## 'WHO INVITED US'

### PREMIERS TUESDAY

"Who Invited Us?" NET's study of the economic and political "Roots of future Vietnam," will premiere Tuesday, February 17.

The program, produced for NET Journal, reviews U.S. military policy from the Spanish-American War to Vietnam. It stresses current U.S. economic interests in Latin America, and the resulting threat from leftist political movements there.

Interviews with Senators Frank Church, and Karl Mundt, and Mr. Averell Harriman, among others, contribute to the examination of U.S. policies in the Twentieth Century.

## Boro. Mgr. Speaks At Building Seminar

Borough Manager C. H. Topping spoke on "Performance Building Codes" at a seminar on Industrialized Building Technology in Boston on February 6.

The seminar was the second in a series designed to explore requirements and capabilities for improving building quality, economy and efficiency of erection. New systems of construction are being developed which it is believed will revolutionize current methods.

Performance Codes spelling out desired results rather than specifying conventional materials will be required both to permit new building products and techniques and to control them. The performance concept requires new non-physical intellectual technology - the application of systems analysis, simulation and operations research to problem solving; in short, the systems approach.

"This is generally a new field for building technologists and a great deal of work remains to be done," Topping said. "The Building Research Division of the National Bureau of Standards has made significant contributions and is well qualified to provide most of the groundwork."

## College Names Assistant Dean Counsellor For Black Students Due Monday

David Closson, an English high school teacher and former Peace Corpsman, has been named Assistant Dean of Students at the college with primary responsibility for counseling Black students.

Closson, 26, who has been teaching at Coolidge High School in Washington, D.C., is expected to begin his new position, Monday. In addition to his special counseling duties, he will advise the Swarthmore Afro American Society (S.A.S.S.) and work on the supporting guidance and curriculum program. These duties are now being performed on a part-time basis by Assistant Dean of Admissions William Cline. Cline will now return to full time admissions work.

The new counselor spent two years in the Peace Corps (1965-1967) teaching the English language and composition at Sebel College in Uganda, East Africa. During his second year, he helped direct an English handbook conference for secondary school materials. Upon completing his Peace Corps tour of duty, he returned to the States and recruited for the Peace Corps on predominantly Black campuses in the South.

In 1968 he began teaching with the Urban Teacher Corp and taught 9th and 11th grade English at Pardoza High School, an "inner city" high school in Washington. He transferred to Coolidge High School this past fall.

Closson was reared and educated in West Chester, where his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Sherwood Closson, still live. He attended Henderson High School and received his A.B. in English from Lincoln University in 1965. He has been in the Master of Arts in Teaching program at Georgetown University in Washington.

His wife Rosemary is a native of Riverton, N.J., and their six-month old daughter is named Malsha--meaning "life" in Swahili.

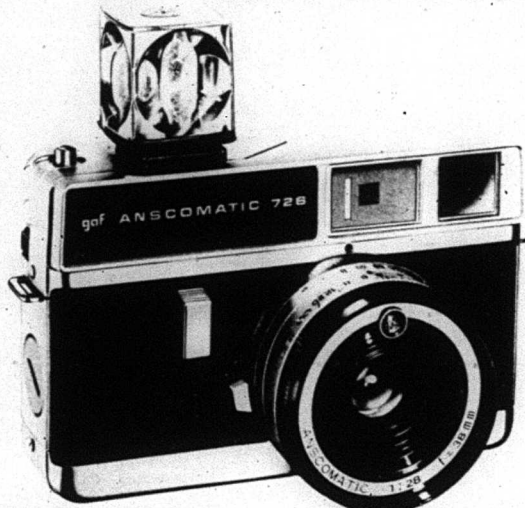
