

Sally has a long history of volunteer contributions to the tennis community. She was the Co-Tournament Director of the Fiesta Bowl National Junior Tennis Championships from 1993 to 1998 and Advisor to the Tournament Directors in 1999. While serving as advisor she planned, organized, and put together the successful bid for the 2000 USTA Super National Winter Championships (BG 16 & 18), which she is still the Tournament Director. Based on her efforts and reputation, the USTA/Phoenix was awarded four divisions of this brand new event – the most ever awarded to one city at that time. 2013 will mark the fourteenth year of the event.

Sally was instrumental in the planning and running of the very successful Celebrity Tennis Smash in 2000, 2001 and 2002, which raised money for junior programs for the USTA Central Arizona and the Southwest Tennis Foundation. In 2009, she was asked to join the foundation board, and is the chair of the Scholarship and Program Committee. She was asked to be on the Awards Fund Raiser committee for the 2009 Southwest Section Annual Awards Luncheon/Dinner, and was the Chair of the Committee for the 2010 and 2011 Silent Auction. In September 2011, she was nominated President of the Southwest Tennis Foundation.

Her combined fundraising efforts have totaled well over \$550,000 for the USTA Central Arizona programs.

Sally has volunteered on various other local junior tournaments over the years, beginning with running a tournament desk at the Southwest Junior Closed Tournament in 1993, to doing scheduling and working the tournament desks for the 2000 to 2009 Jeff Meyers Memorial Tournament, and the 2003 and 2005 Phoenix Junior Open. In 2006, she was Co-Tournament Director for the Phoenix Junior Open. In 2007, the tournament changed names to the Phoenix Junior Championships, and she became sole tournament director and continues with the tournament. In 2011, she added the Scottsdale Sweet Sixteen Tournament to her tournament directing duties.

In 2005, Sally helped host the USTA Block Party at Scottsdale Ranch Park. In 2008, she represented Central Arizona at the Scottsdale Ranch Park Grand Re-Opening Open House Party. She helped work the Southwest Section's booth for the Cancer Treatment Centers of America Tennis Championships in 2008, 2009, and 2010. In 2009, she was asked to be a Key Coordinator, in charge of hospitality, for the Fed Cup Tie between USA and Argentina.

Sally has also made many contributions to the tennis community; she was involved from 1992 to 2005 with the ATP Tour event, the Arizona Men's Tennis Classic, which later became The Tennis Channel Open, and from 2000 to 2003 with the WTA Tour State Farm Women's Tennis Classic, both played at the Fairmount Scottsdale Princess Resort. As a volunteer herself, she was Volunteer Co-Chair and helped to organize and manage more than 350 adults and 100 ballkids for both weeklong events.

From 2004 through 2006 Sally worked on the Super Senior Sectionals, where she handled the computer scoring and reporting for the tournament. She is also an avid tennis player, playing in two leagues and clinics each week. She was recognized in the May/June 2001 issue of USTA Magazine as a USTA Top Seed for her volunteer contributions.

In 2005, Sally became a Representative on the Women's Interclub Tennis League (WITL) board, where in 2006 she remained on the board as Chairman, and in 2007 as Past Chair. In 2006, she was hired by the Valley of the Sun Jewish Community Center to run the tennis portion of the JCC Maccabi Games. If that didn't keep her busy, she was also involved with other community organizations and was a committee member for the Scottsdale Healthcare Foundation's Honor Ball, which supports educational medical programs, from 1995 to today.

Sally has received several honors from the Central Arizona tennis community. She has been recognized as Tournament Director of the Year in 1995 for her work on the Fiesta Bowl, in 2000 for the inaugural USTA Super Winter National Championships, in 2001 for the USTA Super Winter National Championships and in 2003, 2005 and again in 2006 was awarded the Outstanding Tournament Enrichment for the USTA Winter National Championships.

In 1996, the Fiesta Bowl, under her direction, was recognized as Junior Tournament of the Year. The USTA Southwest Section honored her in 1995, 2001, and 2005 as the section's Tournament Director of the Year.

She was featured in an article in the USTA Magazine in 1996 recognizing her contributions to the tennis community. Sally was again featured in Tennis Life Magazine, March/April 2010 issue, for her outstanding volunteer contributions.

She has served on the USTA Central Arizona Board for the last 18 years, as the Junior National Tournament Committee Chair, and in 2008 she became a part of the Executive Committee, as the CAZ Delegate, and in turn as a member of the Southwest Section Board of Directors. She was also on the 2008/2009 Volunteer and Advocacy Committee of the SWS. Also in 2008, she was asked to be on the SWS new office negotiating committee where they successfully acquired the current SWS office.

Since 2005, she has chaired the Central Arizona Awards Dinner and Auction/Raffle, raising an excess of \$40,000. She was on the Grievance Appeals Committee, for Central Arizona, from 2007 through 2009, and was the Chair from 2008 to 2009. From 2010 to 2011, Sally became the President of Central Arizona, and is currently the CAZ Delegate to the SWS Board.

She is currently on two SWS Committees. From 2010 to present she was the Officials Committee Liaison. From 2010-2011, she was on the Awards Committee where she was the Chair. From 2011 to present she was on the Junior Competition Committee. She is the Chair for the 2012 to 2013 SWS Grants Committee.

In 2010 Sally served on the inaugural US Open National Playoffs SWS Committee. Lastly, she has had the pleasure to attend seven USTA National Tournament Directors Workshops, in which she Chaired the 2012 Workshop, which was held in Dallas, TX. She currently sits on the USTA National Junior Competition Committee.

In addition to being inducted into the Central Arizona Hall of Fame, Sally was inducted into the Southwest Section Hall of Fame in 2010.
