### College Names Assistant Dean Counsellor For Black Students Due Monday

David Closson, an English high school teacher and former Peace Corpsman, has been named Assistant Dean of Students at the college with primary responsibility for counseling Black students. Closson, 26, who has been teaching at Coolidge High School in Washington, D.C., is expected to begin his new position, Monday. In addition to his special counseling duties, he will advise the Swarthmore Aframerican Society (SASS) and work on the supporting guidance and curriculum program. These duties are now being performed on a part-time basis by Assistant Dean of Admissions William Cline. Cline will now return to full time admissions work.

The new counselor spent two years in the Peace Corps (1965-

The new counselor spent two years in the Peace Corpe (1965-1967) teaching the English language and composition at Sebei College in Uganda, East Africa. During his second year, the helped direct an English handbook conference for secondary school materials. Upon-completing his Peace Corps bour of-duty, he returned to the States and recruited for the Peace Corps to predominably Black campuses in the South.

In 1968 he began teaching with in the Urban Teacher Corp and taught toth and 11th grade English at Pardoza High School, an "inner city" high school in Washington. He transferred to Coolidge High School this seat fall. past fall.

Closson was reared and educated in West Chester, where his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Sherwood Closson, still live. 
