In 1896, although some authorities place the date at 1794, Harvard College, represented by Dwight P. Robinson, the famous engineer, headed the procession. President Dodge of Princeton gave the main address at the Dikerson College ceremonies on the subject of "Completing the Circle in Democracy." President Dodge was inaugurated earlier this year, taking the place of former president Hibben. Since Princeton was founded in 1794 it was one of three oldest colleges at the celebration. Dickinson College is an educational and the present enrollment is about twice that of St. John's, twenty-five per cent of which are girls.

Professor Starr, representing St. John's, marched in the formal procession and witnessed the inauguration of President Mead at Washington College last Saturday, October 31. President Franklin D. Roosevelt was presented an LL.D. degree and made a short address. St. John's students had the opportunity to catch a glimpse of the President as he drove through the city in an open touring car behind a large motorcade escort. He passed directly in front of the College. In 1920 Mr. Roosevelt received an honorary degree from St. John's, the first honorary degree he had ever received.

OLD ST. JOHN'S STREET GAS PLANT IS REMOVED

After being work around for six years, the old gas plant which has become a familiar feature of the landscape in the rear of the College Campus at the end of Saint John's street, is being rapidly torn down and the debris removed. Although the structure has been replaced by a more modern all burning method in the adjoining buildings, and the main supply was drawn from Baltimore, the old plant has stood idle and obsolete since the Baltimore Gas and Electric Power Company took over the Annapolis district in 1927. Lumber and pipe from the structure is being sold by the workmen, the Harb's Working Company, on the premises.

Work on demolishing the plant began last week with a load of about ten men on the job. Materials from the structure are for sale and when interviewed, the foreman of the job, knowing about the Hopkins bond, suggested that he had a lot of wood he would be only too glad to sell to the President at a reasonable price. Incidentally, now that the plant has been torn down, President Mead is deprived of a traditional watch tower and for several years by the class during their nightly vigil, awaiting the arrival of Hopkins.
