  - 1. The school will distribute a newsletter to parents that is developed with participation of the parent-school organization, principal, staff and parent volunteers. It includes school news, a calendar of school activities, and parenting tips related to school achievement such as homework tips, organizational skills, and study skills. (Jessica Aryee)
  - 2. Teachers will routinely contact parents on an individual basis to communicate about their child's progress.
  - 3. Teachers will make positive parental contact. This will be documented by each teacher using a parent contact log.

Brief training sessions will provide parents and community members with the information they need to participate as school volunteers in order to put them at ease and make the experience pleasant and successful.
