J. Knox Moore
Confederate Vet.
Passes at 96

**Native of Mississippi,
Resident of Bedford
County Forty Years;
Retired Business Man.**

James Knox Moore, 96, last of the Confederate veterans in Bedford county, died shortly before noon yesterday at the home of his daughter, Mrs. E. B. Wright, of Bell Buckle. Funeral services will be conducted at Mrs. Wright's residence at 4 o'clock this afternoon central standard time by the Rev. S. I. Nash of Wartrace and the Rev. J. E. Powers of Manchester. Burial will be in Holywood Cemetery at Wartrace. Mr. Moore was born at Inka, Miss., on April 1, 1845, the son of Stephen and Lucy McDouglas Moore. He remained a member of that denomination through his long life. At the age of sixteen he joined the gray forces as a member of Company A, Pardues' Regiment, Maybry's Cavalry, a Mississippi outfit, and saw ac-

tive service. Soon after the close of the war between the States he married Miss Eliza Miller of Huntland, Tenn., and made his home there until about forty years ago when he moved to Wartrace. There he conducted a general store and engaged in agriculture. He was an elder in the Cumberland Presbyterian Church, a Mason and a member of the Shelbyville Lions.

Until March of this year, when his health began to fail, he had been physically strong for one of his years and mentally alert, taking an interest in everything pertaining to the welfare of his country. Beloved for his service to the Southern cause and for his loyalty to the nation today, Mr. Moore could count every citizen of Bedford county his friend. An interesting talker and writer, he never lacked an audience for his tales of the past or for his comments on present conditions. He liked to travel and made a number of trips to his home town in Mississippi and Florida in recent years.

Besides Mrs. Wright, with whom he had made his home for three months, he is survived by three other daughters, Mrs. F. B. Woods of Wartrace, Mrs. Annie Slater of Wartrace, and Mrs. Lena Hart of Flat Creek; one son, Garand S. Moore, Nashville attorney; five grandchildren, Mrs. Walter Hoffman and Mrs. Dewey Hastings of Shelbyville, Mrs. Virginia Wright Sain of Manchester, Max Hart of Flat Creek, and Garland Wright of Fairfield; a number of great grandchildren and nieces and nephews.
