nursery

Once you have a vision and theme for your baby's nursery, define zones for the various activities and functions — sleeping, changing, dressing, playing — that will bring it all together.

playroom

Plan on using containers to hold a variety of toys and books, and organize them in a way that's easy for your child to help you clean up. Teach them early to put toys away and it will become second nature.

kitchen

Keep your counters clear so you can easily put your hands on what you need. Create a baby zone to store all your baby-related items for feeding. Think about assigning other zones too: Food Prep, Cooking/ Baking, Serving, Cleaning/Dishwashing, and Storage.

on the go

Set up a functional area for items that come and go when you do. Keep shoes, coats, stroller, diaper bag and more ready to grab as you head out the door with baby.

Here are some organizing tips from the experts at The Container Store.

sort

Divide baby's wardrobe by size and age, then store the clothes in clearly marked containers. The 12-month outfit that looks huge right now will fit your growing infant before you know it!

plan

A hanging sweater bag is handy for planning a week's worth of outfits. If this is your first child, you're navigating unchartered waters and are doing all you can to meet the basic needs of your child. So look for time-savers anywhere you can!

color-code

Begin sorting toys by type at an early age and keep them in colorful and portable bins within easy reach. As your child gets older, it will be easy to put the toys back into the appropriate bins.

separate

Place a pre-labeled box for each age category and clothing size at the bottom of the closet. This makes it easy to sort outgrown clothes in the appropriate box for quick identification for a future child, for donating or for a garage sale. It can also help prevent clothing of different sizes from getting mixed together.
