

Dear Parent/Guardian:

In 2011, the Oklahoma legislature adopted an A-F School Grading System. The A-F School Grading System. The A-F Report Card is comprised of three sections each worth one-third of the overall calculation: Performance, Student Growth, and Whole School Performance. There are 5 categories which include: Performance, Student Growth, Bottom Quartile Growth, and Whole School Performance. Each category is awarded a letter grade of A,B,C,D, or F and subsequently combined to award a final letter grade for schools. An A-F Report Card Guide is available on the Oklahoma State Department of Education's Website.

A priority School is any School that either receives a letter grade of "F" based on the State's A-F School Grading System, or Title I school in the bottom 5% of Title I Schools, or is a Title I participating High School with a graduation rate below 60% for three consecutive years, or a school that receives School Improvement funds to implement a school intervention model.

Earlsboro High School received a final letter grade of "C" for the 2013-2014 school year and has been designated as a Priority School.

The ESEA Flexibility Waiver requires schools to notify parents/guardians of children in Title I Priority Schools of the option to transfer their child, with transportation included, to higher-performing school that is able to accept, if the requested school is not already full according to state and district guidelines regarding class size. If you would like to transfer your child to another school, please contact Mark Maloy/Superintendent. Transfer papers will be available to fill out at Earlsboro during regular school enrollment.

Earlsboro High School has adopted initiatives to address the academic growth of students. Training and practices are implemented at school so teachers receive strategies that will increase student growth.
