Re: **US OPEN ANTI-GAMBLING POLICY AND CREDENTIAL POLICY**

The USTA would like to take this opportunity to remind you that Grand Slam Rules strictly prohibit the participation in or aiding and abetting, directly or indirectly, of any form of gambling or betting involving tennis.

We have a zero tolerance policy on gambling or betting involving tennis, and any violation of such policy will result in immediate disciplinary action. Such activity is deemed to be a "Corruption Offense" under the Uniform Tennis Anti-Corruption Program, and subjects a Player and Related Persons to a fine up to \$250,000 plus an amount equal to the value of any winnings or other amounts received by such Player or Related Person in connection with any corruption offense, and a maximum penalty of permanent suspension from play (or in the case of Related Persons, permanent revocation of credentials and access) in all Grand Slams.

"Related Person" refers to any coach, trainer, therapist, physician, management representative, agent, family member, tournament guest, business associate or other affiliate or associate of any Player, or any other person who receives accreditation at an Event at the request of the Player or any other Related Person.

In addition, no Players or other credentialed persons shall, directly or indirectly, solicit or accept any money, benefit or other consideration for the provision of a credential, guest pass or other access to the US Open. A violation of this rule may lead to financial penalties, suspension and withdrawal of all future credentials and other tournament benefits and privileges.
