When the sun goes down, things start to heat up at the National Tennis Center. I still remember Roddick playing late into the night on Louis Armstrong one year – what a match!


I would not trade the U.S. Open experience for anything. It truly is the greatest show on earth.

Age and... well.....Age!

want to wish Art Shaver of Richardson a belated Happy Birthday. Art recently turned 94 at a birthday party thrown by Nony Michulka at Canyon Creek Country Club. Did I mention that Art regularly plays tennis? His wife, a youngster in her 80's, also plays several times a week. Thanks to Leo Mountjoy for relaying this great story.

Marvin Henderson of Georgetown is now eligible to play in the 90 and over Nationals and cannot wait! Marvin beat me regularly 45 years ago when I played #1 for Southwestern University. He was recently ranked #1 in the US in both the 85 and over Singles and Doubles. I don't think I could beat him now.

The Burgess-Rushing Tennis Center in Lubbock is named after two wonderful senior tennis players, "Dub" Rushing and Hubert Burgess. Their energy and enthusiasm as they played into their 80's and 90's served as examples for that South Plains tennis community. I spoke to both at the naming ceremony a few years ago and recall that Hubert was upset that he had to quit playing at age 94 for physical reasons. It just plain made him mad. He had started playing tennis in 1913. His longtime partner, Dub, started in 1925. They began playing together in 1929. Hubert died in 1999 and Dub in 2007. Thanks to Jim Blacketer for supplying this information.

USTA Texas currently has 100 members over the age of 85 of which 24 are over 90. There are 16 ladies and 84 men. We can only assume that many are still active. We also have 21 men ranked in the 80 and over singles or doubles and 7 men ranked in the 85 and over singles or

doubles. The women currently have 5 ranked in the 80 and over singles or doubles. Neither Art nor Marvin are included in these lists which suggests that we may have another 500 players over 80 out there playing socially or in local events.

Our Super Senior tournaments in Texas begin at age 55. When I started playing in these events, I said that I liked being at events where I was one of the young ones. I am 67 and I am still 6 years under the median age in these events! Tennis players are the only group of people who looks forward to growing older so they may play in the next age division and not have to play the younger ones. We look old, but not as old as our nonathletic counterparts. We are active, upbeat, and optimistic. And we still get angry when we miss an easy volley.

And we owe much of it to Tennis, the Truly Lifetime Sport!



s a junior boy, you dream of making it to The Zoo. For 67 years, the town of Kalamazoo has been playing host, on the campuses of Kalamazoo College and Western Michigan University, to some of the greatest junior tennis.

Players like Rod Laver, Stan Smith, Arthur Ashe, Jimmy Connors, John McEnroe, Aaron Krickstein, Michael Chang, Andre Agassi, Jim Courier, Pete Sampras, James Blake, Andy Roddick, Bob and Mike Bryan, Sam Querry and many more have graced the courts.

This year in the Boys 16s, several Texans made it a trip to remember.

In the singles draw, Shane Vinsant and Mitchell Krueger began the tournament as the top two seeds in singles, as well as the top seed in doubles.

Vinsant and Krueger played some amazing tennis and looked to be heading to an all-Texas singles final, but Michael Redlicki of Illinois had other ideas. The winner of the Boys' 16 USTA Clay Court Championships defeated Krueger 76 64 in the semifinals, then Vinsant in the title match, 75 64. Krueger defeated Nolan Paige, 46 61 64, to capture the bronze ball.

Interestingly enough, it was another Texan, Andrew Korinek, who took the only set off of Redlicki during the championships. Redlicki edged Korinek, 61 36 62, in the round of 16 on his way to the title. Korinek advanced all the way to the semifinals of the back draw.

The doubles final was an all-Texas affair.

The top-seeded team of Vinsant and Krueger faced off against their unseeded counterparts from Metroplex, Korinek and Tam Trihn.

Korinek and Trihn reached the final after winning a marathon in

QuickStart

look at my two children now, and I wonder if they will embrace tennis the way I have for the last 25 years. I hope they do, as playing the game with them will be yet one more activity we can share as they get older. (Hopefully, they will share the same sentiment!)

I have a bit of time before they enter the throws of junior tennis – my son only recently turned 3, and my daughter is a wee 5 months old. But that doesn't stop me from thinking about the very near future and wondering how best I can introduce them to tennis.

Luckily, the USTA has taken that worry away from young parents such as myself. With the advent of QuickStart Tennis and the strides being made in new ways of teaching youngsters the game, I find myself less worried about teaching them the nuances of inside-out forehands and swinging volleys – and that's a good thing.

Six key components make up the QuickStart Tennis format:

- Two separate age divisions 8-and-under and 10-and-under.
- Smaller court size depending on age.
- Shorter nets for 8-and-under division.
- Special tennis balls are in play.
- · Competitors use youth-sized racquets.
- Special scoring methods depending on age.

QuickStart Tennis has taken off in Texas, where many families are embracing the plan as an innovative strategy to teach children the game. Playing tennis on a scaled-down court and keeping score with an easy-to-understand format makes learning the game fun for kids – which, in turn, will likely keep them playing for years to come


It's also important, though, to correctly teach QuickStart Tennis. That's why USTA Texas is committed to bolstering the number of certified QuickStart Tennis facilities across the section. All around Texas – from Houston to Austin and Laredo to Amarillo – there are places that have attained this status, with more to come in the near future.

"We are making site visits to ensure that the facilities are in compliance with all six [QuickStart Tennis] components," said Katy Rogers, Schools Coordinator/Beginner Programs for USTA Texas. "If there is room for improvement, we will then make our recommendations and come back at a later date to see if they are successfully implementing the QST format."

If your facility is interested in becoming a certified facility, contact the Tennis Service Representative assigned to your area. In turn, you will receive a banner to showcase at the club.

QuickStart Tennis is a win-win situation for pros, parents and children alike. More new players are taking to the game, and – most importantly – they are finding tennis to be fun and something they want to play.

Now if we parents can just get them to eat healthily ... but that might be asking too much and is definitely fodder for another time!



Justin Boydstun, Eric McDonald, Stephen Stripling, Trevor Edgemon and Cliff Wilkes.




