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**Monday – Acts 2**

What parallels are there between Acts 2:1–13 and Genesis 11:1–9?

What does Peter's answer in verse 38 mean?

What do verses 42–47 teach us about what the church should be doing?

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**Tuesday – Acts 3**

What is the relationship between the miracle and the sermon?

In what role (prophet, priest, or king) does Peter present Jesus in verses 17–26?

What does Peter say about Israel in his sermon? (vv. 12–26)

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**Wednesday – Acts 4**

How many ways are there to God? (v. 12)

In response to persecution, what do the apostles pray for? (vv. 24–30)

What characteristics would describe the early church, as presented in verses 32–37?

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## **Thursday – Acts 5**

Why did God kill Ananias and Sapphira? (vv. 1–11)

What is ironic about verses 38–39?

What was the cause of the apostles rejoicing? (v. 41)

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## **Friday – Acts 6**

What did the apostles see as their chief responsibility? (vv. 1–7)

What is the connection between the two uses of the phrase “the word of God” in verses 1–7?

What does it mean that “his face was like the face of an angel?” (v. 16)
