Council Accepts Tax Plan

HDCC Seeks Eight Homes

CHESTER. Plans to provide several low-income housing units with homes moved about Tuesday as city council agreed to accept some \$250,000 in compensation from the Housing Development Corp. of Chester (HDCC).

The HDCC, which owns the use of back yards and provides the city with owners of eight homes on West Third Street. If HDCC makes a similar agreement with county taxing agencies, and the agreements are accepted by the courts, the housing corporation could place with plans to buy the homes, renovate them and sell them for prices ranging from \$10,000 to \$15,000.

TAXES WAIVED
The homes are numbered 261, 263, 265, 267, 269, 271, 273, 275 and 277 on West Third Street.

Council, in passing a series of resolutions, waived taxes owed the city and agreed to accept the HDCC payment to waive tax liens on the properties.

HDCC was formed last April as a nonprofit organization to provide low-income housing in the city's West End. With tax difficulties partially solved, HDCC is now working with the city on the West End project.

VACATE PORTION
In another housing matter, Council is considering a portion of 11th Street between Madison and Edgewood avenues to make way for the Chester Township High School.

Council also accepted an 11-member committee, headed by Parks Commissioner William J. Edwards, to study the city's recreation program.
