Celebrating black British music

The role of Hackney in the support of black British music is substantial yet understated. From its vibrant shebeens to its role in the UK jazz scene, it has been an important part of musical developments and locals, the Grand Union Orchestra, act as a fervent hub of cultural activity.

This autumn the GUO are presenting a selection of concerts and workshops inspired by the Hackney Museum's Roots, Rhythms and Records exhibition, which will begin on October 4. The workshops include a Candomblé masterclass and explorations of songs of the orishas. The programme culminates on December 9 with Uncharted Crossings.

"The title comes from a history of crossings, from the enforced slavery crossings from Africa, to the present day; putting the Windrush generation and the roots of multicultural Britain in a kind of historical context," says musical director and composer Tony Haynes. "We really wanted to unpack the dialectic between African-Caribbean culture and the UK. Looking at how the culture and its music has been transmuted."
