year's winner was Nancy Marshall with second place honors going to Gail Young and third to Sue Patterson.

In vaulting over the horse, two contestants from each class were required to do one specific vault and two optional ones and were judged on form and degree of difficulty. First place went to Cindy Wigton, second to Francine Starer and third to Peggy Gatewood.

Two tumblers from each class were judged on form and difficulty of an original mat exercise. First place went to Kalli Halpern, second to Lawrie Mifflin and third to Pam Swing. The rope climber was judged for speed. First place went to Pat Piccard, second to Kate Coons and third to Kate Hoffman.

On the even parallel bars one exercise was required. It was judged on approach, form and degree of difficulty. In first place was Connie Kelly, second Betsy Davidson, and third Helen Hirsch.

In the exercise on the flying rings Marcia McCurdy was first, Sue Schmidt second and Betsy Winch third. The contestants were permitted four full trips only.

On the uneven parallel bars, an original exercise of no more than two minutes duration was required. Taking first place was Mary Ann Kington, second Debby Bolter and third Ellen Wrege.

Last on the program was the heavy swing - a less formal event, which consists of the contestants attempting to clear a bar by swinging over it from two ropes. Winning this event was Yvonne Curtis, with 7 feet, 10 inches. Second was Nancy Jones and third Debbie Bird.

The final score for the day was seniors 41, juniors 28, and sophomores 12.

Principal Donald Anderson presented the trophy to Kalli Halpern, captain of the senior team.

## LEGAL NOTICE

BOROUGH OF SWARTHMORE ORDINANCE NO. 686  
An Ordinance supplementing Ordinances No. 677 and 681 of the Borough of Swarthmore by assessing an annual charge against each owner of property from which rubbish, garbage and other waste material is removable under the municipal collection system provided by said ordinance; imposing duties and conferring powers upon the Tax Collector; prescribing the method of collecting said charge and the enforcement thereof.

THE COUNCIL OF THE BOROUGH OF SWARTHMORE DOES ORDAIN:  
Section 1. ANNUAL CHARGE.  
For the calendar year 1969, and each succeeding year thereafter until changed by Borough Council, a unit charge of twenty-five Dollars (\$25.00) per family is hereby levied and assessed against the owner of each private dwelling house in the Borough of Swarthmore, and upon such unit basis, the charge in the case of multiple dwellings or apartment houses, hotels, boarding houses, churches, schools, colleges,

institutions, restaurants, tea rooms, garages, stores, shops, offices, or combinations of such structures, shall be computed by the Health and Sanitation Committee, or other officer or committee authorized by Council, and collected from the owners thereof as provided in Ordinance No. 677, approved October 23, 1968, and in Ordinance No. 681, approved December 9, 1968, and in accordance with the provisions of this Ordinance. Said ordinance, and the specifications and regulations therein referred to, shall be construed as one enactment governing the municipal collection of rubbish, garbage and other waste material (collectively called "trash") in the Borough of Swarthmore. Such computations when approved by Borough Council, shall be as effective as though specifically set forth in this Ordinance, to the end that the structure of all properties entitled to the service, and included therein, shall bear their fair, proportionate part of the expense of operating the trash collection system.

Section 2. COLLECTION OF THE CHARGE.  
The Tax Collector of the Borough is hereby appointed as the officer to collect said annual charge from the property owners liable for same, in accordance with the aforesaid Ordinances, Specifications and Regulations, and is hereby authorized and empowered to use and employ all the powers, rights and remedies now existing or which may hereafter be vested in the Tax Collector by law, for the collection of taxes, to collect the annual municipal charge imposed by this Ordinance. It shall be the duty of such officer to cause proper notices to be mailed or otherwise delivered to the persons or properties liable for payment of such charges, and to refer to the Borough Solicitor such accounts which may require legal action. Such notices shall be given at the same time and in the same manner as tax notices are given, and collections shall be remitted to the Borough in the same manner that taxes are remitted.

Section 3. DISCOUNTS, INTEREST AND PENALTIES.  
Where payment of the charges herein provided shall be made within two (2) months after the date of the notice mailed or otherwise delivered with respect to the property liable a discount of 2 percent thereof shall be allowed. In case such charge shall not be paid within four (4) months after the date of such notice, a penalty of 5 percent shall be added; and, commencing May 1st of the year following that in which such charge and penalty became payable interest shall be added to the total amount thereof at the rate of 6 percent per annum until such indebtedness be fully paid.

Section 4. LIEN; ACTIONS AT LAW.  
Such annual charges shall be a lien on the property charged with the payment thereof until paid, collected or satisfied in the case of other municipal claims, together with a penalty of 10 percent, in addition to interest and penalties provided in Section 3, of this Ordinance. Any delinquent charges may be collected by the Borough Solicitor by action in assumpsit, as in the case of other municipal claims.

Section 5. GENERAL PROVISIONS.  
This Ordinance shall become effective as of January 1, 1969, and shall remain in effect from year to year until amended or modified by Borough Council. The Council may adopt and promulgate rules and regulations from time to time, dealing with exemptions, exonerations, interpretations and other administrative procedure. Sections 6, 7, 8, and 9, of Ordinance 681, dealing with Violations, severability and repeals, are incorporated herein by reference.
