USD 480 Special Education Department Autism Team

The USD 480 Special Education Department is comprised of multiple staff members who provide service for all aspects of students with exceptionalities including physical, mental, and emotional. A growing population of students who receive these services are students with Autism. Autism is caused by a group of complex disorders of brain development. These disorders are characterized, in varying degrees, by difficulties in social interaction, verbal and nonverbal communication and repetitive behaviors. The USD 480 Special Education Department has formed an Autism Team in order to better serve this group of students. The Autism Team is comprised of staff members from across the district who serve in additional roles both in and outside of classrooms and have received specific training to serve on the team. They administer screenings and evaluations for students who may possibly have autism in order to provide early intervention and services for those students and their families. The Autism Team also works to increase awareness of Autism not only throughout the school district, but throughout the community, as well. They conduct family nights and have created an extensive lending library of resources for parents, school staff, and students to gain a greater understanding of Autism. Campus Spotlight: McKinley Elementary

McKinley Elementary is a very active campus. From Kindergarten through 3rd grade, there are learning activities, community involvement events, and celebrations. The entire campus celebrated Read Across America Day with classroom doors decorated with inspiration from Dr. Seuss. Bond Project Progressing: Two Sites Taking Shape

Phase I - Eisenhower Middle School: Work has begun in the gymnasium/locker room area. Each building is divided into separate zones to better sequence the construction process. From Western Ave and/or the live web streaming, construction trailers, materials delivered and stored on site, heavy equipment, and contractors working can all be seen. There were several weather related delays in January and February, but progress continues. March has allowed the district to aggressively proceed with the sequencing of work to be performed. Mass excavation and grading of the site is ongoing and shall continue for several weeks. The process of imbedding and routing the deep underground plumbing and electrical utilities has begun and will continue as completion moves from one designated area to the other. Excavation and placement of the footings is scheduled, and once that is complete, the next step will be to place rebar and pour concrete. At that time the footprint of the building will begin to take shape. Following the concrete footings will be the masonry starter course, and then there will be walls! This process shall be repeated in each area until the structure is encapsulated. Live streaming of Eisenhower construction can be seen at: http://www.usd480.net/page/12456

The projected completion date for the Eisenhower Middle School is June 2016.

Prairie View Elementary School: The same zone and phasing procedures shall be used for all the new facilities. JE Dunn's job trailer is now located on the property. Site clearing, mass excavation and grading are ongoing. Looking south from Highway 54, the Flor de Sol apartments located on Pine Street are now clearly visible. The City of Liberal has begun a sanitary and sewer upgrade which borders this site. Existing electrical, telephone and cable utilities are being re-located. These public services must be completed before additional work on the school can be scheduled. These projects are on-going and should have no effect on the projected completion date.

The projected completion date for the Prairie View Elementary School is June 2016.

Both facilities are projected to be complete for the 2016-2017 School Year.

Seymour Rogers Elementary School: This campus will share the same site as the Prairie View Elementary School. Work is scheduled to begin August 2015 with a projected completion date of January 2017.

Phase II - Meadowlark Elementary School: The eminent domain process is concluded and USD 480 now owns the property. The land owner has entered into the appeal process and adjudication will be determined by a jury trial.

Work is projected to begin March 2016.

MacArthur Elementary School: No work to date.

Work is projected to begin March 2016.

The projected completion date for Phase II is June 2017.

Both facilities are projected to be complete for the 2017-2018 School Year.



Points for Parents — Help your young reader turn struggles into success


Help your young reader turn struggles into success Reading can be challenging for some elementary schoolers, but there are things parents can do at home that really help. If your child struggles with reading, begin by reassuring him that you believe he will be a reader. Next, help him practice the skills that research links to reading success. These include the ability to:

- Recognize and use sounds. Talk about how words are made of parts. For example, bat is made of buh, aaa and ttt.
- Learn the sounds that letters represent. Look at printed letters with your child. Name their sounds. Also point out pairs and groups of letters, such as gr or ing. What sounds do the combined letters make?
- Remember a lot of words. The more words your child knows, the more he'll recognize and comprehend when he reads. Try to use new words often and repeat them frequently. Make sure their meaning is clear.
- Use comprehension strategies. Asking questions can improve your child's understanding. You might ask him, "How would you tell the story in your own words?" or "What would you do in that situation?"
- Read quickly and correctly. This takes time! As your child gains more experience with reading, this will become easier. Simply reading together will make a big difference!
