ROME, Ga. (UPI) — George Lindsey couldn't share the hangover from the drinks he had shared with four other persons at a rooming house Friday.

Lindsey's companions died within a 24-hour period after the drinks. Police said Sunday they had been drinking shellac thinner purchased at a paint store.

Acting Desk Sgt. O. W. Pierce said officers went to the rooming house Friday afternoon after receiving a telephone tip. They found Francis Otting, 40, dead, and Johnny Smith, 30, Clinton Ellis, 54, and Robert Sampier, 24, unconscious. One of the men died Friday night and the other two Saturday.

Lindsey had left the party, but police began a search for him when it was learned he also had consumed the poisonous thinner.
