- 1. In order to take full advantage of the personnel, materials, and facilities, the Bearden Middle School was closed effective the 2009-2010 school year with grade 5-6 attending Bearden Elementary School and grades 7-8 attending Bearden High School.
- 2. Since the former Bearden Middle School was rated as Targeted Intensive Improvement (TII-A-4), the Bearden Elementary School and Bearden High School will initiate the planning year for the restructuring process. The district will act as the host and provide support for the restructure process.
- 3. Data provided by the 2009 ADE Report shows that the Bearden Elementary School has been given the Status in 2009 of Alert (A). The school met Standards for Mathematics (MS) but did not meet Standards for Literacy (A). Bearden High School was given the Status of Targeted Improvement (TE-A-1) with the school meeting the Standards for mathematics (SI-M) and for Literacy (SI-M).
- 4. Data provided by the 2009 ADE AYP Report indicated that during the three-year period from 2006-2009. A Total average of 68.2% of the students in the Combined Population at the Bearden Elementary scored proficient or higher in the area of Mathematics. In the area of Literacy, an average of 58.5% of the students scored proficient. During this same three-year period, a total average at Bearden High School of 48.8% scored proficient in Mathematics and 37.4% scored proficient in the area of Literacy. Although these averages were above those at the beginning of the period, the gains were not sufficient to achieve AYP.
- 5. During the three year period of 2006-2009, there were three subgroups that scored significantly lower than the average of the Combined Population and the Caucasian Population. These groups included Students with Disabilities, African-American, and Economically Disadvantaged populations.

An analysis of the three year trend data indicates that the Reading Content strand and Multiple Choice/Content in the Writing strand (in 7th and 8th grades) continues to be a concern and needs to be addressed in the literacy classrooms in order to increase the growth of the scores. Also the 11th grade trend data shows that attention is needed with all students in the areas of multiple choice of writing items and both content and style.

There was no discernible evidence that any sub-group of the TAGG population had a negative effect on growth or projected growth.

Also the Algebra I EOC trend data shows that attention is needed with all students in the areas of Language of Algebra, Non-Linear Functions, and Solve equations and Inequalities. Geometry trend data shows that an increase in the areas of Relationship between two- and three- dimensions and Language of Geometry. Bearden High School was given the Status of Targeted Improvement (TE-A-1) with the school meeting the Standards for mathematics (SI-M) and for Literacy (SI-M).

## Supporting Data:

- 4. Data provided by the 2009 ADE AYP Report indicated that during the three-year period from 2006-2009. A Total average of 68.2% of the students in the Combined Population at the Bearden Elementary scored proficient or higher in the area of Mathematics. In the area of Literacy, an average of 58.5% of the students scored proficient. During this same three-year period, a total average at Bearden High School of 48.8% scored proficient in Mathematics and 37.4% scored proficient in the area of Literacy. Although these averages were above those at the beginning of the period, the gains were not sufficient to achieve AYP.
- 5. During the three year period of 2006-2009, there were three sub-
